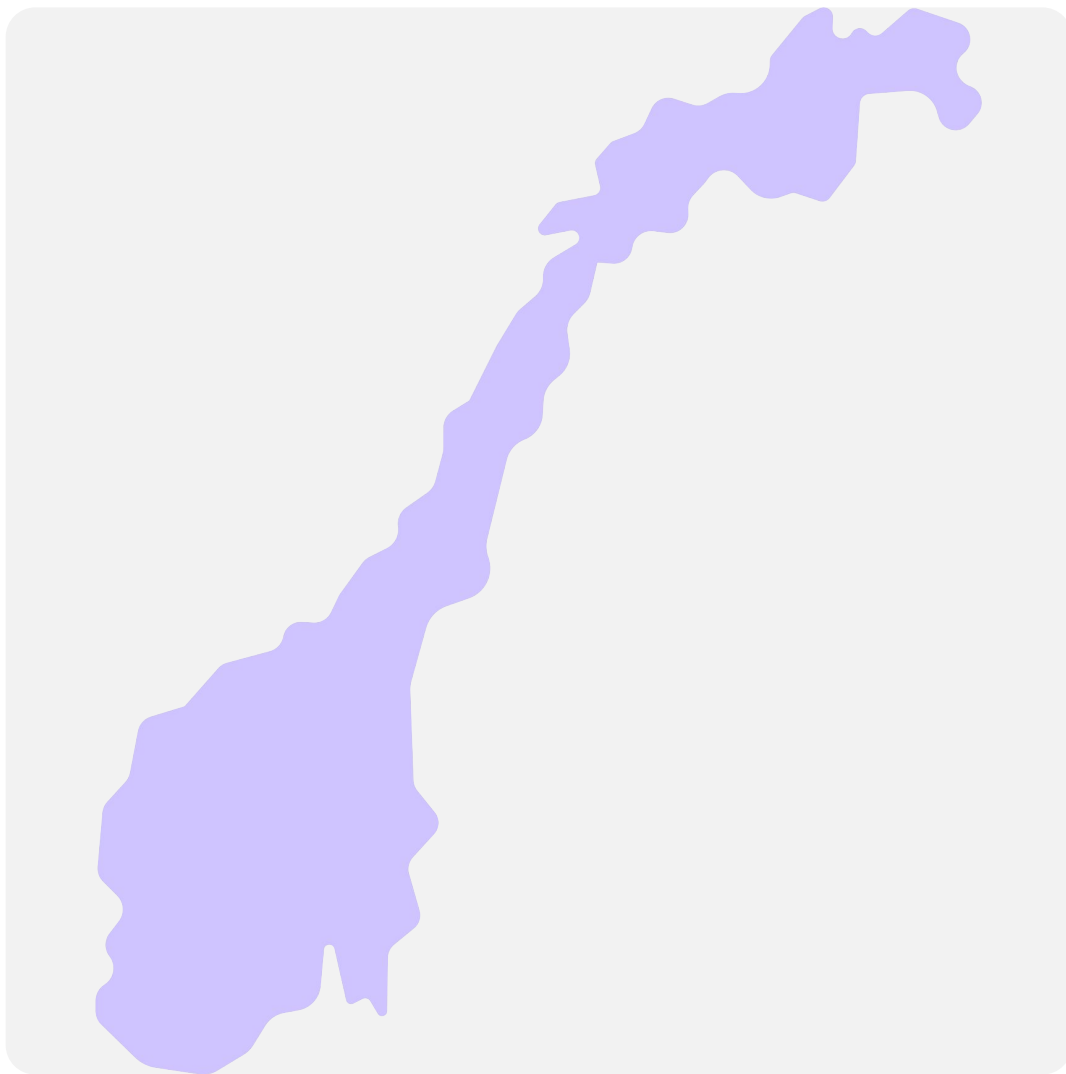

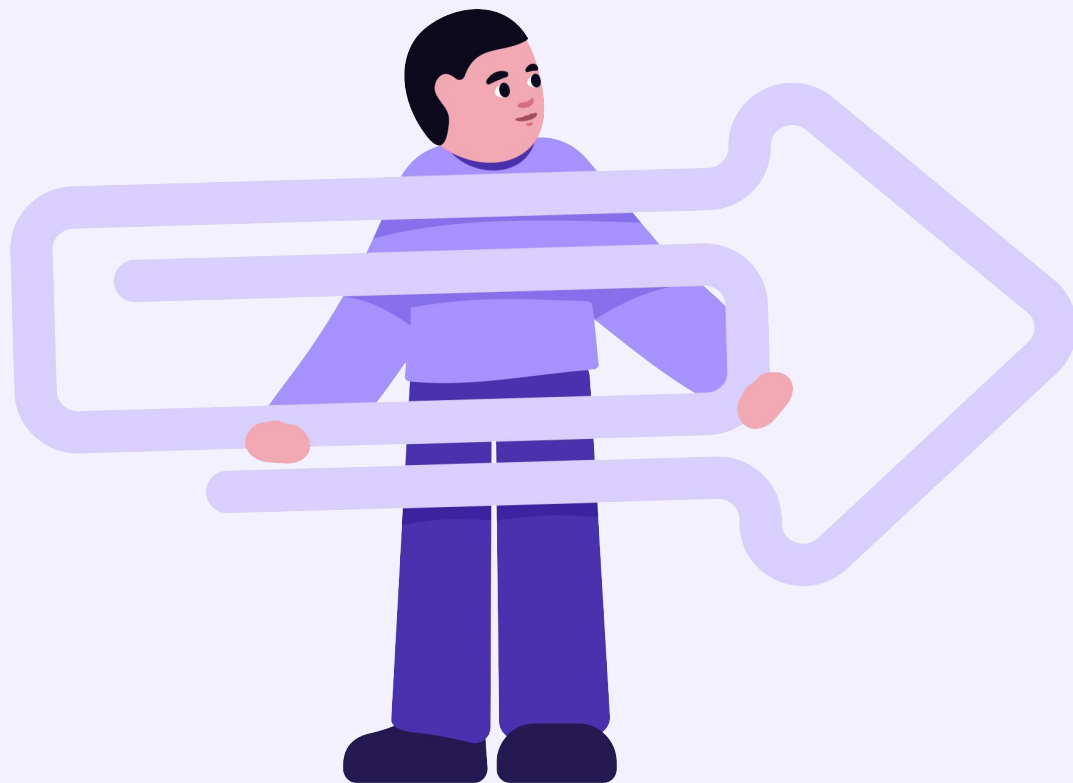
Sikt Consortia — At a Glance

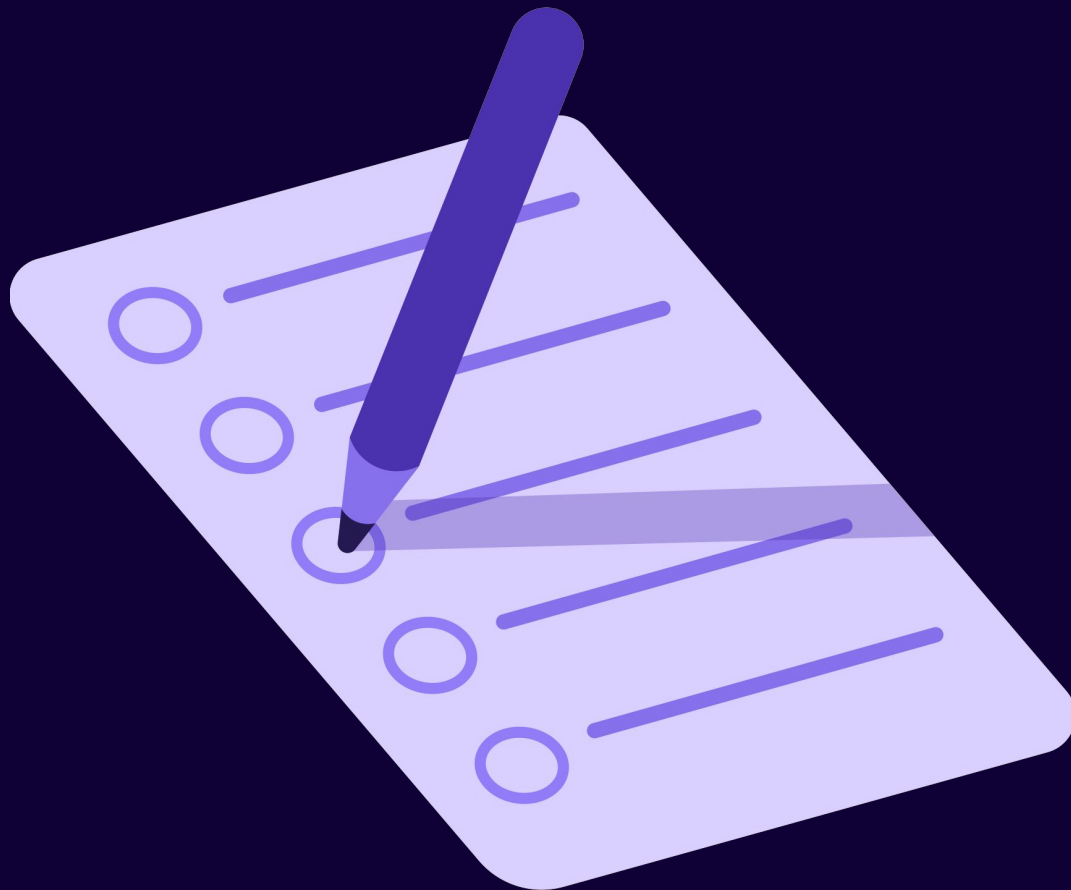
Building Momentum Since 2018

- 2018 — First agreement: DOAJ
- 2020 — Expanded with Sherpa/Romeo
- 2021 — Added DOAB and OAPEN
- 2022 — Open Library of Humanities and SciPost
- 2025 — AJOL, Episciences, Make Data Count
- 2026 — PKP and Open Book Collective

2026: 80 contributions = €230.000

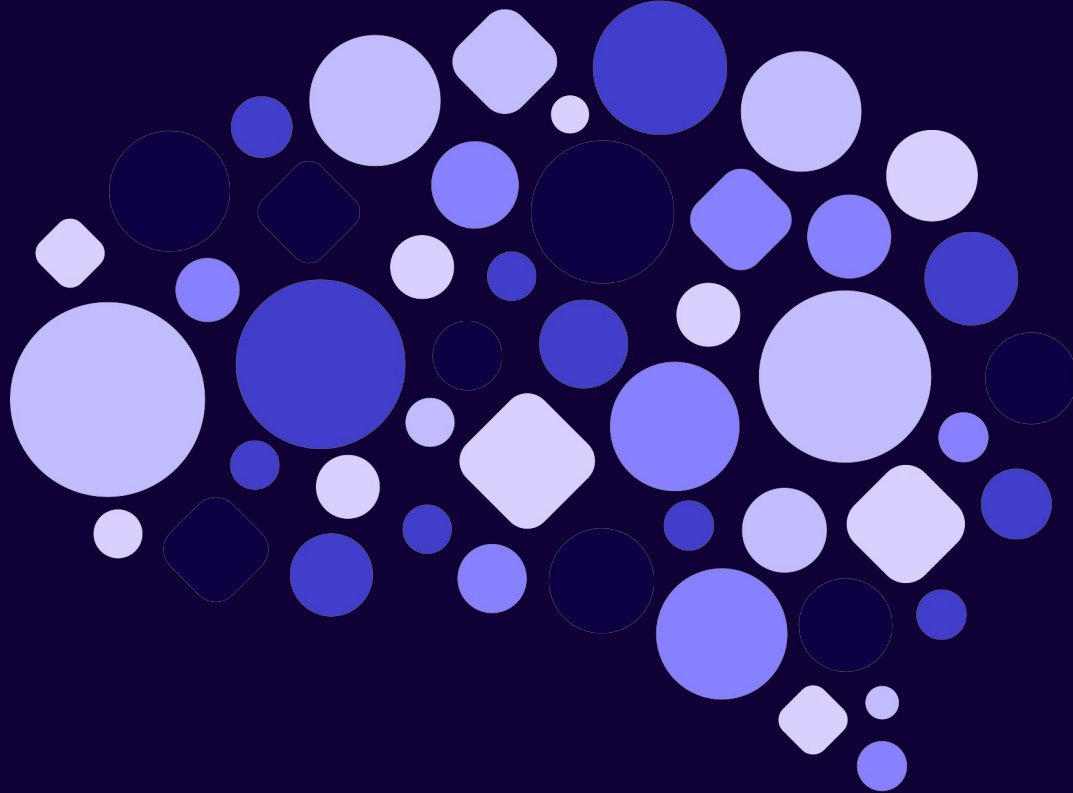
Since 2018 a total of = €933.000

How It Works



Our Process — Step by Step

- Identify a relevant open science service or diamond initiative
- Send information to all member institutions (or most relevant ones)
- Publish details on openscience.no and in our member newsletter
- Set a due date — members confirm participation via Consortia Manager
- Submit the collective order to the service provider
- Service invoices Sikt — Sikt invoices the members



Annual Renewal

- Agreements follow a yearly renewal cycle
- Members reassess participation annually
- Sikt handles all coordination and invoicing
- Simple and low-burden process for institutions



Keys to Success

- Strong positive attitude towards open science among Norwegian institutions
- Careful selection — only serious, high-quality services and initiatives
- SCOSS endorsement adds an additional layer of quality assurance
- Clear, well-described fee structures in all communications
- Sikt's trusted role as the national consortia
