

COMMUNITY OVERVIEW

Urban@UW is a partnership at the University of Washington that brings together scholars across all three UW campuses, plus policymakers and local community stakeholders. The goal of Urban@UW is to develop cross-disciplinary and cross-sector collaborative research that makes cities more resilient, equitable, healthy and sustainable. Started in Spring 2015, it is supported by the Office of Research and the College of Built Environments at the University of Washington, as well as external grants and partnerships. The community aims to strengthen connections between research and solutions to today's urban challenges through a mixture of in-person and online activities. Urban@UW's collaborations happen during in-person events, workshops and research teams, while engagement and communication of opportunities, trainings, and ideas are shared online.

Infrastructure organization empowering communities of practice and research collaborations

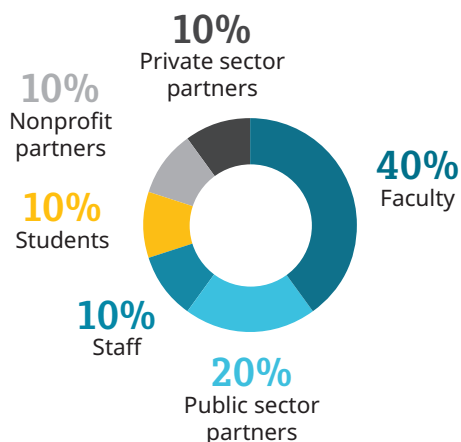
COMMUNITY STRUCTURE

Community Management

Community management is provided by the **Director** (0.5 FTE) plus an **hourly student assistant** (0.33 FTE), working with a committee of faculty advisors. Additionally, 1-4 **graduate students** (who might be considered community ambassadors) support individual research projects (at 0.5 FTE as projects develop and close) in partnership with faculty leads (who are engaged at different levels of FTE).

PROGRAMMING

The CSCCE Community Participation Model describes four modes of member engagement that can occur within a community: CONVEY/CONSUME, CONTRIBUTE, COLLABORATE, and CO-CREATE. All modes may be present at once, with some members interacting in multiple modes - or a community may have member engagement that falls into only some of the modes described. The model enables the mapping of community member behaviors to programming and other infrastructural support that the community manager, convening organization, or funder may provide to the community. IN THIS COMMUNITY

Urban@UW programming is community-led, with an emphasis on bringing people together across boundaries, leading to more innovation/creation.
