
Challenge: OA & OS infrastructure has grown in number and usage and may no longer be sustainable providing no pathway forward for continuation and further development. Funding for operations neglected We want an equitable and inclusive research culture

Risk: Services risk stagnation, downsizing or pay walling

Aim: Helping sustain the infrastructure to support the implementation of OS

Officially formed in early 2017, SCOSS's purpose is to provide a new co-ordinated cost-sharing framework that will ultimately enable the broader OA and OS community to support the non-commercial services on which it depends

If we don't take concerted action ...

- Less control over infra we helped create; waste
- Our services may be compromised
- Flexibility essential: facing further lock-in
- We lose touch with researchers and with the OS community
- We cannot comply with policy / reach OA targets
- We lose our capacity to influence
- It's more difficult to **shape our future**


Who we are and what do we do



SCOSS hits major milestone



The Directory of Open Access Journals, one of two Open infrastructure services recommended during our pilot funding cycle, has met its funding goal of 1,370 000 Euros. The drive kicked off in late 2017: over the course of the past three years, more than


216 institutions from 19 countries contributed to DOAJ.

"This is such a great indication of the academic community's commitment to helping secure our Open infrastructure," said Vanessa Proudman, Director of SPARC Europe, a member of the SCOSS coalition. "All of us involved in SCOSS have learned so much during this process; we're eager to see other SCOSS-endorsed services absorb the lessons so other services are able to achieve greater stability."



To that end, we posed **DOAJ**'s **Managing Director Lars Bjørnshauge** a series of questions that other Open services, that like DOAJ intend to stay Open, should find valuable and revealing.

OpenCitations: goals

OpenCitations has been established as a fully free and open infrastructure to provide access to global scholarly bibliographic and citation data, of quality and coverage to rival those from proprietary services, e.g. Clarivate Analytics' Web of Science (WoS) and Elsevier's Scopus

OpenCitations enables

- Fairness: it avoids institutions and independent scholars having to pay tens of thousands of dollars annually (that most of them cannot afford!) for commercial access to their own scholarly data
- Reuse: no license restrictions, since the data are provided under CC0, so users can republish and reuse for any purpose the citation data that OpenCitations provides
- Research assessment: by providing crucial data for national and international research evaluation exercises, OpenCitations makes such activities transparent and reproducible
- Governance: community involvement

OpenCitations: information and data

OpenCitations (http://opencitations.net) is an independent infrastructure organization

- dedicated to open scholarship and the publication of open bibliographic and citation data by the use of Semantic Web technologies
- engaged in advocacy for open citations and open bibliographic metadata

It provides:

- a data model: the <u>OpenCitations Data Model</u> (based on the <u>SPAR Ontologies</u>)
- bibliographic and citation data (CC0): <u>OpenCitations Corpus</u>, <u>COCI</u>, <u>CROCI</u>
- software: in our <u>GitHub repository</u>, released with open source licenses
- online services: REST APIs, SPARQL endpoints, dumps and interfaces

Using our data

We provide data containing more than 7 hundred million citations that the community can use for any purpose

Such data can be crucial as a vehicle for use in national and international research evaluation exercises to make such activities more transparent and reproducible as compared to other proprietary services

As a librarian, you can use our citation data (e.g. via our REST API) to enhance or develop tools to support your authors, researchers, students, institutional administrators, for instance by providing metrics to monitor research at your institution and by improving the discoverability of research products such as publications and data




The availability of the citation data via REST APIs has fostered new applications, from the description of references and citations of a given article in metadata libraries to the visualisation of networks of publications using scientometrics tools



Two ways to help






United Kingdom, 2013 - 2020 usage (COUNTER) of the OAPEN Library





United Kingdom 2020, usage (COUNTER) of the OAPEN Library







Breakdown of downloads in 2020: 503.799




United Kingdom 2020 – Most used titles





About us.

- The Public Knowledge Project (PKP) is a non-profit initiative established in 1998 at the University of British Columbia (Canada).
- Best known for creating and maintaining Open Journal Systems (OJS), the world's most widely used free and open source software for managing the editorial workflow and display of open access journal articles. Also develop and maintain Open Monograph Press (OMP) and Open Preprint Systems (OPS).

What we do.

- Research, build, maintain, and support open alternatives to commercial publishing models.
- Provide free documentation, online courses, and technical support for our open source applications.

How we do it.

PKP develops content and workflow management systems that are:

- Free and available to all;
- 100% open source;
- Locally installed and controlled;
- Multilingual;
- Indexed;
- Supported;
- Customizable;
- Community-led; and
- Continuously improving and adapting to the changing publishing ecosystem.

Why we do it.

- Reduce cost as a barrier to creating and consuming scholarship online.
- Increase the availability and accessibility of open access content for everyone.
- Expand the diversity of voices and perspectives being heard in global scholarly communications.

Why it matters to the open science.

- OJS is used by over 10,000 journals around the world in over 40 languages.
- OJS is used as the national publishing portal in a number of European countries, including Finland, Denmark, and Sweden, with more in progress.
- With over half of OJS journals in the Global South, it expands the diversity of voices participating in the scholarly conversation.
- OJS is the largest platform used by journals in the Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ). More than 40% of journals indexed in the DOAJ identify OJS as their publishing platform.
- Over 60% of all Diamond OA journals use OJS.

Why it matters to you.

- Many of your researchers and students use OJS to access free content on their research topics (discoverable through DOAJ, Google Scholar, and other indexing services) and to start and run journals in new areas of research.
- Libraries use OJS to support library publishing activities, including offering OJS hosting and support services to their users.
