WHY COMMUNITY ARCHIVES MATTER

- iPRES Keynotes for the past two years have called out the important work of community archives
 - Tamar Evangelestia-Dougherty in 2022
 - Sherry Williams and Ricardo Punzalan in 2023
- Community archives document lives often left out of institutional archives. They perform critical labor, often without sustainable funding for staff, supplies, or infrastructure.
- Research libraries are well positioned to help, but often encounter barriers, sometimes self-imposed.

KEY BARRIERS TO COLLABORATION

BARRIER 1: COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT POLICIES

- Historical Biases: Archival frameworks once assumed objectivity and neutrality
- Community Archives: Linked with activism and social justice, offer alternative
 - Ex. The Digital Archives and Marginalized Communities Project (DAMC) uses participatory archiving, driven by community priorities.
- Representational Belonging: Communities reclaim narratives, challenging traditional collecting practices.
 - Ex. South Asian American Digital Archive (SAADA)
- Ongoing responsibility: Historical exclusion reflects broader systemic issues, necessitating continued efforts toward inclusivity and equity.

BARRIER 2: PATERNALISTIC ATTITUDES

- Roots and causes of paternalistic attitudes
- Impact on collaboration
 - Epistemic asymmetry
- Examples
 - Legalistic, rights-based frameworks

BARRIER 3: MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

- Financial, technical, and content-related challenges when community archives try to use networks designed for research libraries.
- Open-source and community-based solutions are out of reach.
- Content requirements to be accepted for preservation are geared towards research libraries.

BARRIER 4: INCOMPATIBLE DIGITAL PRESERVATION WORKFLOWS

- Challenges in digital preservation for different institutions
- Digital exclusion
- Echo chamber effect

STRATEGIES FOR BRIDGING THE DIVIDE

DIVERSIFYING COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT

- Community-driven collecting practices
- Joint exhibitions and research projects
- Engaging with the Community
- Addressing ownership and copyright concerns

DISMANTLING PATERNALISM

- Identify and challenge privilege
- Adopt radical empathy
- Build long-term relationships
- Promote self-determination

RETHINKING MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

- Flexible membership models
- Training and education programs
- Partnerships for skill development
- Leveraging library staff

- Focus on human elements
- "Good Enough" digital preservation
- Scalable solutions
- Collaborative partnerships
- Community archives programs
