


AfricArXiv is an online platform that publishes preprints submitted exclusively from African scientists or those whose research is relevant to the continent. It is the latest to join a small, but growing roster of science publications trying to make sure African scientists don't get left out of research publishing cycles. Preprints are drafts or complete articles that have not been peer-reviewed. They are especially useful
