

and with the frescoes; and the beautiful illustrations and the plans adequately elucidate the text. A catalogue of the sculptures, now in Naples Museum, and a valuable bibliography are appended for the help of the traveller and the specialist.

It is hard to express one's appreciation of the magnificent pictures in this volume which present the art treasures found in Herculaneum. The result is a wonderfully vivid picture of old Roman life. It is absolutely startling to have this section of that civilization reproduced to us. We have had excavations reported before from many parts of the world.
