The Student's Chronological New Testament.

By Prof. A. T. Robertson, D. D. Fleming H. Revell Co., New York and Chicago. Price \$1.00 net.

Professor Robertson has given to the public in this admirable manual the results of long and patient research in the New Testament. The introductions to the different books are brief, but quite comprehensive, few matters of importance being passed over in silence. The outlines of the various books are in themselves an interpretation of the thought, and are expressed in a fresh and suggestive way. The author often packs into a short, ringing sentence the ripe results of long research.

The chronological arrangement is not rigidly carried through, but is modified by practical considerations. Thus the four Gospels are placed at the beginning, inasmuch as the story of our Lord's life lies at the foundation of New Testament Christianity. It is only in the epistolary literature that the order of composition is carefully observed in the arrangement of the literature. Pastors and Sunday-school teachers will derive much profit from the constant use of this excellent manual. The text used is that of the American Standard edition.
