This is a very valuable, because very complete and well edited, collection of historical sketches, descriptions, legends, poems and pictures showing the origin and observances of Easter in various countries and ages. The related practices of the whole Passion Week are set forth. Some of the most interesting stories are of the Passion Play of Oberammergau, Easter in Jerusalem, 1835; Egg-rolling in Washington, The Processions of Passion Week in Seville.

There are twelve pictures from paintings by Rembrandt, Rubens, Fra Angelico, Paul Veronese, and other of the great artists.

The poems are well selected and include the most famous Latin poems, in translation, as well as many less known but full of sunshine, gladness and beauty. This is a sort of companion volume to The Christmas Book and is a beautiful volume for a gift book.
