Summary

Within RURITAGE, the process of knowledge transfer is not intended to be unidirectional but a mutual learning process where both Role Models (RMs) and Replicators (Rs) can exchange experiences that further up skill and reskill their knowledge and capacities. The aim is to reach and train on heritage-led rural regeneration the wider stakeholder community of RURITAGE across the different RMs and Rs.

Task 2.3 ensures capacity building to guarantee knowledge transfer and brokerage across different SIAs, different Rural Heritage Hubs and transcend the mentor-mentee relationship of RM and Rs in Task 2.4. This Task focuses on face-to-face interactions through four workshops, where the entire RURITAGE consortium joins for an intense interactive working session for 3-4 days.

According to an initial plan agreed at the Project's proposal stage, each workshop was held in a different location hosted by one of partner organisations. One exception was for the last Fine-Tuning workshop that due to COVID-19 pandemics in 2020 was held on-line.

This Deliverable presents the overall approach of the four knowledge exchange workshops, including the logistics and content preparations, and describes in detail each workshop, such as modalities and outcomes of sessions. The Deliverable is completed with the results of overall feedback survey, addressed to the RURITAGE Replicators and Role Models.

2. Multilevel and multidirectional knowledge and innovation in Replicators and Role Models

2.1 Objective

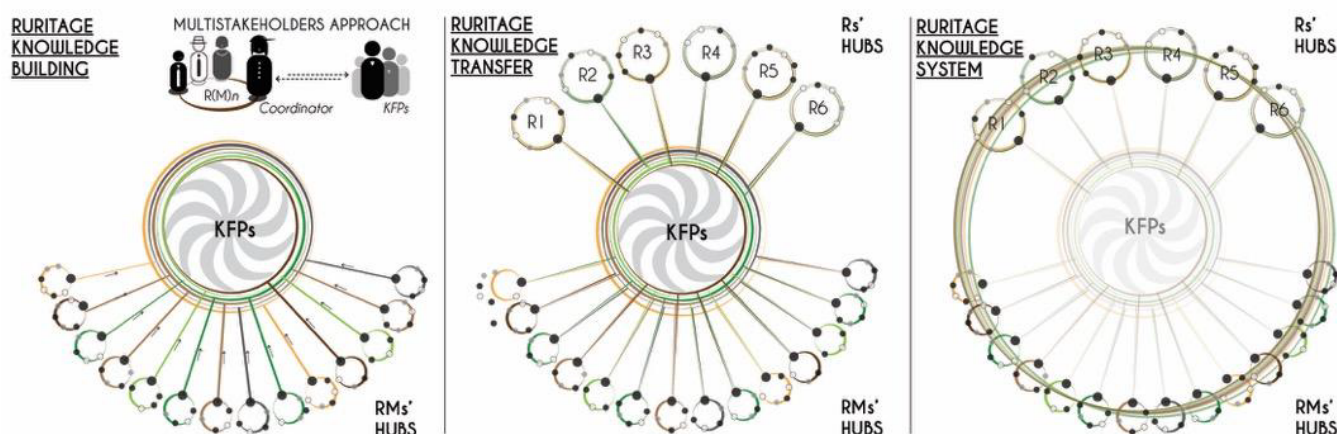


Figure 1. RURITAGE Knowledge Process

Within RURITAGE, the process of knowledge transfer (Figure 1) is not intended to be unidirectional. It has been designed as a mutual learning process where both Role Models (RMs) and Replicators (Rs) can exchange experiences to further up skill and reskill their knowledge and capacities. The aim is to reach and train on heritage-led rural regeneration the wider stakeholder community of RURITAGE across the different RMs and Rs. Task 2.3 ensures capacity building to guarantee knowledge transfer and brokerage across different SIAs, different Rural Heritage Hubs (Figure 1, centre) and transcend the mentor-mentee relationship of RM and Rs in Task 2.4 (Figure 1, right).

This Task focuses on face-to-face interactions through four workshops, where the entire all RURITAGE consortium joins for an intense interactive working session for 3-4 days.

According to an initial plan agreed at the Project proposal stage, each workshop was held in different location hosted by one of partner organisations (Table 1). One exception was for the last Fine-Tuning workshop that, due to COVID-19 pandemics in 2020, was held on-line.

Two workshops (Development WkSp in Crete and Launch WkSp in Appignano dT) were held back-to-back with face-to-face Steering Committee gatherings (one day before the main workshop). Three workshops were followed by an extra day with special training sessions only for Replicators under the Replicators Forum.

Content wise, the workshops followed the four stages of the development and implementation of the heritage-led plans in the different partner regions. The Training Workshop made the initial step in growing the RURITAGE knowledge tree. The event focused on guiding the coordinators of Replicators' Rural Heritage Hubs through the Community-based Heritage management and planning methodology. This training ensured that they experienced the co-creation methods in person, putting themselves in the stakeholders' shoes and that they were prepared to take on their role inside the Rural Heritage Hubs. The main goal of the Development Workshop was to go deeper into the implementation phase of the heritage-led plans, exploring different partner regions. The Launch Workshop aimed to help the Replicators in the launching of the implementation phase by verifying and supporting all starting steps. During the Fine-tuning Workshop, Replicators and Role Models presented their first achievements in the implementation of regeneration plans and got the feedback from the entire RURITAGE community.

2.2 Organisation and logistics

UNESCO and UNIBO teams lead the coordination of each workshop's logistics and content. UNESCO and UNIBO coordinated the overall timely organisation, including preparation – facilitation – follow up of each workshop. Content was co-organised with UNIBO with a contribution of relevant KFPs. Logistics was shared with the local hosting partner.

Three hosting organisations (CARTIF in Valladolid, Psiloritis Geopark in Crete and CoApp in Appignano dT) were taking care of local logistics that included:

- Providing to all participants an “information pack”, including information about the venue, how to get there, and suggestions for local transport to the venue and accommodation, as well as touristic highlights. (Figure 2)
- Booking of appropriate workshop rooms

- Organisation of catering & coffee-break
- Organisation of social events (costs partly covered by UNESCO)
- Ensuring local logistic supply (screens, printing badges and agendas etc.)

The preparation of sessions’ conceptual content was co-lead by UNESCO and UNIBO. All Knowledge Facilitating Partners were involved in the facilitation of relevant sessions (Table 3). UNIBO team facilitated overall 14 sessions during all four workshops, UNESCO and ICLEI (8 and 5 accordingly) and CE and CRS (three sessions each) were facilitating sessions at three workshops. UoP, Tecnalia, Bitn and Cartif were involved in session’s facilitation at two workshops and ALM, Acir, APRE, NMBU, Polito and WestBic contributed each to one session facilitation.

2.3 Workshops overall modality

Different sessions' modalities were put in place during each workshop. Overall, more than 29 lecture presentations and seven large interactive sessions were run during the four workshops (Table 2). Lecture sessions were facilitated in plenary, when all participants were attending same presentations or in parallel, when the session was targeting specific RURITAGE group, such as Role Models or Replicators or Rs and RMs grouped by SIA.

Following their stages of RURITAGE regeneration (for Rs) and enhancement (for RMs) plans development, Rs and RMs were asked to present their achievements/challenges and plans. Templates for such presentations were provided by UNIBO during SIBs and RFs (see Annex V).

To ensure moments of direct knowledge exchange and learning between RMs and Rs, at least one interactive session was foreseen during each workshop.

3. Workshops enrolment

This section describes in detail each workshop with its sessions.

3.1 Training workshop on 19-22 March 2019 (M9) in Valladolid, Spain

Aim: Train the coordinators of the Replicators' RHH regarding the CHMP methodology implementation.

Main sessions:

The gathering started on Monday 18th March 2019 afternoon by a half day of Steering Committee meeting.

In the morning of Tuesday 19th March 2019 the workshop was opened by Mr. Enrique Sáiz, General Director of Heritage at Castilla-y-Leon regional government, and Ms. Teresa López-Martín, Mayor of Medina del Campo. Dr Francisco Barrientos welcomed participants on the behalf of hosting organisation, CARTIF. RURITAGE project coordinator, Dr Simona Tondelli, introduced the overall workshop objectives and agenda.

Plenary sessions started with a lecture on Cultural and Natural Heritage safeguarding, appreciation and interpretation (UNESCO) and the RURITAGE data collection (TECNALIA) and monitoring strategy (CARTIF). In the

afternoon, there was an interactive session to test the pilot version of the serious game developed in the T 2.2. (CRS).

On Wednesday 20th March, three parallel sessions on the different SIAs were moderated by respective KFPs. The presentations of each RM and Additional RM (T 1.1) were a symbiosis between the “on the ground tricks and tips” from the RM itself and the “lessons-learned and good practices” distilled from the collected data by one of the KFPs in T 1.1-2.3.

Thursday 21st March 2019 was dedicated to cross-cutting issues. The session, aiming to validate the list of significant RM actions for each cross-cutting issue, consisted of six parallel table discussions around the 11 crosscutting themes, each moderated by at least 2 cross-cutting experts (KFP). In the afternoon, there was a training for the coordinators of the Rural Heritage Hubs regarding the CHMP methodology.

On Friday 22nd March 2019, there was an extra session for two people per Replicator to receive training on how to moderate the serious game within their own Rural Heritage Hub.

Main outcomes: Based on the Training received from Role Models, Replicators started selection a list of tentative actions, that they could include in their own Regeneration Action Plans (WP3). Once back from this workshop, coordinators of RHH, who just received trainings on CHMP and RURITANIA game, used these tools to organise a series of participative workshops at their own RHHs (WP3).

3.2 Development workshop on 27-30 May 2019 (M12) in Psiloritis UNESCO Global Geopark, Greece.

Aim: Advance in the development and the implementation phase. Provide training for Rs and RMs on business model development and fund raising.

Main sessions:

The gathering started on Monday 27th May 2019 by a half day of Steering Committee meeting. In the afternoon of 27th May 2019, there was an optional visit to the rural community of Psiloritis UNESCO Global Geopark, one of the two RURITAGE Resilience Role Models (RM9).

Tuesday 28th May 2020 started with the welcoming by Prof Odysseas Zoras, the Rector of the University of Crete, and As. Prof. Poulakakis Nikos, the Director of the Natural History Museum of Crete. Dr Fassoulas Charalampos welcomed participants on the behalf of hosting organisation, University of Crete. RURITAGE project coordinator, Dr Simona Tondelli, introduced the overall workshop objectives and agenda.

Two following days –28th and 29th May 2019 – were focused on sessions for all RURITAGE Role Models and Replicators. On Tuesday 28th May 2019, based on the analysis performed in Task 1.2 „Building the RURITAGE Inventory of Lessons Learned”, Tecnalia introduced to all the first version of the RURITAGE Inventory of Lessons Learnt (D 1.2) and introduce a further data gathering campaign. Several tools developers – Cartif, Almende, Polito and UoP – presented to partners Insights from the RURITAGE Resource Ecosystem, including The Baseline assessment tool, DSS, Digital Rural Heritage Hub, Atlas and My Cult-Rural Toolkit. These tools were then tested by RMs and Rs during interactive afternoon sessions. Second day, Wednesday 29th May 2019, started with seven presentations by Board of Investors. In the afternoon, all participants took part in the interactive session on exchange between RMs and Rs regarding the RHHs and experience exchange. Specific sessions were dedicated to communication and dissemination skills of RMs and Rs (by ICLEI) and to the Serious game feedback (by CRS).

On Thursday the 30th May 2019, one extra day was foreseen for the representative of each Replicator to learn about the creation of business models (by Savonia and WestBic).

Main outcomes: The training allowed RURITAGE tool developers (WP4/5) to introduce their tools to RURITAGE partners and improve tools’ functionalities based on gathered feedback. Replicators, who continued interactive learning exchange with RMs and KFPs, advanced in their choice in selection of actions, that they would include in

respective Regeneration plan (WP3).

3.3 Launch workshop (on 28-31 October 2019 (M18) in Appignano del Tronto, Italy.

Main organizers: UNESCO, UNIBO and hosting partner – CoApp.

Aim: Support the Rs in the launch of the implementation phase.

Main sessions:

The gathering started in the afternoon of Monday 28th October 2019 and continued in the morning of Tuesday 29th October 2019 with two parts of Steering Committee meeting.

In the morning of Tuesday 29th October 2020, Ms Anna Casini, vice president of Marche, and Dr Sara Moreschini, the Major, welcomed participants to Appignano del Tronto. RURITAGE project coordinator, Dr Simona Tondelli, introduced the overall workshop objectives and agenda.

Technical sessions started in parallel to the SC, when a session for Additional Replicators who were selected in Spring 2019 to join RURITAGE community (T6.2) was held. UNESCO and UNIBO explained the main opportunities and activities for Additional Rs and several RMs presented to Additional Rs their good practices for inspiration.

On Tuesday afternoon, the workshop started for all participants with pitch presentations from Additional Rs. Two technical sessions on „First insights on Exchange visits“ (by UNESCO) and „Insights on co-development phase RHH activities“ (by UNIBO and CRS) were followed by presentations by RMs of their Enhancement plans.

Wednesday 30th October 2020 started with a set of presentations of the co-development phase and draft action plans by Replicators. ICLEI introduced RURITAGE Photo Contest and BITN presented the first insights about RURITAGE branding.

An interactive session aimed to support Replicators in the launching of the implementation phase.

During an extra half-day on Thursday 31st October 2019, Replicators were working on finalizing the co-development phase together with UNIBO and on their individual Marketing strategies together with BITN.

Main outcomes: Based on the Training received from Role Models, Replicators started selection a list of tentative actions, that they could include in their own Regeneration Action Plans (WP3). Once back from this workshop, coordinators of RHH, who just received trainings on CHMP and RURITANIA game, used these tools to organise a series of participative workshops at their own RHHs.

3.4 Fine-tuning workshop (on 21-21 October 2020 (M29), on-line

Aim: Replicators and Role Models present their heritage-led rural regeneration strategies and enhancement plans to receive feedback and further suggestions from the RURITAGE community

Main sessions:

On the first day on Wednesday 21 October 2020, Replicators presented their heritage-led rural regeneration strategies focusing on the first results and successes and received feedback and suggestions from the Role Models, Additional Role Models, Knowledge Facilitator Partners and/or other Replicators (facilitated by UNIBO). During parallel sessions, Board of Investors were invited to explore the possibility of investment creation for Replicators. At the same time, Role Models and Knowledge Facilitator Partners had a moment to share knowledge focusing on Ruritania serious game (by CRS).

On the second day on Thursday 22 October 2020, Replicators became again the focus of attention, while sharing the main pending issues that need solving in their implementation plans. Role Models then presented the outcomes of the first activities (e.g. Participatory workshop) they implemented as a starting point of their enhancement plans and heard partners' feedback.

To ensure exchange among partners during sessions, dedicated threads were created on the Digital Rural Heritage Hub for interactive discussions (Figure 7). This way of communication was quite successful and had more than 200 interactions.

Main outcomes: Based on feedbacks from other RMs, Rs and KFPs, Replicators and Role Models left the workshop with ideas on how to “fine-tune” their actions (WP3).

4. Feedback evaluation

In order to obtain feedback and impressions about the role of the workshops in the knowledge exchange process, a [questionnaire](#) was created to be answered by all the involved partners. Twenty-seven (26) partners answered it of which twelve (11) were Role Models, five (5) Replicators, (9) Knowledge Facilitating Partners and one both a Role Model and a Knowledge Facilitating Partner. Most of the participants attended all workshops.

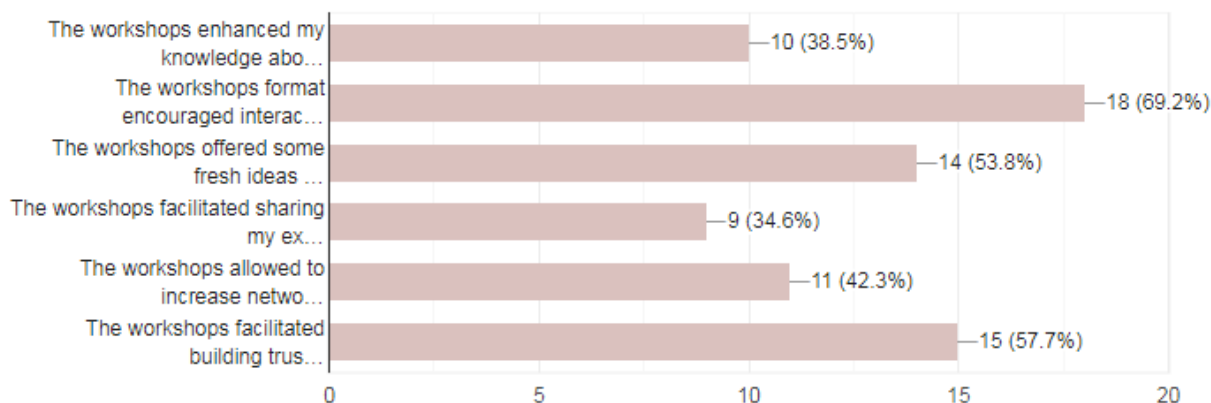
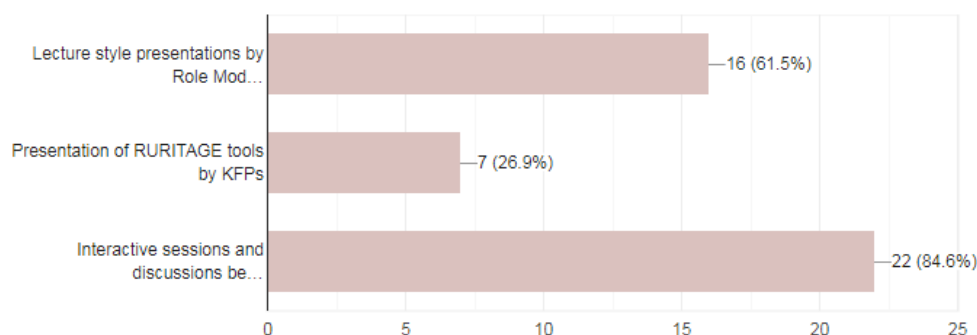


Figure 8. Workshops ‘Take away’ Results, Q: Considering the 4 previous workshops, what are the most important “take aways”? (select up to 3 options). From top to bottom questions were: “The workshops enhanced my knowledge about rural regeneration”; “The workshops format encouraged interaction, discussion and learning”; “The workshops offered some fresh ideas and practical advice to implement rural regeneration strategies”; “The workshops facilitated sharing my

Overall, all workshops were highly appreciated by RURITAGE partners. All workshops were rated as “good” (7-8 out of 10) and “very good” (9-10 out of 10). When asked about the most important outcomes of the four workshops, participants had different “take aways”, which illustrated multiple benefits of these workshops (Figure 8). Among top relevant, responders noted that the workshops 1) encouraged interaction, discussion and learning (69.2% of responders) 2) facilitated building trust and cooperation between project partners (57.7% of responders) 3) offered some fresh ideas and practical advice to implement rural regeneration strategies (53,8% of responders).

expertise and knowledge with others”; “The workshops allowed to increase networks”; “The workshops facilitated building trust and cooperation between project partners”.

When asked on the type of knowledge transfer methods the participants found more useful, most have answered the “Interactive sessions and discussions between Replicators, Role Models and KFPs” (Figure 9a) and considered that they had a chance to establish closer mentor/mentee relations (Figure 9b).

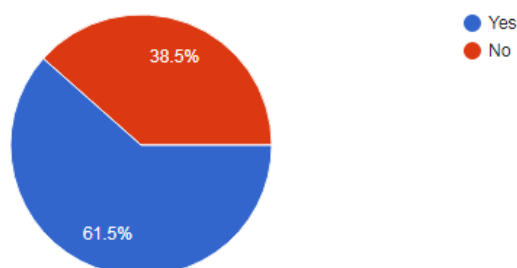

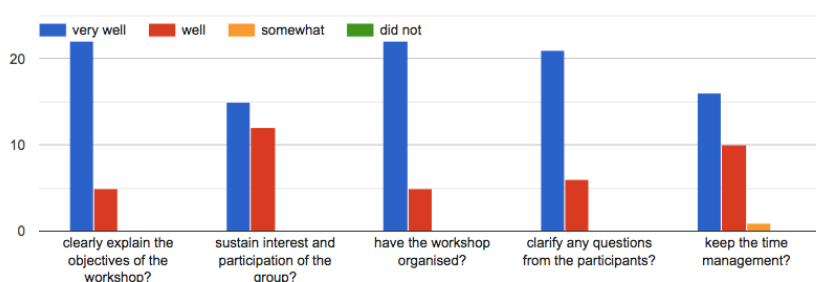


Figure 10. Workshops feedback Results, Q: “Did Facilitators...”

Participants very positively evaluate the role of KFP’s in the workshops. They appreciate that facilitators clearly explained the objectives of the workshop, sustained interest and participation of the group, had the workshop organised, clarified any questions from the participants and kept the time management (Figure 10).

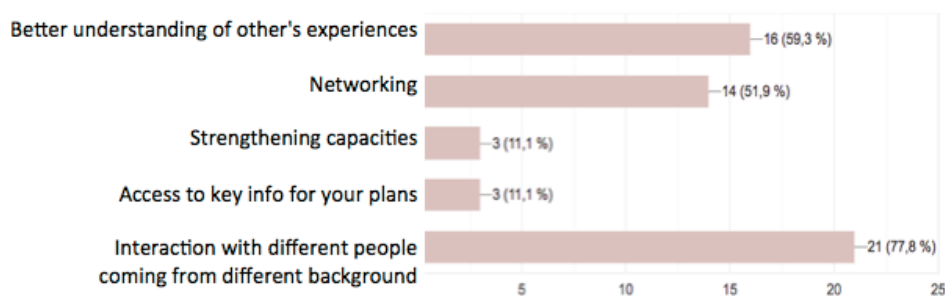


Figure 11. Workshops feedback Results, Q: “Please, choose options to best describe benefits of face-to-face workshops (select up to 2 options)”

In regards to the benefits of face-to-face workshops, most participants consider the “Interaction with different

people coming from different backgrounds” (77,8% of responders) to be the biggest advantage, followed by a “Better understanding of other’s experiences” (59,3% of responders) and “Networking” (51,9% of responders). (Figure 11).

Regarding the online format of the latest workshop, most participants consider that although it is a safer and cheaper way of conducting it, they also mention that it created a lack of social interaction.

Finally, the wider majority (88.5%) of participants consider that the overall expectations for the workshops was fulfilled. During the workshops the majority of participants considers that the social and networking moments were well organised and that they have established stronger professional and informal relations with partners with plenty of networking moments. Workshop agenda was considered as balanced between formal / informal communications and even it intense, it was not considered exhausting at the end. Another unavoidable highlight that was much appreciated by partners, is that workshops locations were amazing.

5. Conclusion

Four training workshops were no doubt fruitful gatherings for the entire RURITAGE community. Major objectives of each workshop, foreseen at the proposal stage, were largely achieved. Main targeted partners – Replicators and Role Models – strengthened their knowledge of integrating natural and cultural heritage into rural development and implemented received experience while developing their RURITAGE local Action plans. From the other side, KFPs had moments to learn more from local Rs and RMs examples and receive feedback on their RURITAGE activities. For instance, very useful suggestions on RURITAGE Resource Ecosystem tool design was received during interactive sessions of the Development workshop.

Points to improve might be to have a possibility to bring more local stakeholders from Rs and RMs territories to these large gatherings. However, this is clearly a subject of finding opportunities within the Pproject.

Meant contributing to mutual learning among partners, workshops truly created space for interactions, discussions and learning. Sessions were balanced between lecture style and interactive ones, that intensified formal and informal discussions. As the feedback survey illustrates, workshops created multiple co-benefits and facilitated the establishment of trusted and cooperative relations between partners. We’ve witnessed several fruitful discussions that started during social gatherings and lead to submissions of successfully funded EU projects (such as Interreg project ADRISEISMIC).
