A School History of England.

By Harmon B. Niver, A.B. The American Book Company. New York, Cincinnati, Chicago. 1904. Pages 406. Price 90 cts.

This is a book for modern needs. There are an abundance of maps, a great variety of pictures, pertinent questions, subjects for further reading, a select bibliography, an excellent index, and a pronouncing dictionary. The work is well done, the style is bright and clear, and the child is enabled to grasp firmly the great movements in English history.

A New Greek-English Lexicon to the New Testament.

By George Ricker Berry, Ph.D. Hinds & Noble. New York. 1897.

This is not a new book, but is a useful little dictionary to carry around with one to use in a hurry where one does not wish to go into the larger questions raised by Thayer or Liddell and Scott. There is a good list of New Testament synonyms in the appendix.

Nameless Women of the Bible.

By Rev. Theron Brown, with Introduction by Mrs. Margaret E. Sangster. American Tract Society, New York. 1904.

This is a small volume of sixteen short essays on nameless women of the Bible, such as Pharoah's daughter, the mother of Samson, the queen of Sheba, the woman at Jacob's well, the widow with two mites, etc. The portraitures of Old Testament characters are good; those of New Testament women are better. Fancy fills in some of the Old Testament pictures, while Imagination holds the brush for the New Testament portraits. Especially glowing and lifelike are the pictures of the women who came in contact with the Lord. This book would be a welcome gift to any woman.
