aside John's Gospel in a Harmony save tentatively, for John has to be reckoned with, whatever some critics may say. But this book has a real service and is useful for its purpose. Gospel. A. T. ROBERTSON.

The Messages of Jesus According to the Gospel of John.

By J. S. Riggs, D. D., Professor of Biblical Criticisms in Auburn Theological Seminary, New York. Chas. Scribner's Sons, 1907. Pages 374.

We have here Vol. X in the Messages of the Bible Series of Drs. Sanders and Kent. Dr. Riggs has given 71 pages to the many interesting problems that confront us in the Fourth Gospel. He speaks wisely and with comprehensive knowledge on these matters and in short space gives the average reader the main points necessary to the study of the book. Dr. Riggs holds to the Johannine authorship and has good reasons for his position. The bulk of the volume is devoted to outline and paraphrase. The volume is very timely just now as the Sunday school lessons have aroused fresh interest in John's Cospel.
