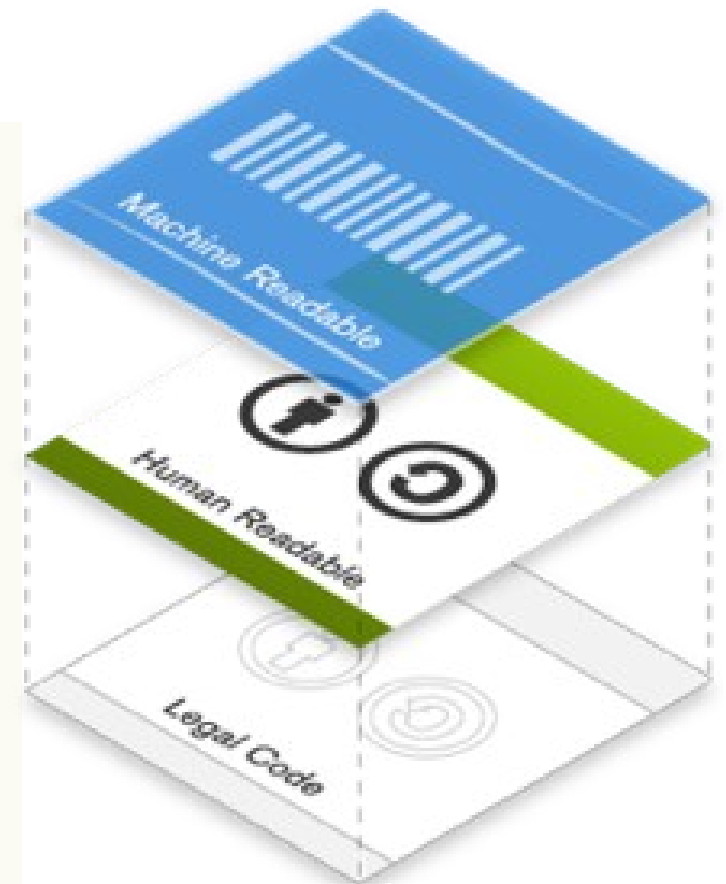

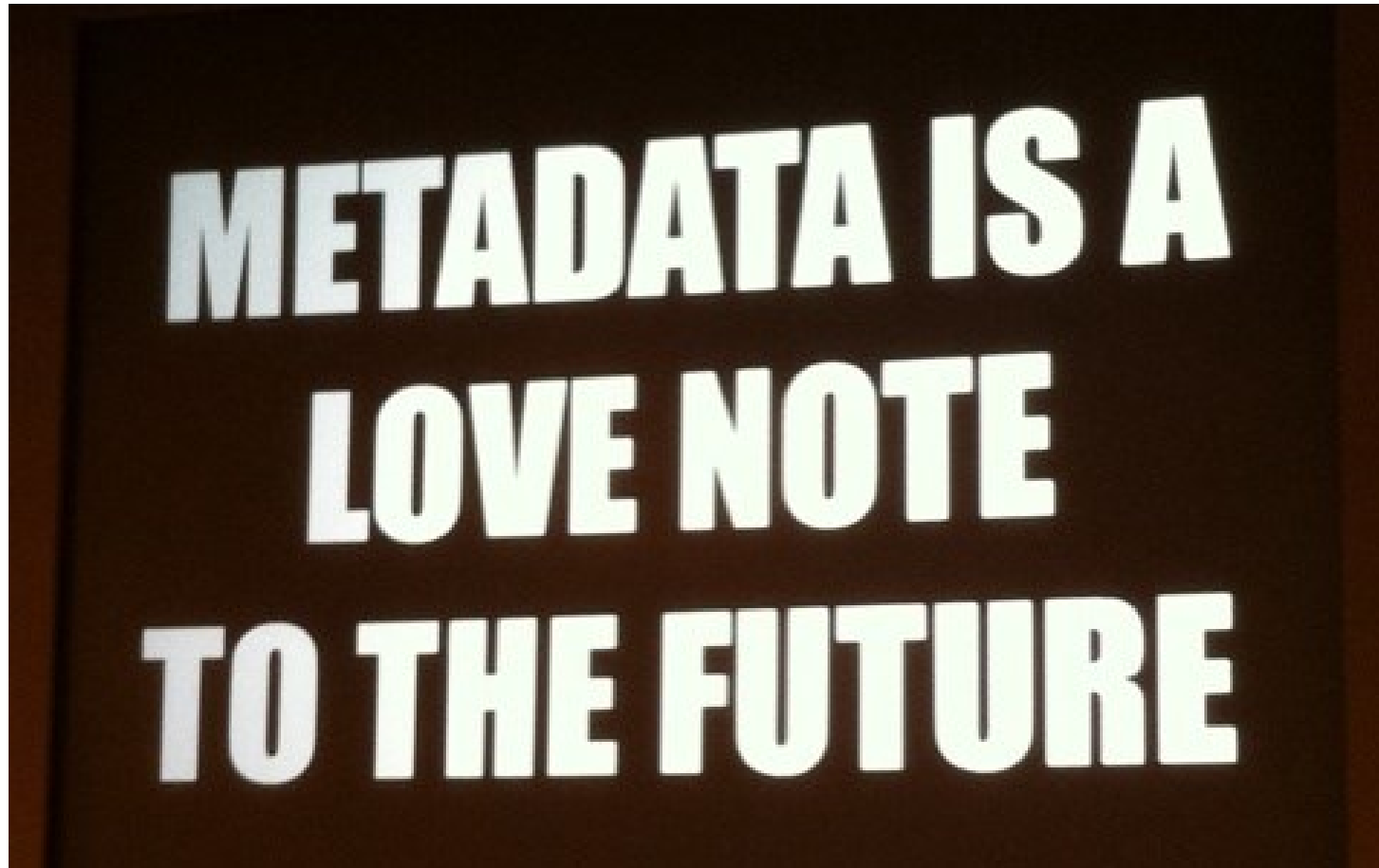

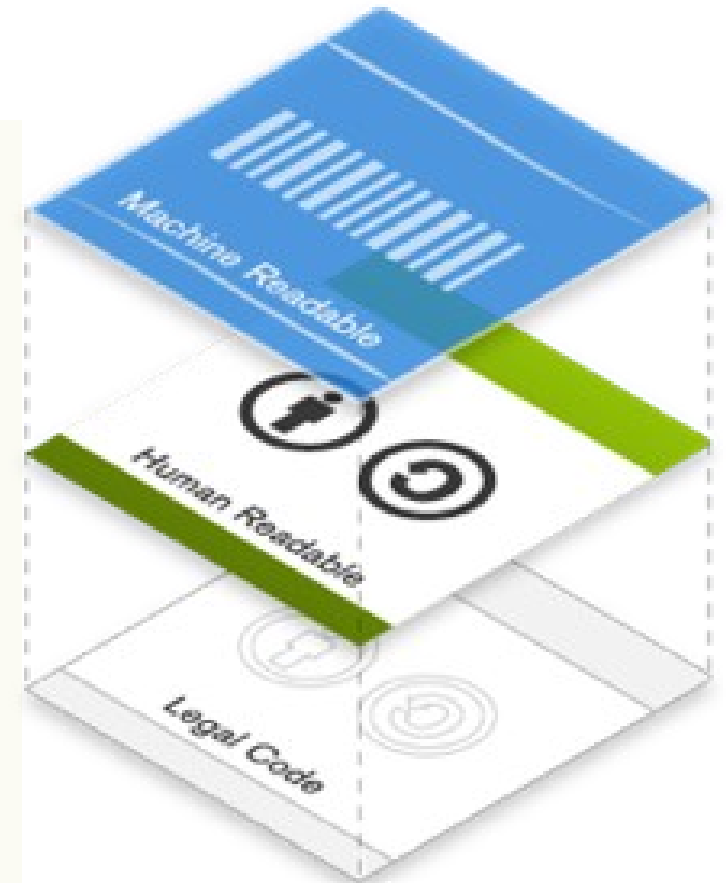

1.0 Introduction

COPIM is an international partnership of researchers, universities ([Coventry University](#); [Birkbeck, University of London](#); [Lancaster University](#); and [Trinity College, Cambridge](#)), established open access publishers (the [ScholarLed consortium](#), which includes [Mattering Press](#), [meson press](#), [Open Humanities Press](#), [Open Book Publishers](#) and [punctum books](#)), libraries ([UCSB Library](#) and [Loughborough University Library](#)) and infrastructure providers (the [Directory of Open Access Books](#) and [Jisc](#)).

In addition to the consortium members, COPIM is collaborating closely with institutions such as the [British Library](#) and the [Digital Preservation Coalition](#), and with the [OPERAS-P project](#) and the [Next Generation Library Publishing project](#), as well as a broad spectrum of academics, publishers, librarians,

Issue I: Metadata & Dissemination: smaller, non-profit, and library-based OA publishers struggle with metadata management and dissemination

- ‘Leaky pipeline’: metadata running through intermediaries often gets truncated
- Commercial solutions are expensive / not tailored to OA books > metadata often managed in custom spreadsheets
- Dissemination channels require different output formats according to different specifications > technical knowledge required is often absent, leading to lower discoverability
- Established OA book metadata from commercial vendors often of low(er) quality
- Some ‘features’ of commercial platforms include extended data tracking and corresponding surveillance practices across the web that we are convinced are *not* in the best interest of their customers
- Metadata often not openly licensed > limiting re-use and remix

Issue 2 – Archiving of small publishers’ contributions to the scholarly record: smaller, non-profit, and library-based OA publishers often lack expertise & resources with regards to archiving of their outputs.



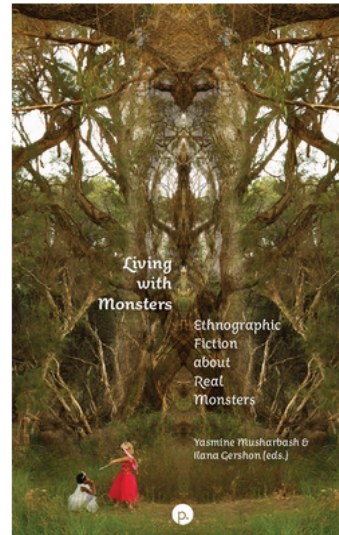
Living with Monsters: Ethnographic Fiction about Real Monsters

For every generic type of monster—ghost, demon, vampire, dragon—there are countless locally specific manifestations, with their own names, traits, and appearances. Such monsters populate all corners of the globe haunting their humans wherever they live. *Living with Monsters* is a collection of fourteen short pieces of ethnographic fiction (and a more academically inclined introduction and afterword) presenting a playful, spirited, and engaging look at how people live with their respective monsters around the world. They focus on the nitty-gritty dos and don'ts of how to placate spirits in India; how to domesticate Georgian goblins, how to live with aliens, how to avoid being taken by Anito in Taiwan, while simultaneously illuminating the politics of monster-human relations.

In this collection, anthropologists working in fieldsites as diverse as the urban Ghana, the rural US, remote Aboriginal Australia, and the internet present imaginative accounts that demonstrate how thinking with monsters encourages people to contemplate difference, to understand inequality, and to see the world from new angles. Combine monsters with experimental ethnography, and the result is a volume that crackles with creative energy, flouts traditions of ethnographic writing, and pushes anthropology into new terrains.

In *Decolonial Ecologies: The Reinvention of Natural History in Latin American Art*, Joanna Page illuminates the ways in which contemporary artists in Latin America are reinventing historical methods of collecting, organizing, and displaying nature in order to develop new aesthetic and political perspective on the past and the present.

Page brings together an entirely new corpus of artistic projects from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Mexico, and Peru that engage critically and creatively with forms as diverse as the medieval bestiary, baroque cabinets of curiosities, atlases created by European travellers to the New World, the floras and herbaria composed by eighteenth- and nineteenth-century naturalists, and the diorama designed for natural history museums. She explores how artists develop decolonial and post anthropocentric perspectives on the collections and expeditions that were central to the evolution of European natural history. Their works forge a critique of the rationalizing approach to nature taken by modern Western science, reconnecting it with forms of popular, indigenous and spiritual knowledge and experience that it has systematically excluded since the Enlightenment.

Drawing on photography, video, illustration, sculpture, and installation, this vividly illustrated and lucidly written book (also available in premium quality in hardback edition) explores how these artworks might also deconstruct the apocalyptic visions of environmental change that often dominate Western thought, developing a renewed understanding of alternative ways in which humans might co-inhabit the natural world.

Against the "one-world" orientation of much environmental criticism, Decolonial Ecologies offers a wellspring of neobaroque aesthetics: artistic interventions that challenge the schemas of natural science mobilized by European explorers and thinkers, from Pedro de Mendoza and José Celestino Mutis to Carl Linnaeus. The cosmotechnics of contemporary Latin American artists take us into an alternative Enlightenment - the age of Humboldt 2.0. To great satisfaction, we experience the resurgence of living agents and relations as they break out of the frames, cabinets and discursive parameters formalized during the Enlightenment. As Joanna Page shows, though inhuman geographies continually threaten, it is nevertheless possible to see alternative ecologies of consciousness shine through.

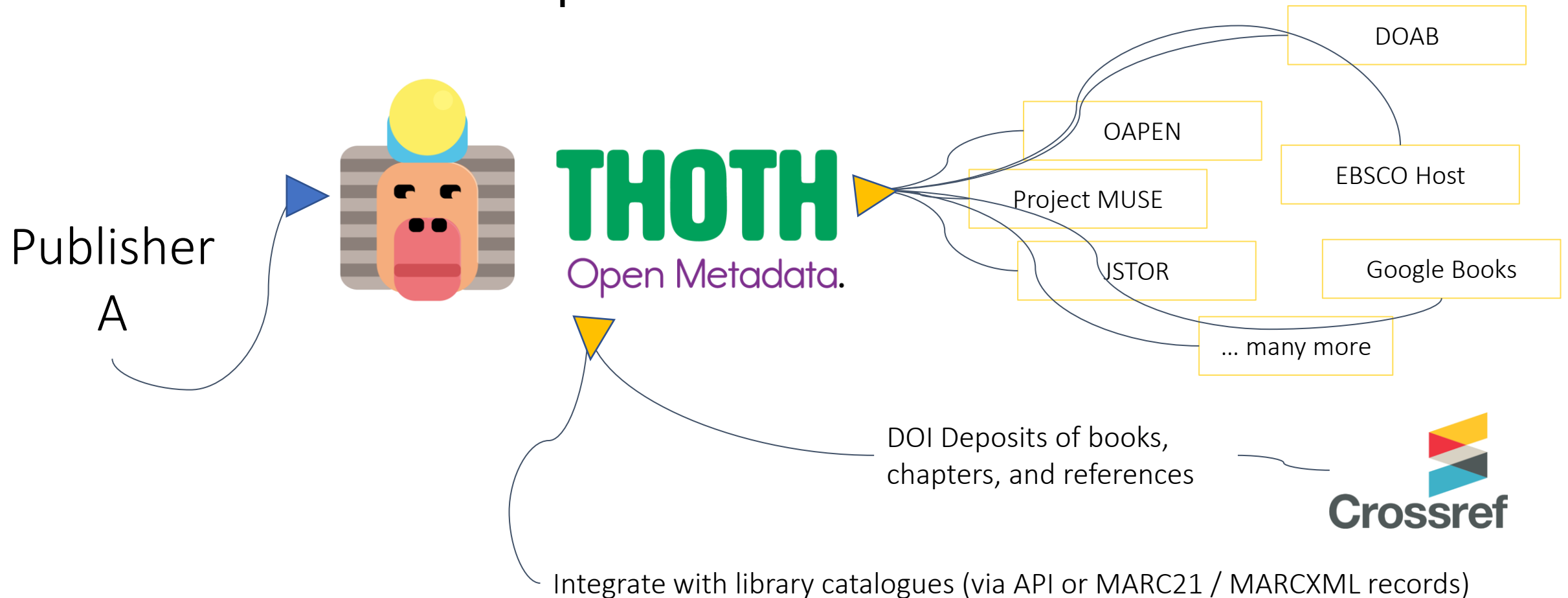

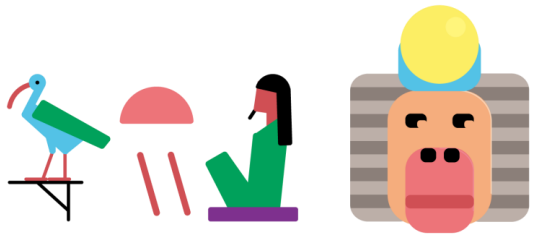
