ST. JOHN'S, MONKSTOWN: The Story of an Irish Church.
By Rev. R. W. Harden, M.A. (Hodges, Figgis and Co.)

Mr. Harden gives an interesting account of the history of this church from its foundation fifty years ago. The book is full of personal allusions to many clergy and laymen who were prominent in church life during that period. We can commend it as a readable account of the growth of the Church's work in the now populous neighbourhood of Kingstown and as a worthy contribution to parochial history.

Two little books of devotion warmly recommended by Bishop Gaul, late of Mashonaland. A special feature of the books is the use of the Hebrew words of the Psalm as suggesting spiritual meanings. They are intended only for those who have "ears to hear," and such will derive much help from the study of them.
