THE USAGE OF PHRASAL VERBS IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE

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Abstract: This article provides information about phrasal verbs that are considered very relevant in English, provides information about their use in sentences, and compares them with their equivalents in Uzbek.

Key words: phrasal verbs, verb, action, figurative meaning, own meaning.

The English language is rich in phrasal verbs. A phrasal verb is a group of words that functions as a verb and is made up of a verb plus a preposition, an adverb, or both. They are important in English.

It is important to learn phrasal verbs because they are very common in English, and because the meaning of a verb often changes significantly when it is used in a phrasal verb.

For example, the verb *bring* usually means to take something and go with it to a certain place, but the phrasal verb *grow up* means to become an adult or start behaving in a mature way.

The best way to learn how a phrasal verb is to look it up on dictionary and read the example sentences that show how it is used. The example sentences have been selected to illustrate the correct use of these words.

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However, phrasal verbs less appropriate in formal language. If you are writing a formal document or an academic essay, try to avoid using phrasal verbs and use more formal alternatives instead.

But, as it is mentioned above, it is very eye-catching in daily speech of English people.

Here some examples are analysed with translations in the Uzbek language.

Besides, there are some types of phrasal verbs, such as, two-word phrasal verbs, three-word phrasal verbs.

For example: A phrasal verb can do the same function with verbs, but their structure is different. The phrasal verbs like pick up, turn on or get on with. These verbs consist of a basic verb + another word or words, mostly prepositions. The two or three words that make up a phrasal verb form a short "phrase" - which is why we call them "phrasal verbs". But a phrasal verb is still a verb. For example: *Look* is a verb. Look up is also a verb - a different verb. They do not have the same meaning, and they behave differently grammatically. You should treat each phrasal verb as a separate verb, and learn it like any other verb. Look at these examples. You can see that there are three types of phrasal verb formed from a single-word verb:

To sum up, the phrasal verbs have a great role in the English language and its usage is very common in modern linguistics.
