The Story of Mankind. By Hendrik Van Loon. Boni and Liveright, New York, 1922. Seventh printing. 489 pp. \$5.00 net.

Mr. Van Loon is a Dutchman who has become Americanized. He is Professor of Social Science at Antioch College. He has written for children to get them to understand the world in which they live and to love history. His own children had been taught to hate history.
