

The Christianity of Christ and His Apostles.

By J. J. Tigert, D.D., L.L. D. Publishing House of the M. E. Church South, Nashville, Tenn. 1905. Price 80c.

This is not a book on Biblical Theology, but "historical studies of fundamental New Testament problems." Dr. Tigert is the editor of the *Methodist Quarterly Review*. He has written a candid and courageous review of the present situation in Christianity in the light of modern criticism. Dr. Tigert is a conservative who has faced the objections of radical criticism and who still believes that Christ is the power of God unto salvation unto every one that believeth. This book is virile and convincing. He handles men like Pfeleiderer and Wernle rather roughly, calling them "traitors in the camp" and on the way to atheism. But it is a wholesome tonic to read a book with full knowledge of the reason for the hope that is in the author. It is certain that Christianity will weather the storm of radical criticism, will in fact come out into a clearer place than ever before. Dr. Tigert's book will help those meanwhile who need bracing.

Prof. Zenos has the chair of New Testament Interpretation in the Chicago Theological Seminary (Congregational). He is a thorough scholar of conservative tendencies and has given us a most readable and wholesome book. Dr. Zenos has a sane outlook upon ethical questions and makes no apology for exalting the ethical teaching of Christ to the supreme place. He gives conclusive reasons for that position. This book is free from technical phrases, while full of thought, and will do the average man more good than the more abstruse treatises. This entire series will be found useful to the advanced course of Sunday-school lessons for 1906 on the Teachings of Jesus.
