## Collective actions - joint roadmap

- Journal article metadata
- IR / preprint / data repository metadata
- Funding metadata
- Replacing closed systems
- Sustainability of infrastructures
- Evaluating open data sources
- Evidence of benefits

- Working groups, coordinated by signatory organizations
- Concrete outcomes over 6-24 months
- Collaboration between signatories and supporters

- Examples of actions -> some universities are unsubscribing from WoS and using that money to fund OpenAlex, development of open science research information in some countries, organisations including openness in metadata in publisher agreements.
- A couple of relevant questions from the discussion:
  - How will this declaration be different from others? Funding seems to be an obstacle.  
-> This is indeed a challenge but there are already RPOs funnelling their funding towards open infrastructures (see slides).
  - What about the quality? When will open research information systems reach a quality level that allows users to become fully independent of commercial tools?  
-> This is a returning question and while we didn't have much time to delve into it

(for example, how is quality refined?), the panellists mentioned that the coverage from open infrastructures has been increasing and is quite comprehensive. Further, The Barcelona declaration can offer an inspiration and roadmap for CoARA signatory organizations on how to address the agreement principle of independence and transparency of the data, infrastructure and criteria necessary for research assessment. They also encouraged people to use them more as increased use will improve these infrastructures.
