Executive Summary

The Data Management Plan V1 describes the data that we will generate and acquire throughout the project, including how we manage, describe and store the data.

INSPIRE will strengthen existing infrastructure and provide new tools for knowledge sharing and transnational learning on gender equality in R&I, both online and offline. In order to address the project's objectives, INSPIRE will reuse existing data sources but also generate new data. Our data needs are well aligned with the research objectives, to reduce our data "footprint" to the absolute required minimum.

This data management plan provides a summary of the data that we will re-use and generate as well as a description of the types and formats of the data that we produce/ reuse. It also specifies the utility of this data beyond the consortium.

Operating within the FAIR framework we aim to make the data findable, accessible, interoperable, as well as increasing data re-use.

Data security as well as ethical principles are described.

1. Data summary

1.2 Data re-use and generation

INSPIRE will strengthen existing infrastructure and provide new tools for knowledge sharing and transnational learning on gender equality in R&I, both online and offline. In order to address the project's objectives, INSPIRE will reuse existing data sources but also generate new data. Our data needs are well aligned with the research objectives, to reduce our data "footprint" to the absolute required minimum.

Data reuse concerns first the scoping literature review as well as existing contacts and networks of the consortium partners. The scoping literature review undertaken to elaborate the 5x State-of-the-Art reports of the project will involve peer-reviewed publications and also grey literature including accumulated knowledge of institutional change (EC funded and other project reports, the GEAR tool) as well as data generated by GenderACTION+. Thus, work will consider data generated by previous literature reviews and grey literature on the key concepts relevant for INSPIRE. We will focus mainly on the English speaking literature available through major databases such as ISI Web of Science and Scopus. Partners will access data bases through their institutions' licenses. National level publications (in Member State language) will also be collected through the national expert questionnaire. Due reference to the authorship of re-used literature reviews will be provided.

In addition, data reuse is important in relation to how the INSPIRE project builds on the [ACT project](#). This takes various forms including reuse of various project outputs including the Co-creation toolkit, the community mapping survey, COP evaluation as well as the GEAM tool. Many RPOs that have implemented the GEAM survey in the past have done so in the framework of the ACT project. INSPIRE will provide support to carry out advanced analysis of GEAM results. This includes comparative statistical analysis between several institutions and comparative statistical analysis of subsequent rounds of GEAM surveys within the same institution. By default, RPOs using the GEAM survey are owners of the generated data. In order to carry out the support tasks related to advanced statistical analysis, the involved Consortium members will have access to previously generated GEAM result datasets.

A third area where we foresee to reuse existing data is the web crawler which will scrape publicly available data sources on the web (specifically publically available Gender Equality Plan documents). The web crawler will download the available text and/or pdf files in order to process them with automated text analysis tools. The downloaded data will need to be stored, processed and eventually deleted.

Consortium existing networks and Internet searches of key people from other EC gender projects, COST funds, EURAXESS or Science Europe networks, will be used to disseminate the INSPIRE activities and identify key stakeholders to invite to synergy conferences and innovation events.

INSPIRE will generate new, proprietary data across several tasks which will require explicit data protection and management. The focus in this section is on the type of data sources



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generated (not the associated task nor possible wider outcomes). Broadly speaking one can distinguish contact information (regarding actual and potential experts, CoP members, stakeholders, etc.) from research and evaluation data (such as interviews, survey questionnaire results, focus groups etc.).

Stakeholder database. INSPIRE experts + stakeholders' database includes a typology of organizations (RFO, RPO, etc.) and people (national and thematic experts, practitioners, policy makers, etc.) and strives to create a database for their future participation in project activities, from expert recruitment for each KSH (T4.1), to participation in the 1st (M11) and 2nd (M46) Conference, CoP involvement as well as policy makers, industry managers, or practitioners and trainers, some of which will go on to be INSPIRE change catalysts (T6.2). The database will also store information about the following types of R&I organisations: higher education institutions, public research performing organisations, private companies working on R&I (business enterprise sector), non-profit research organisations, and research funding organisations as well as networks and consultancies. Information stored includes names and professional contact details.

The database will be mainly but not exclusively populated by the:

- **National expert questionnaire** (Task 2.1). The questionnaire will map EU 27 national level key actors (policy makers, experts, relevant R&I organisations) for each of the four thematic hubs (Sustaining Change, Widening, Intersectionality and Innovation) as well as the topic of monitoring inclusive gender equality. All information is already in the public domain.
- **Existing consortium network contacts** and also new contacts due to INSPIRE outreach activities and dissemination events such as the INSPIRE Conferences, 3 Policy Workshops, as well as those participating in the Knowledge Exchange Events (T4.2).
- **CoP recruitment.** Each KSH will recruit and support at least 3 CoPs. CoPs admit organizational members, whose contact details will be stored in the database.
- The main INSPIRE website will offer a user registration process, as part of the service for finding/search support partner and training experts (signing up to receive the INSPIRE Newsletter, and **[registered users of the website]**).

The stakeholders' database will enable the recruitment of CoP members and provide the basis to invite participants to KSH and KSH Knowledge Exchange Events (T4.2) as well as other INSPIRE events (conferences and workshops). The corresponding datasets will be stored by the Nextcloud file sharing platform, accessible exclusively to the members of the INSPIRE Consortium.

Users that register through the INSPIRE website will be added to the stakeholder database with the choice to make their profile public on the website or not.

Research activities will generate the following data:

National expert questionnaire. A questionnaire will be filled out by each EU 27 national level expert to collect the main policy and legal developments since 2021, relevant literature, R&I



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organisations, relevant stakeholders, experts/ practitioners, training resources, potential CoPs. This data will feed into the literature review (Task 2.1) as well as the stakeholder database (Task 2.2). The questionnaire of the survey will be made available online via the LimeSurvey installation administered by Notus.

Focus groups for indicator development. 4 focus groups are organised with experts/ users to provide feedback to an early draft of indicators and a transfer strategy to other contexts and languages. The focus groups will be audio recorded, and transcribed; transcriptions will be produced along with a report summarizing the main insights of each focus group.

GEP monitoring survey data. INSPIRE will set up an online survey tool. The questionnaire of the survey will be made available online via Unipark (<https://www.unipark.com/en/>). The installation will be administered and hosted by Unipark at the Tivian server center in Frankfurt/Main. This BSI-certified data center is subject to extremely stringent data protection and security standards pursuant to ISO 27001 and on the basis of IT-Grundschutz (German IT baseline protection standard). The questionnaire of the survey and the data will be made available through Zenodo.

Web crawler. INSPIRE will develop a web crawling tool to scrape public data available on the Internet. Downloaded text and files will be processed and analysed to determine the prevalence and characteristics of Gender Equality Plans. The software for crawling and Natural Language Process of the data will be released on the INSPIRE Github repository from the very start and continuously updated. The results of the web crawl in form of blocks and parts of the analysed documents (not the whole documents) will be made available via Zenodo.

Case studies. Different case studies will be carried out in tasks T3.3 GEP impact, T3.4 Exploring Equality-Diversity-Inclusion Policies and T3.6 Gender sensitive innovation policy. Case studies will include approximately 340 interviews with stakeholders to enable us to gather qualitative, in-depth data to analyse a) factors for GEP success and failure, b) intersectional policies in organisations and c) promising practice policy instruments on gendered (regional) innovation policy. Interviews will be recorded and transcribed, transcripts will be analysed using relevant N-vivo, Atlas-ti or MaxQDA software.

Gender Equality Audit and Monitoring (GEAM) survey. INSPIRE will build on the GEAM tool developed in the ACT project, a modular questionnaire framework by developing two new modules, one for students and one for the private sector. Data generated with this survey tool will be used by supported CoPs- institutional members as well as other organisations external to the INSPIRE project to measure and benchmark progress towards gender equality and GEP's implementation within their institutions as well as institutions not forming part of CoPs. Data ownership lies with the organisations using the GEAM; however, FUOC hosts the LimeSurvey platform – and hence the data – used for conducting the GEAM surveys.

Support activities will generate the following data:

CoP needs assessment: KSH support partners will be provided with a short list of questions they should discuss with their CoPs and each KSH support partner will develop a short protocol of the discussion.



Co-creation translation: Research to Practice. 4 x co-creation workshops will be carried out with approximately 20-30 participants. Summary reports of the workshops will be produced.

Support packages pilot and evaluation: Support packages will be designed, developed, piloted and evaluated the subsequent data generated may take various forms including a short questionnaire and summary documents.

Workshops and conferences: The policy workshops, including the reimagining workshop as well as the conferences will generate a range of data including written summaries (blogposts), photos and videos.

Based upon these data sources and other material (scientific literature, EU-funded project reports, etc.) the INSPIRE Consortium, the four KSHs and participating CoP members will produce the outcomes described in the Grant Agreement, including project deliverables, two open access books, open training units and support packages, videos, summary reports of conferences, workshops and dissemination events. Each partner will be responsible for the data they collect. Detailed informed consent procedures as well as authorization protocols for usage of images/ video material will be used (see sections 5. Ethical aspects and Annexes).

1.2 What types and formats of data will the project generate or re-use?

The INSPIRE project will generate/ collect different types of data, including observational and theoretical data:

- Quantitative: numerical data generated with the online surveys (GEP prevalence survey, and GEAM), GEP prevalence web crawling. Quantitative data will also be available through the web traffic analysis of the project main sites (main website, GEAM site, CoP support sites).
- Qualitative: text, images, and sound/ video recordings. Text and photographs will be collected and generated in project activities such as the literature review to elaborate the state-of-the-art, and the reports of workshops, project meetings, and conferences. Semi-structured interviews (carried out in the case studies aim to evaluate success factors for GEP impact, EDI interventions and innovation policies) and focus groups (to refine indicator development) will be sound recorded and transcripts produced whereas interviews with GE experts to produce high impact videos will be video recorded.

With regards to the formats of the data, the project will assume the principle of using commonly used formats for the sake of compatibility, efficiency and access:

- The preferred means of data formats is MS Office and LibreOffice compatible files, where applicable.



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- Public reports will be made available in PDF format and uploaded to Zenodo and GenPORT.
- Databases of stakeholders' contacts will be stored in XLS format.
- For statistical purposes, other formats include dta (STATA), RData (R) and .SAV (SPSS).
- Data and metadata will be transferred and stored in CVS format.
- Images and photographs of meetings, workshops and events will be collected in JPG or PNG formats.

For audio and video recordings of interviews, preferred formats include: MP3, MP4, WMA, AVI, MOV.

1.3 Expected size of the data

Whilst we cannot predict with a reliable degree of accuracy the exact size of the data that we will generate we can safely predict it will be in the mega-bite to giga-bite range.

Data derived from the GEP online prevalence survey and the GEAM audits is unknown but is unlikely to exceed 10 MB. The size of the data gathered by the GEP web crawler will be in the GB range, as thousands of files need to be downloaded and analysed (once analysed they will be deleted).

The server capacity to host the INSPIRE Community Platform includes 300 GB of web space, which is estimated to widely cover INSPIRE and CoPs storage and files sharing needs. With regards to audio and video recordings, they consist in approx. 350 interviews and 4 focus groups that will be sound recorded (and subsequently transcribed and eventually deleted) to evaluate success factors for GEP impact, EDI interventions and innovation policies.

Various interviews will be video recorded and this data will be edited and summarized in 10 high impact videos (approx. 10 minutes duration each). Interview recordings and its related summaries, as well as the reports and deliverables generated during the INSPIRE activities, are not expected to be big files (from 200 KB to 100 MB), as the duration of interviews/focus groups is 60-90 minutes maximum, and report documents will include text or compressed image formats. For a detailed description of how audio and video recordings will be stored and other provisions for data security see section 5. Data security).

1.4 Origin/provenance of the data, either generated or re-used?

The main methods of data gathering include:

Online survey platform. INSPIRE will use the already installed and adapted Open Source LimeSurvey (<http://www.limesurvey.org>). LimeSurvey is the leading Open Source online survey platform. The platform will be connected to the INSPIRE Community Platform hosted on a private virtual server managed by cdmon.es in a Spanish data centre, through a shared credential management system. It will host the National questionnaire, and the GEAM surveys. The GEP prevalence survey will be administered and hosted via Unipark.



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- The INSPIRE online platform is a Content Management System that integrates a user registration/ management module. The CMS is based upon Drupal (<http://www.drupal.org>).
- Audio recording and transcriptions of 1-to-1 semi-structured interviews, and focus groups. Consortium members responsible for conducting the interviews or leading the focus groups will record the responses/ discussions either by smart-phone or dedicated recording devices. Audio recordings will be used for preparing anonymous transcripts of interviews and focus groups' results.
- Online registration through web forms in the INSPIRE and CoPs websites, used for registering participation in the INSPIRE workshops, conferences, co-creation events, knowledge exchange forums.
- Notes and minutes taken during workshops and events will be used for writing summary reports.
- Literature search will use online databases of peer-reviewed articles and 'grey literature' (reports and deliverables from FP7 and H2020 institutional change projects) to elaborate the INSPIRE state-of-the-art.
- Website traffic and other data regarding the Community Platform indicators will be collected through analytics tools such as Google Analytics.

1.5 Data utility: beyond the consortium

The overall social benefits of data gathering by the INSPIRE project include a) improved transnational learning on inclusive gender equality knowledge and practices in R&I, b) better understanding of how gender issues from an intersectional perspective influence the quality of R&I processes and science knowledge-making, and c) a more systematic and systemic adoption of best tools and practices for the implementation of gender equality plans. Data analysis represented in the form of project outputs (not raw data) will be of use beyond the consortium in the following ways:

The INSPIRE **state-of-the-art** will be useful to the KSHs (including experts external to the consortium), the CoPs of the project (largely made up from R&I organisations beyond the consortium) and to any researcher or organisation interested in inclusive gender equality in research and innovation. It will also be of interest to policymakers in this field.

The data generated from the 4 **focus groups** could be of interest to researchers and organisations working to improve measurement scales and instruments for monitoring the prevalence and impact of (inclusive) GEPs.

Data resulting from the **GEP prevalence survey and web crawler** will be relevant to a) the individuals participating in the survey (that can have an overview of other institutions); b) research funding organisations and national and European level policy makers interested to map and analyse EU Members States' progress towards implementation of (inclusive) gender equality in R&I; c) researchers interested in the impact of gender equality policies on a European level; d) gender equality practitioners and activists interested in automatic monitoring of gender equality indicators.



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Data resulting from **GEAM audits** will be useful to a) research organisations implementing GEPs and interested in benchmarking and learning about best practices; b) researchers interested in monitoring gender equality in R&I, or interested in CoP approaches and practices for institutional change; c) research funding organisations and policy makers interested to map and analyse EU Members States' progress towards implementation of gender equality in R&I. It will also be of interest to those participating in INSPIRE CoPs, who will be able to benchmark their advances in GE practices and to learn how they could improve their collaboration regarding gender equality.

Data resulting from the **case studies** (GEP success, EDI policies and Gender Sensitive Innovation Policy) will be relevant to R&I organisations as well as the private sector who aim to sustain a comprehensive change programme. This does not mean that they will have access to the raw data –but they will have access to the analysis of the data as presented in research outputs.

Summary reports and blogposts of face-to-face workshops, knowledge exchange events and conferences will be useful to: a) workshop/ event participants, KSH members, as well as CoP members, who will have a summary of the topics discussed and conclusions of the sessions; b) researchers and organisations establishing a CoP or interested in benchmarking and learning about best practices regarding GE in R&I; c) research funding organisations and policy makers interested to map and analyse EU Members States' progress towards implementation of gender equality measures in R&I.

2. FAIR data

2.1 Making data findable, including provisions for metadata

Data is made findable through the use of unique identifiers as well as keywords for deliverables, the use of metadata schemes as well as commonly used file naming conventions to ease finding data for consortium members.

The INSPIRE project will share data via the project website <https://www.inspirequality.eu/> as well as via the Open Access (OA) repository Zenodo (<http://www.zenodo.org>), which is the recommended repository by the EU OpenAIRE initiative, hosted at CERN. In the INSPIRE Community Platform, shareable results (analysed data) will be published with a link to the file or data set included in the resources repository of GenPORT and its public identifier in Zenodo. An INSPIREquality Zenodo profile has been created linked to the email address: info@inspirequality.eu

GenPORT hosts an elaborate metadata scheme for gender and science resources. Resources uploaded to GenPORT will be cross-referenced with the DOI identifier from the corresponding Zenodo entry. Metadata of each record is indexed and searchable directly in Zenodo's search



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engine immediately after publishing. Metadata of each record is sent to DataCite servers during DOI registration and indexed there. Zenodo's metadata is compliant with DataCite's Metadata Schema minimum and recommended terms, with a few additional enrichments. All metadata is stored internally in Zenodo in JSON-format according to a defined JSON schema. Metadata is exported in several standard formats such as MARCXML, Dublin Core, and DataCite Metadata Schema (according to the OpenAIRE Guidelines). Specific keywords are included in each deliverable to ease findability and optimize data retrieval.

As well as Zenodo metadata – INSPIRE deliverables will also use the community-developed and validated **metadata scheme** of GenPORT. This metadata scheme, validated with diverse stakeholders, provides a knowledge structure on key issues in gender and science while offering a shared language for facilitating dialogue across Europe. The Gender & Science Taxonomy is available in existing SKOS standards and downloadable as RDF files written in XLM format for connecting with similar knowledge portals/sites as well as libraries (see 2.3 Making data interoperable)¹.

2.1.1 File naming conventions

All files will be identified with a code starting by “INSPIRE”. Deliverables furthermore contain a “D” followed by the deliverable number, the title, and date in format DDMMMYYYY. Deliverables that have been submitted to the EC are marked by a “submitted” keyword. All elements are separated with underscore.

Apart from the “INSPIRE” identifier, other high level identifiers concern the different KSHs and the CoPs. In order to associate materials with a specific KSH or CoP, each KSH and CoP will use a short acronym that will identify its results. The KSH acronym will be created during the KSH set up process. The CoP acronym will be created during the CoP setup process. These acronyms will be clearly visible on the website and provide a unique identifier of all materials specific to a particular KSH/CoP.

File names contain the date, indicating the most recent edit. The date should indicate the month in a three letter abbreviation and not numbers, in order to avoid ambiguities regarding the format MM/DD or DD/MM. Thus, we recommend indicating the last edit in format DDMMMYYYY (e.g., “12JUL2018”). In case it is necessary to distinguish different versions of a file edited on the same day, a letter will be added to the date indicating the last edit in alphabetical order (e.g., “12JUL2023a”, “12JUL2023b”, etc.).

We will not use a file version numbering because it is somehow arbitrary. Files' names will indicate nevertheless if a file has been submitted to the EC or not. A submitted file will therefore contain in its file name the keyword “submitted”. Since files can be updated after submission, the date will indicate again the most recent version.

INSPIRE relies on several tasks that are distributed among partners and CoP members, although the results will be summarized in a central fashion. For these distributed tasks, it is important to follow specific naming conventions by all participating partners in order to make

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contributions traceable. The file naming conventions followed to identify different data types associated to tasks such as focus groups or interviews is detailed in Table 1 (see below).

Partners will, therefore, create their own contact XLS files in the context of specific, local tasks while the project coordinator will maintain a centralized address database. The file naming conventions are as follows (see Table 1 below).

2.1.2. Stakeholders database

Finally, the project will collect e-mail addresses and contact information at several points during its execution (Task 2.2). The EU 27 National Expert Questionnaire (T2.1) will produce part of this data, as will the dissemination activities related to conferences or workshops (see section D1.1 Data collection/ generation purposes and its relation to the INSPIRE project). Contact information will be stored in password protected XLS files containing a minimal number of fields. Using a minimal set of shared contact fields is important in order to allow for a distributed system where partners can create and maintain their “local” contact data files – to be used for example in the context of organizing a national workshop – while allowing for merging of these local contact files into a unique master file that can be used for global, coordinated dissemination activities. This information will not be made public.

2.2 Making data accessible

INSPIRE will produce public and private deliverables. We will include into all deliverables alt-text for all images and graphics to enable users with vision impairment to understand the information the image is trying to convey. A truly accessible PDF contains alt-text for images and all deliverables will be properly tagged. Public deliverables will be accessible through EC services such as Cordis but also on the project website, (www.inspirequality.eu) on GenPORT and through the INSPIRE account at Zenodo (<http://www.zenodo.org>). Deliverables will be published in Zenodo and project website will include the DOI – for enhanced data preservation. The INSPIRE Community Platform (comprised of the INSPIRE website as well as the GenPORT repository) will allow users to search files, resources, and posts through keywords related to the INSPIRE state-of-the-art and also to the specific search content (policies, law, practices, publications, tools, results).

Section 2.1 of this document explains how our data is assigned an identifier – which will not only make the data findable but also accessible. Zenodo assigns publicly available uploads a Digital Object Identifier (DOI) to make the upload easily, persistently identifiable and uniquely citeable.

As specified in section 2.1 metadata for uploaded resources is available either through Zenodo or GenPORT.



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The community-developed and validated **metadata scheme** of GenPORT will be the base for describing content in the INSPIRE Community Platform. The Gender & Science Taxonomy is available in existing SKOS standards and downloadable as RDF files written in XLM format, for connecting with similar knowledge portals/sites as well as libraries.

Not all data will be openly available. Written transcripts (psuedonymised), audios of semi-structured interviews and focus groups will be as well as survey data will not be shared beyond the consortium. In fact, this data will only be shared within the consortium in a limited way, i.e. with those partners that really need it to fulfil their tasks set out in the grant agreement. Survey data will be made anonymous by the project partner responsible for data collection before sharing with consortium partners whilst interview transcripts will be psuedonymised before sharing.

Raw data in the form of written transcripts, audios as well as survey data will not be shared beyond the consortium – but the analysis of these in the form of the deliverables and open access publications will be fully accessible. Complete documents (GEPs) analysed through the web crawl will not be made available.

2.3 Making data interoperable

Data is made interoperable primarily through the use of two metadata vocabularies, Zenodo and GenPORT. Metadata use a formal, accessible, shared, and broadly applicable language for knowledge representation. Zenodo will ensure that data is interoperable. Zenodo uses JSON Schema as internal representation of metadata and offers export to other popular formats such as Dublin Core or MARCXML. (Meta)data use vocabularies that follow FAIR principles. For certain terms we refer to open, external vocabularies, e.g.: license (Open Definition), funders (FundRef) and grants (OpenAIRE). Each referenced external piece of metadata is qualified by a resolvable URL. (See 2.2 for brief description of how the Gender & Science taxonomy of GenPORT facilitates interoperability).

2.4 Increase data re-use

In accordance with good scientific practice the process of data analysis will be documented in the methodology section of relevant outputs, i.e., deliverables, articles, publications, etc. This will include variable definitions, units of measurement etc. The provenance of all data will be thoroughly documented using the appropriate standards and reported in the relevant deliverables and outputs.

Zenodo will encourage data re-use in the following ways:

- (meta)data are richly described with a plurality of accurate and relevant attributes. Each record contains a minimum of DataCite's mandatory terms, with optionally additional DataCite recommended terms and Zenodo's enrichments.
- (meta)data are released with a clear and accessible data usage license. A license is one of the mandatory terms in Zenodo's metadata and refers to an Open



Definition license. We will use the CC-BY license recommended by the European Commission.

- Data downloaded by the users is subject to the license specified in the metadata by the uploader.
- (meta)data are associated with detailed provenance. All data and metadata uploaded is traceable to a registered Zenodo user. Metadata can optionally describe the original authors of the published work.
- (meta)data meet domain-relevant community standards Zenodo is not a domain-specific repository, yet through compliance with DataCite's Metadata Schema, metadata meets one of the broadest cross-domain standards available.

3. Other research outputs

Other research outputs that may be generated or re-used throughout the project include:

- GEP prevalence monitoring indicator framework
- Open training units – will include high impact videos
- Collection of support packages
- Policy briefs
- Software scripts

As these “other” research outputs are also project deliverables, the FAIR data standards will provide the relevant management framework. These other research outputs will be findable as they will be assigned a persistent identifier, given keywords, assigned metadata, will follow file naming conventions (for consortium members). They will also be accessible as they will be uploaded to various websites/ repositories including the www.inspirequality.eu website as well as the GenPORT and Zenodo repositories whilst being available through Cordis. Videos will be additionally uploaded to an INSPIRE channel on Youtube / Vimeo and assigned relevant keywords. The re-use of these resources will be encouraged through the assignment of metadata.

4. Allocation of resources

Whilst the direct costs associated to the described mechanisms to make the data FAIR and long term preserved are not substantial we will detail these in the following section. The person/month resources budgeted in the project include the staff effort required for making data FAIR and guaranteeing data security.

- 6000€ are budgeted for contracting the virtual server that hosts the INSPIRE main website and services, including the NextCloud files sharing application for the duration of the project. This hosting will be kept at least for 5 years after the end of the project with the project website. The virtual server is hosted by INNO.



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- The GenPORT and LimeSurvey platform is hosted by a provider contracted by FUOC. The cost of the yearly server is approx. 1500 Euros.
- The Unipark platform is included in the yearly GESIS licence.
- Finally, the project has budgeted a total of 24,000€ distributed over 2 different partners (FUOC and UH) for publishing OA books.

FUOC, as project coordinator, has the responsibility for the DMP general coordination and supervision. All institutions in the INSPIRE Consortium will follow these management guidelines and each partner executing tasks that involve the collection and processing of personal data will be responsible, as **data controllers**, that all personal data collection and processing is carried out according to EU and national legislation (see further details in section 5. Data security).

For long term preservation of datasets and publications, we will use the Open Access (OA) repository Zenodo (see 2.1 Making data findable), the recommended repository by the EU OpenAIRE initiative, hosted at CERN, which is free of charge. The period of retention is currently equivalent to the lifetime of the repository defined by the lifetime of the host laboratory CERN, which currently has an experimental programme planned for at least until 2043.

5. Data security

The following provisions are in place in order to assure that data collected during the project will be kept secure and protected against unauthorized access:

- The Nextcloud solution is open source and has been audited by the NCC Group. The review against the control Clause 14 of ISO27001 'Security in Development and Support processes' was done in 2016 and can be downloaded from the Nextcloud site (<https://nextcloud.com/secure/>). Since Nextcloud is an on-premise service, Nextcloud GmbH has at no time access to the data stored on the server. Nextcloud also provides event logging, backup tools, fine-grained access control to files via groups, and the secure sharing of links by using passwords and expiration dates. Nextcloud uses industry-standard SSL/TLS encryption for data in transfer.
- The **INSPIRE Community Platform** will contain:
 - the INSPIRE website (<https://www.inspirequality.eu/>), is administered by INNO and hosted on a virtual server managed by <https://www.hetzner.com/> - a German Data Center
A PHP based MySQL database was created for the project data related to the Nextcloud installation and Ruby on Rails, Angular for the OpenProject installation, and both hosted by Hetzner Online GmbH, a DIN ISO/IEC



27001 certified company with an established Information Security Management System (ISMS). The data center of Hetzner Online is located in Nuremberg, Germany and is highly secure. The premises are under 24/7 video surveillance and access is exclusively via electronic access control terminals with a transponder key and admission card only. Network security is ensured by multiple redundant connections to DE-CIX and Juniper Networks routers with an automatic DDoS protection system.

- In-GenPORT (<https://genderportal.eu/>) is managed by FUOC on a virtual server hosted by cdmon.es in Spain.
- The LimeSurvey platform for carrying out GEAM audits and national expert level survey is hosted on a virtual server managed by cdmon.es in Spain. Only the platform administrator and the survey administrator for each institution/ survey have access to their GEAM installation and the data generated. Unipark, the platform for carrying out the GEP prevalence survey is hosted on at the Tivian server center in Frankfurt, which is reliably protected against third-party access. This BSI-certified data center is subject to extremely stringent data protection and security standards pursuant to ISO 27001 and on the basis of IT-Grundschutz (German IT baseline protection standard). Only the survey administrator at GESIS has access to the survey installation and the data generated.
- Both sites that comprise the INSPIRE platform are **certified with secure protocols (SSL)** that ensure encryption mechanisms to allow the secure transmission of data over the network. Online surveys data will be kept in the server until 4 months maximum after the end of the corresponding survey closing date. After this period, data will be deleted from the server.
- Audios of research activities such as **semi-structured interviews and focus groups (MP3 files)** as well as interview transcripts will be stored by relevant partners responsible for carrying out the activity in secure folders at their institutional servers. The **secure folders will be encrypted**, so that even if the folder files are accessed by others its content will be protected. Responsible partners will ensure that audio recordings are erased from recording devices once they have been saved on the secure storage (within 48 hours' time after carrying out the interview/focus group). They will also make sure that files are erased from download and trash folders. Personal data and contact details of interviewees and FG participants will be kept in separated password protected files.
- **Transcripts** of semi-structured interviews and focus groups, which contain only pseudonymised, data, can be shared via the INSPIRE Cloud in NextCloud. Transcripts will be protected in addition with a password.
- Files containing **personal data related to online surveys, interview or focus groups' participants**, or information that might enable these data to be linked to persons' names, will be included in password-protected XLS files and stored on a



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secure folder in their institutional server or in a separate area of the INSPIRE Cloud that will be only accessible to relevant consortium partners. Therefore, files containing codes/pseudonyms will be kept separately and only relevant task leaders/ consortium partners will have access to protected files with sensitive data.

- All the above data will be retained for 10 years at most and then deleted.
- **Contact data of participants** in workshops and dissemination activities will be included in the stakeholder database, stored on the INSPIRE Cloud.
- **Dedicated video interviews** with experts and other participants in INSPIRE project activities that have been conducted for dissemination purposes can be stored on the INSPIRE Nextcloud platform. Interview partners will have signed corresponding informed consent sheets, that authorise INSPIRE to make use of the material for dissemination purposes.

Open Access research data in aggregated form, public deliverables, scientific publications and the pre-print version of scientific articles will be stored for long term preservation in the OA repository Zenodo (<http://www.zenodo.org>) that is safely stored in CERN Data Center. These data will be also included on GenPORT and INSPIRE websites.

Zenodo preserves the longevity of the data in the following ways:

- Versions: Data files are versioned. Records are not versioned. The uploaded data is archived as a Submission Information Package. Derivatives of data files are generated, but original content is never modified. Records can be retracted from public view; however, the data files and record are preserved.
- Replicas: All data files are stored in CERN Data Centres, primarily Geneva, with replicas in Budapest. Data files are kept in multiple replicas in a distributed file system, which is backed up to tape on a nightly basis.
- Retention period: Items will be retained for the lifetime of the repository. This is currently the lifetime of the host laboratory CERN, which currently has an experimental programme defined for the next 20 years at least.
- Functional preservation: Zenodo makes no promises of usability and understandability of deposited objects over time.
- File preservation: Data files and metadata are backed up nightly and replicated into multiple copies in the online system.
- Fixity and authenticity: All data files are stored along with a MD5 checksum of the file content. Files are regularly checked against their checksums to assure that file content remains constant.



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- Succession plans: In case of closure of the repository, best efforts will be made to integrate all content into suitable alternative institutional and/or subject based repositories.ⁱ <https://about.zenodo.org/policies/>

It also guarantees the security of the data in the following ways:

- CERN Data Centre: The data centres are located on CERN premises and all physical access is restricted to a limited number of staff with appropriate training and who have been granted access in line with their professional duties (e.g. Zenodo staff do not have physical access to the CERN Data Centre).
- Servers: Our servers are managed according to the CERN Security Baseline for Servers, meaning e.g., remote access to our servers are restricted to Zenodo staff with appropriate training, and the operating system and installed applications are kept updated with latest security patches via our automatic configuration management system Puppet.
- Network: CERN Security Team runs both host and network-based intrusion detection systems and monitors the traffic flow, pattern and contents into and out of CERN networks in order to detect attacks. All access to zenodo.org happens over HTTPS, except for static documentation pages which are hosted on GitHub Pages.
- Data: Zenodo stores user passwords using strong cryptographic password hashing algorithms (currently PBKDF2+SHA512). Users' access tokens to GitHub and ORCID are stored encrypted and can only be decrypted with the application's secret key.
- Application: They employ a suite of techniques to protect sessions from being stolen by an attacker when logged in and run vulnerability scans against the application.
- Staff: CERN staff with access to user data operate under [CERN Operational Circular no. 5](#), meaning among other things that
 - staff should not exchange among themselves information acquired unless it is expressly required for the execution of their duties.
 - access to user data must always be consistent with the professional duties and only permitted for resolution of problems, detection of security issues, monitoring of resources and similar.
 - staff are liable for damage resulting from any infringement and can have access withdrawn and/or be subject to disciplinary or legal proceedings depending on seriousness of the infringement.ⁱⁱ



6. Ethics

As stated in the grant agreement: Ethics forms a fundamental strand of INSPIRE's aim to advance knowledge on inclusive gender equality plan (GEP) implementation throughout Europe.

INSPIRE will collect information from and about individuals, mostly through interviews, and surveys for the purposes of achieving the project's objectives. INSPIRE will involve ethical issues relating to the involvement of human participants as volunteers, for the collection of personal experiences and data during the project's implementation. Specific ethical issues may also include the dissemination of images of adult people participating in the project activities. Participation will be strictly voluntary, and individuals will have the right to choose not to participate or to withdraw at any point. The project will be developed under the supervision of the UOC's Ethics Committee which was created by the University's Governing Council. The Ethics Committee works on behalf of the academic community and research staff in order to guarantee that projects adhere to strict standards in terms of the ethics of participation (including anonymity and voluntary participation) and data protection. The Committee meets the codes of ethics, international agreements and declarations, and relevant EU legislations in force in this area (i.e., the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union). UOC's Ethics Committee will supervise the project regards ethical issues.

(See the ethical guide included as annex 1).

6.1 Ethics Principles

The INSPIRE project will be carried out in compliance with the ethical standards of Horizon Europe and the principles of research integrity contained in Article 19- Regulation (EU) 2021/695 establishing Horizon Europe. INSPIRE will comply with ethical principles and relevant Union, national and international legislation, including the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union and the European Convention on Human rights and its Supplementary Protocols. Guiding principle for the work to be conducted is:

- the principle of proportionality
- the right to privacy
- the right to the protection of personal data
- the right to the physical and mental integrity of a person
- the right to non-discrimination
- the need to ensure protection of the environment
- the need to ensure high levels of human health protection

INSPIRE will be carried out in line with the highest ethical standards and the applicable EU, international and national law on ethical principles. All INSPIRE partners commit to and ensure the basic respect of EU values (such as respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and human rights including the rights of minorities), regardless of the country in which the project is carried out.



Other EU legislation regulating ethical principles in research and the use of personal data that the INSPIRE consortium has considered includes:

- The Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU;
- Directive 95/46/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 24 October 1995 on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data and on the free movement of such data;
- Directive 2009/136/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 25 November 2009 amending Directive 2002/22/EC on universal service and users' rights relating to electronic communications networks and services;
- Directive 2002/58/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 12 July 2002 concerning the processing of personal data and the protection of privacy in the electronic communications sector (Directive on privacy and electronic communications);
- Directive 2006/24/EC of 15 March 2006 on the retention of data generated or processed in connection with the provision of publicly available electronic communications services or of public communications networks.

At the Spanish level, the following legislation on data protection is added, as the project coordinator is a Spanish organisation:

- Royal Legislative Decree 1720/2007, of December 21, which approves the Regulations for the development of Organic Law 15/1999, of December 13;
- Organic Law 15/1999, of December 13, on the Protection of Personal Data. DEROGADA por Ley Orgánica 3/2018, de 5 de diciembre;
- de Protección de Datos Personales y garantía de los derechos digitales;
- Regulation (EU) 2016/679 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 27 April 2016 on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data and the free movement of such data and repealing Directive 95/46 / EC (Regulation general of data protection).

The relevant information on data protection in Argentina, the non-EU and non-EEA partner participating in the consortium, is the "Regulatory Decree of Law 25.326 on the Protection of Personal Data".

6.2 Informed consent and participants' rights

INSPIRE will select the most appropriate instruments both in terms of the objectives of the research tasks and the (minimal) burden for the participants in all research, ensuring data privacy. All matters related to the dignity of participants will be monitored throughout the project. Throughout the duration of the project specific attention will be paid to involving the participants in a way that maintains security, privacy and confidentiality and respects the common values of autonomy, independence, beneficence, nonmaleficence and justice.

Regards Informed Consent: For Informed Consent, INSPIRE will use a written form, for signing, based on guidance as provided in relevant EC documentation to get consent from the



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participants to quote their answers for data collection purposes (see Annex 2). The forms will be accompanied by information sheets including a description of the aims, methods and implications of the activity. All informed consent forms and information sheets referred will be provided in a language and in terms fully understandable to the reader, where necessary (e.g., in the case of illiteracy or visual impairment) the text of the consent form will be read out loud by the project member. The forms will include the right of participants to:

- Know that participation is voluntary;
- Ask questions and receive understandable answers before making a decision;
- Know the degree of risk and burden involved in participation;
- Know who will benefit from participation;
- Withdraw themselves and their data from the project at any time;
- Know how their data will be collected, protected during the project and destroyed at the end.

Moreover, in all cases defined by law, copies of approvals or notifications by the competent local/ national authorities will be gathered prior to the process of collecting any personal data. When applying for approval or notification from the competent local/ national Ethics Committees/ authority, clear and detailed information will be provided on the source of the personal data to be used, detailed information will be provided on the procedures that will be used for the recruitment of participants (e.g., number of participants, inclusion/ exclusion criteria, direct/ indirect incentives for participation, the risks and benefits for the participants, etc.) and the nature of the material that will be collected.

6.3 Informed Voluntary Participants and Data Protection

INSPIRE will follow privacy by design principles from the beginning of all work, following the strict application of the EU General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) on data protection and privacy. These regulations will be INSPIRE's guide for the design of all its work. The legitimacy of data collection and processing within the scope and activities of INSPIRE will be highly respected. All participants who agree to participate will be provided with an information sheet describing their privacy and data protection rights along with a brief description of the project activities. They will also be informed about which information is being collected and how this information will be used, processed and stored along with the respective retention periods. Data gathered will be anonymised, and securely stored in conjunction with the guidelines described herein. Data will be retained for 10 years and then deleted. In addition, INSPIRE will follow the Conditions on Data Erasure (article 17) and Privacy by Design (article 23) of the GPPR and the Right to be Forgotten.

As detailed above (see 1.1 Data collection/generation purposes), the INSPIRE project will collect personal information principally for project management purposes, that is contact details such as persons' names, professional role, email address. This refers to Consortium members but also other members of the KSHs as well as the supported Communities of Practice or attendees for workshops and public dissemination events. According to the ethic requirements INSPIRE partners will keep on file a **declaration on compliance or authorisation for collecting and processing personal data** if it is required under national



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law. If no declaration on compliance or authorisation is required under the applicable national law, a **statement from the designated Data Protection Officer** that all personal data collection and processing will be carried out according to EU and national legislation will be kept on file.

Under the definition of the EU GDPR (Regulation 2016/679), personal data means: “any information relating to an identified or identifiable natural person (‘data subject’); an identifiable natural person is one who can be identified, directly or indirectly, in particular by reference to an identifier such as a name, an identification number, location data, an online identifier or to one or more factors specific to the physical, physiological, genetic, mental, economic, cultural or social identity of that natural person” (article 4.1). Sensitive personal data or special categories of personal data refer to information revealing racial or ethnic origin, political opinions, religious or philosophical beliefs, trade union membership, genetic data, biometric data, data concerning health or data concerning a natural person's sex life or sexual orientation (article 9).

Online GEP survey no personal data will be explicitly requested. The survey is concerned with the presence/ absence of a GEP and institutional level policies and will be filled in by various representative per organisation. Respondents to the GEP Survey will voluntarily provide their name, role, and email address in case they want to be contacted by INSPIRE. Personal data (including the name of the organization) and contact information will be stored by GESIS and separated from survey data before sharing it with other INSPIRE consortium members so that answers cannot be connected to individuals or to organisations.

The **Gender Equality Audit and Monitoring (GEAM) Tool** might include items involving Sensitive Personal Information (e.g.: sexual orientation, health impairments or reporting discrimination associated with ethnicity). It will be the responsibility of the CoP administrator/GEAM Survey administrator to decide the adequate security settings for a specific survey instance taking into account the GEAM content, national legislation and organizational information needs and context(s). Instructions on data protection & anonymization as well as different security settings of the Limesurvey platform will be provided by the Guidance document for GEAM tool elaborated by FUOC (see further indications on data protection and confidentiality agreement for CoP Facilitators and Seed partners in Annexes 5 and 8).

During the **semi-structured interviews** sensitive personal information (e.g.: sexual orientation, health impairments or reporting discrimination associated with ethnicity) will likely be discussed given the nature of the case studies. Consortium partners that are directly responsible for this data collection will ensure that the transcriptions and summaries of these interviews are pseudonymised, meaning that they will not contain any personal information that might enable identification of the person. Interview transcripts will only be available to those consortium members that need access in order to fulfil their role as specified in the grant agreement. Consortium members may use amberscript – i.e. a software service for transcription of interviews –that has servers in EU and follows GDPR regulations.

INSPIRE will also interview CoP members and experts to produce **thematic videos** that will offer training content and best practice guidelines on diverse topics around gender equality in



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R&I, and introducing Communities of Practice as an instrument for institutional change. No personal information will be requested in these video interviews and interviewees will not be anonymised (see the consent form for image and voice use see annex 7).

We will request the free, explicit, specific and unambiguous **informed consent** of all persons participating in research activities such as online surveys, interviews and focus groups, as well as for collecting personal data in workshops, dissemination activities, and online-related activities. The annexes section of this deliverable contains the necessary templates of informed consent and information sheets. These templates will be provided in language and terms intelligible to the participants.

Following the principle of accountability, relevant task leaders are responsible for keeping records documenting the informed consent procedure (information sheets and consent forms provided to research participants). Therefore, they will keep the signed consent form sheets in secure folders in their institutional servers or in the secure INSPIRE file storing space, so that they can be submitted on request.

Informed consent to register to workshops and public events include the following aspects:

- a summary of the purpose of the workshop/event
- agreement on the collection of the participant's contact details, and information on how this data will be processed
- agreement on the capture of photographs during the event and information on how images will be processed
- agreement to make visible the participant's name and affiliation in the list of participants included in the final report of the event and facilitated to the rest of the attendees
- information on the Privacy Policy and the legal framework that regulates the storage and handling of the submitted information
- explanation of the procedures to follow in case of a request for the deletion of the personal data and images
- expression of interest and consent to be contacted for other INSPIRE activities

With regards to participation in research activities (online surveys, interviews and focus groups), informed consent will include:

- a summary of the purpose of the research activity
- information about why and how participants have been recruited
- reference to the legal framework that regulates the collection, storage, protection, retention and destruction of data
- statement that all information will be treated as confidential and that no information that could identify the respondent will be shared
- information that participation is voluntary and that the participant may refuse to answer any questions and have the right to withdraw at any time
- information on how data will be processed and for how long it will be stored



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- explanation of the procedures to follow in case of a request for the deletion of the personal data and recording
- how the data will be used, including its publication via open access
- information on the principal investigator contact details, the corresponding data controller and data processor, and the ethical committee to be contacted for any ethical inquires

For participation in online-related activities, protocols for online participation will be set up in compliance with the above mentioned legislation.
