but not in the way we tend to think.

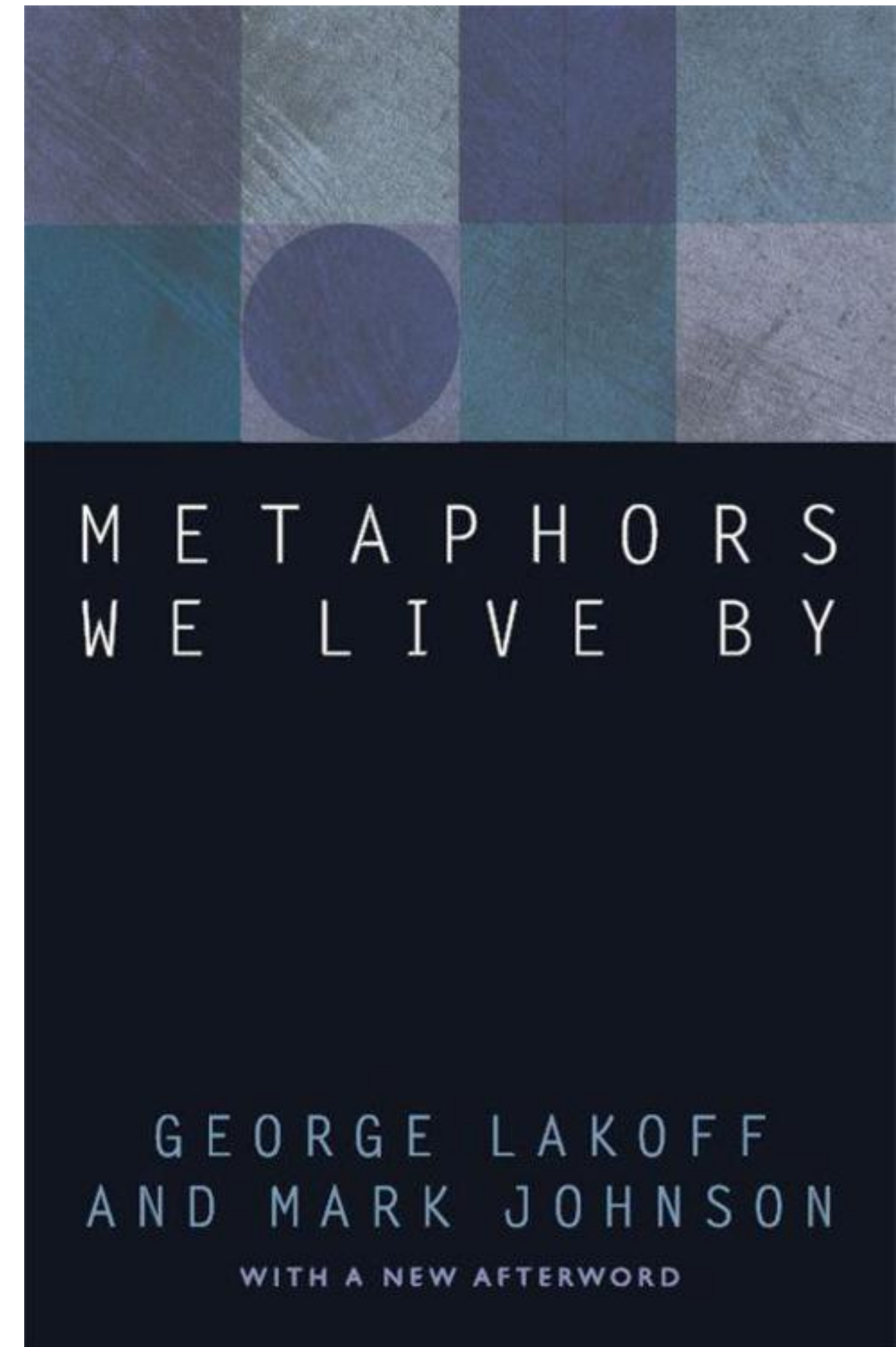

At the annual STM US Conference in Washington DC, Roger Schonfeld and Tracy Bergstrom will share insights and findings from the Ithaka S+R report on The Second Digital Transformation of Scholarly Publishing, unpacking strategic context and shared infrastructure. The session will take place on Wednesday April 24, 2024 at 10:15-10:45am. See the full conference schedule to learn more.

- “Non-profit” is only a tax status. It isn’t a “virtue merit badge.” And being non-profit is no guarantee that an organization’s mission will remain aligned with those of its stakeholders.
- “Mission-driven” and “Research-driven” organizations will only remain so to the degree that they are controlled by their stakeholders.
- “Shared infrastructure” isn’t truly shared if the stakeholders that depend on it don’t also share a role in its governance.
- “Researcher-led” and “researcher-focused” organizations can easily succumb to the fallacy that what is best for researchers and, specifically, their careers is what is best for all research stakeholders.
- “Openness” is a non-negotiable precondition that allows stakeholders to create their own alternative infrastructure systems if necessary.

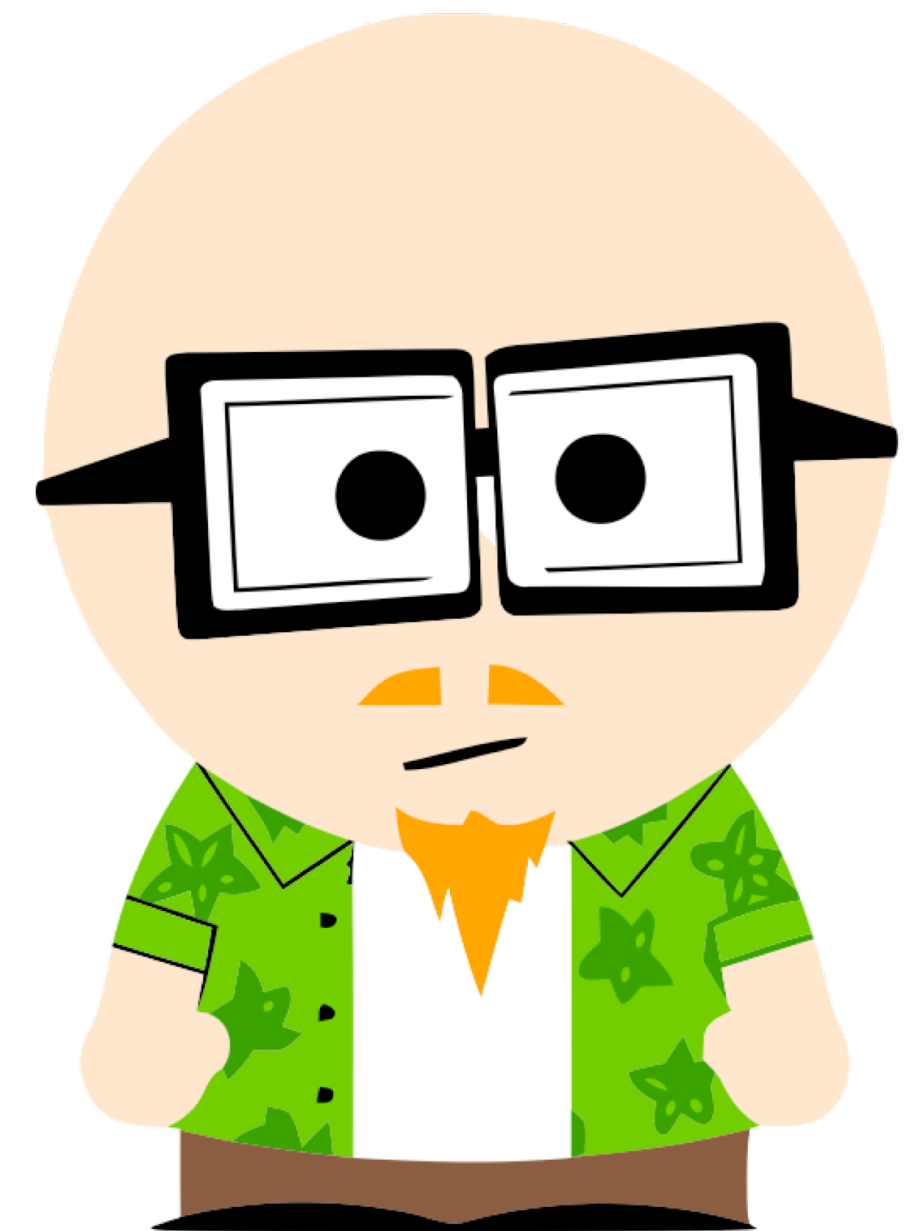
