Despite advances in transportation management strategies, evacuations continue to cause congested conditions on transportation networks. At the same time, vulnerable populations frequently lack adequate resources for evacuation and sheltering, and a large proportion of the population do not comply with evacuation orders. As part of this study, we are analyzing how individuals make decisions after receiving a mandatory or recommended evacuation order. What will happen if I take part in this research study? We will ask you survey questions related to your experience with evacuating or not evacuating your residence during the last disaster. These questions will include demographic information about you and your household, the address of your household, the choices you made during the event, and your opinions on the use of sharing economy platforms (i.e., technology platforms that allow the sharing of goods such as transportation and housing). If the survey includes questions you do not wish to or cannot answer, you may either choose to skip those questions, or you may choose not to participate in the study. All pieces of personal information and personal information of others will be kept as confidential as possible. Only one member from each immediate household may take the survey. participate? Participants will not directly benefit from the research.
