

NO LIST TO RULE THEM ALL

Assessments of which journals are likely to be predatory or legitimate do not tally, and titles can appear in both categories. There is no way to know which journals were considered for a list but left off, or which were not considered.




Beall's list highlighted the issue of predatory journals, but faced criticism over transparency and legal threats from listed titles. It ceased operation in 2017. Some journals deemed legitimate by the DOAJ were deemed predatory by Beall's and/or Cabells lists.

The DOAJ relies mainly on information from publishers. It regularly purges titles that do not meet quality criteria.

What's the big deal with publishing in a deceptive or low quality journal?

General Impacts

- Polluting the scholarly record with poor science
- Risk of poor research being used to inform public policy
- False claims being picked up and shared on social media
- Lowering the estimation of open access journals to the research community

Institutional Impacts

- Highlights institutions inadequate mentoring
- Displays ineffective support for good scholarship


Researcher Impacts

- Reputational damage
- Low citation rate
- Research that is non-discoverable or has low exposure
- Wasting of money, time and/or energy
- Feelings of frustration or shame
- Unable to count publications toward promotion

Economic Impacts

- Draining of research money to predatory publishers
- Wasting efforts of people and materials

How do researchers feel about publishing in low quality or deceptive journals?






