NOTES ON THE ARCHIVAL SOURCE:

Nachlass Franz Wieacker. Cod. Ms. F. Wieacker D1:

First pile (Beil 1)holds printed and corrected version of the talk, that Wieacker gave in a conference "Vereinigung deutscher Rechtshistoriker" in Heidelberg 21.10.1949, and a short newspaper article about the conference. All papers in pile scanned and copied.

Second pile (Beil 2) contains obituary for Gerhard Beseler, which Wieacker wrote in winter 1947-48. Scanned and copied, because obituary was mentioned in a letter to Gerhard Dulckeit (around 1948), who was also member of the Kieler Schule.

Of the **third pile** pages 1-103 contain early printed manuscripts (first drafts?) which Wieacker has corrected here and there. Pile contains at least scripts for "Zur Ueberlieferungsgeschichte klassischen Juristenschriften; Der Gegenstand der Texstufenforschung; Erster Abschnitt: Die Metodischen Grundlagen der Textstufenforschungun; Texstufe und Interpolation."In one of the papers there's date 29.4.55. Pages 104 – 118 unreadable notes. Perhaps earlier version of the book (juni 50 in one of the papers)?

Fourth pile is printed manuscript of "Zur Geschichte der Juristichen Methode".

Nachlass Franz Wieacker. Cod. Ms. F. Wieacker D6:

Thanks-letter from the rector of Göttingen University from the assistance of Wieacker to a charity program which enabled resources to the University; Another letter, unreadable, sent 1947; an empty envelope, notebook for references and some notes on paper. Both letters scanned.
