1. Collection Development

A) Open Access books as part of library aquisition

- Consider Open Access options when acquiring literature (e.g. OA options within eBook packages)
- > Participate in Crowdfunding projects to finance OA Books (e.g. Knowledge Unlatched)
- Contribute to the funding of shared infrastructures for OA books (e.g. DOAB or OAPEN)

B) Open Access Books in Library Catalogues and Discovery Systems

- Include OA books in your library catalogue or discovery services
- Require providers to include Open Access content in their services/products (e.g. discovery services, database providers etc.)





2. Publication services

A) Open Access Policy

Include the support for Open Access Books in your institutional OA Policy

B) Library Publishing

Provide the services needed to publish books from you own authors (e.g. through a university press)

C) Distribution via repository

> Distribute the books of your authrors via a repository (green OA)

D) Institutional Funding for Open Access books

- ➤ Provide library funding to pay for author fees (OA book funds)
- > Manage the publication funds for Open Access books





2. Publication services

E) Author Support and Training

- > Supporting your authors concerning OA Books, e.g. through:
 - technical advice on how to publish OA books (i.e. formats, metadata)
 - negotiating contracts or copyright issues with publishers

F) Open Access monitoring

Monitor the impact of your Open Access books (e.g. usage, citations etc.)





3. Development of staff and organisation

A) Staff Development

- > Provide opportunities for skills development of your library staff, e.g. on
 - Scholarly publishing in general
 - Copyright issues
 - Open Access Business Models
 - Metadata and format requirements
 - Training methods ("train the trainer")

B) Organisational Development

- take an integrated approach to content management and connect library acquisition and publication services
- Integrate internal workflows from different departments (e.g. publication services, licensing, acquisition, accounting)
