About the Sharjah Biennial

History

- Contemporary art exhibition taking place every 2 years featuring dozens of international artists
- Started in 1993 by a small group of Emirati artists at Sharjah Expo Centre
- Organized by the Sharjah Art Foundation since 2009

Structure

- Artworks and installations are displayed at historical sites across the emirate
- New venues are acquired by the foundation or borrowed for each exhibition
- Free to attend, plus accompanied by a schedule of tours and performances

Visualizing the Sharjah Biennial

Three-step process

1. Data creation

- ➤ Lack of publicly-accessible datasets on history of Sharjah Biennial exhibitions
 - Created dataset documenting every artwork shown since 2009 with artist and geospatial information


2. Data analysis

- Using Google Sheets functions to conduct meta-analyses of biennial data
 - See patterns in data of exhibitions over time to trace spatial expansion

3. Visualization


- Creating maps in ArcGIS to show concentration of artworks at venues over time
 - Begin to ask questions tied to space-making, socio-political values, and aesthetics

Takeaways from a Digital Workflow

- ♦ New way to collect and consider data → new questions to ask
 - ➤ Greater focus on spatiality of exhibitions and their social implications rather than the artwork or artist selection
- Working with bilingual textual data
 - ➤ Particular context of the Gulf/UAE means navigating texts in Arabic and English
- Ease of working with geospatial tools in the Arabian Peninsula/MENA
 - Lack of work done so far, not lack of tool availability
