


- anthropologists and sociologists study the gaps between what people say and what people do to develop wider theories of social life







The **hacker culture** is a subculture of individuals who enjoy—often in collective effort—the intellectual challenge of creatively overcoming the limitations of software systems or electronic hardware (mostly digital electronics), to achieve novel and clever outcomes.^[1] The act of engaging in activities (such as programming or other media^[2]) in a spirit of playfulness and exploration is termed *hacking*.


