A Short History of England.

By Edward P. Cheyney, Professor of European History in the University of Pennsylvania. Ginn & Co. Boston. 1904. Pages 695.

Professor Cheyney had already written an "Industrial and Social History of England." It would be hard to find in one volume so much that is valuable and interesting about England as one can get in this new work of Cheyney. The maps are new and numerous. The pictures are many and luminous. The analysis is clear and able. The matter which, condensed is yet presented in a flowing style. It is a fascinating book and a joy to read. The colonies are treated, so that the whole great British Empire passes in review before the reader. If you wish a one-volume history of England that is brought down to the present year and is adequate and interesting this is the book.
