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-1-Foreword

has been a historic year for the OPE-RAS infrastructure which became a legal entity in December 2019. a legal entity in December 2019. This is the official birth of the OPERAS Association, in the legal form of an international association under Belgian law (AISBL). For the members of OPERAS, 2020 was not only the year of the global pandemic and lock-downs, but also the year of the structuring of the committees of the Association (Executive Assembly, Assembly of the Commons, Scientific Committee of OPERAS). It was also in 2020 that the ESFRI application was submitted (September) and that three supporting members joined us. Moreover, OPERAS added two services in the European Open Science Cloud (EOSC). It was therefore a year that marked the end of the design and preparation phase of the infrastructure and the beginning of a new era for OPERAS, both in terms of its internal structuring and the strengthening of its action and collaborations in the context of Open Science.

OPERAS is supporting the implementation of the European Open Science strategy that establishes Europe as the leader in this domain at a global scale.

DEFINITION AND MISSION

OPERAS is the Research Infrastructure supporting open scholarly communication in the social sciences and humanities (SSH) in the European Research Area. Its mission is to coordinate and federate resources in Europe to efficiently address the scholarly communication needs of European researchers in the field of SSH.

VISION

OPERAS' aim is to make Open Science a reality for research in the SSH and achieve a scholarly communication system where knowledge produced in the SSH benefits researchers, academics, students and more generally the whole society across Europe and worldwide, without barriers.

VALUE PROPOSITION: WHY OPERAS IS NEEDED

The European landscape of scholarly communication in the SSH is currently patchy, fragmented and not organized enough to be efficient, particularly to address the challenge of transitioning to Open Science. This is due to several factors, such as the small size of resource providers, the historical underfunding and lack of sustainability in this area, the variety of technical skills and resources across the community. The nature of the SSH disciplines also adds specific challenges which are not correctly addressed at scale, such as the diversity of publication languages, the entrenchment in diverse cultural backgrounds and the need for specific forms of scholarly communication (monographs, critical editions, and edited bibliographies, amongst others).

By fulfilling its mission, OPERAS provides the research community with the missing brick it needs to find, access, create, edit, disseminate and easily and efficiently validate SSH outputs across Europe. In one word, OPERAS unlocks scholarly communication resources and enables the whole field to reinvent itself in the new Open Science paradigm.

Finally, OPERAS is the European Research Infrastructure dedicated to open scholarly communication in the social sciences and humanities.


1 **OPERAS** AISBL



4 OPERAS Coordination Team

A team of 9 people to support the strategic decisions

The central coordination and daily management of OPERAS is ensured by the Coordination Team, a small team which includes: two coordinators, one general secretary, one technical coordinator, one communication officer, one FAIR data officer, one citizen science officer and two project managers. The Coordination Team also supports the life of the assemblies and committees and, thus, is closely involved in the strategic decisions regarding OPERAS.

Members of the Coordination Team are employed on national contracts by OPE-RAS' member institutions in France (OpenEdition/Huma-Num and affiliates: CNRS, Aix-Marseille University, EHESS, Campus Condorcet), Germany (Max Weber Stiftung, DARIAH ERIC) and Croatia (University of Zadar). Thus, members of the Coordination Team are involved both in OPERAS and in the life and activities of their home institution – at different levels depending on their responsibilities. This double professional identity is an asset to develop strong bonds between OPERAS and key national institutions.

TRAINING AND FORMATION

Education and training are a priority for OPERAS: in 2020, the team attended the RI-train Executive Masters in the Management of Research Infrastructure (EMMRI) to strengthen its management competence and expand its knowledge on topics such as: financial and governance sustainability for RIs, service provision (assessing services quality, redesigning and flowcharting services), raising awareness, developing leadership competencies, etc. (certificate see page 18).



FOCUS ON

THE ADVOCACY SIG AND THE MULTILINGUAL SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS AND THEIR ACTIVITIES IN 2020:

/The Advocacy Special Interest Group: activities in 2020 and future plans

The OPERAS Advocacy SIG meets monthly to discuss the topics that its 23 members (as of April 2021) work on in designated sub-groups. These topics include researchers' concerns for open access publishing, advocacy for the SSH, and national channels for open access publishing. In addition, the Advocacy SIG prepares recommendations and guidelines for multilingualism (together with the Multilingualism SIG) and for FAIR standards in the SSH (together with the Common Standards SIG). Its activities and planned actions have been described in an "Advocacy Guide" published in October 2020. It is currently creating guidelines and recommendations to support stakeholders in their advocacy efforts for SSH.

To learn more about researchers' concerns for open access publishing and advocacy for SSH, the Advocacy SIG conducted a workshop and a panel discussion in 2020:

- 1. "How to fill the Information Gap: Open Access for the Social Sciences and Humanities" as part of the Munin conference on 17 November 2020².
- 2."How to advocate for social sciences and humanities" as part of the OPERAS conference (see detailed report below).

PANEL REPORT: "HOW TO ADVOCATE FOR SOCIAL SCIENCES AND HUMANITIES"

The Advocacy SIG is developing an advocacy strategy for the SSH disciplines, particularly targeting

funders and policy-makers, at both a national and at a European level. They therefore organized a panel discussion at the annual OPERAS conference, with five SSH advocacy professionals from think tanks, NGOs and Open Access initiatives, to draw conclusions from their professional experiences.

The panelists exchanged their advocacy experiences and presented case studies to provide examples of actual best practices, challenges, and obstacles for SSH advocacy on the EU level while taking into account local specificities. Exchanging experiences connected to advocacy, showing examples of best practices and challenges or obstacles related to local specifics during the panel provide input for the Advocacy SIG work, but may also attract new organizations to join OPERAS and become active within the community.

FUTURE PLANS:

The Advocacy SIG is working on the following concrete topics:

- National channels for open access publishing: Developing guidelines and recommendations for advocating for open access publishing in a national community, based on the experiences of the OPERAS-GER project.
- 2. Multilingualism: Designing an advocacy campaign on multilingualism in the SSH, e.g. a policy brief.
- 3. FAIR standards: Creating a 3-step campaign for FAIR standards in the SSH 1) social media campaign with information on relevant aspects for the SSH, 2) creation of "cards" from the ALLEA report on the same topic to make it more accessible and to contextualize its findings, 3) adaptation of the self-assessment checklist.
- 4. Advocacy in the SSH: Constructing a survey that will be conducted in 2021.

/The Multilingualism Special Interest Group

The Multilingualism Special Interest Group has worked together in two main phases.

Phase 1:

Literature review: multilingualism and scholarly communication

[corresponding to goals 1 and 2. Status: concluded]

The original draft of the literature review was prepared by Ana Balula and Delfim Leão (Coimbra University team) and revised within the OPERAS Special Interest Group on Multilingualism, which includes representatives of the Helsinki initiative, Federation of Finnish Learned Societies, ENRESSH, AEUP, Academic Book Publishers, PKP, FORCE11.

It is a qualitative study of exploratory nature, and the method used is in the scope of an integrative literature review, summarising prior research to clarify research trends based on in vivo content analysis of the selected corpus. As to the problem, it reflects a gap in the recent literature, namely as to identifying factors that influence the dynamics underlying language selection and the use of multilingualism within scholarly communication. The original work prepared by Ana Balula & Delfim Leão was submitted as a paper and published as Balula, A., & Leão, D. (2021). Phase 2:


Survey regarding "Multilingualism in Scholarly Communication"

[corresponding to goals 2 and 3. Status: survey concluded, report and in-depth analysis concluded]

The survey on "Multilingualism in Scholarly Communication" was conducted during the Summer of 2020 (from 19 June to 20 August), in an online survey distributed among researchers, translators and publishers in the OPERAS network and other channels. The survey was responded to by a total of 359 participants who had a common initial set of questions, and then could give their contribution according to three different perspectives (researchers, translators and publishers), separated or combined, depending on the respondents' profiles. Given the growing need to strengthen the bonds between stakeholders involved in scholarly communication and multilingualism, this survey had a two-fold purpose:

- (i) create a better understanding of the role of multilingualism within bibliodiversity in scholarly communication;
- (ii) contribute to the conceptual design of a platform prototype for community-owned translation services at the scholarly communication level, involving the needs of publishers, translators, and researchers.


The preliminary results of the survey were publicly presented at the OASPA Conference 2020 and the OPERAS 2020 Conference.

OPERAS and the Executive Assembly coordinated 5 projects running in 2020.



/The TRIPLE project



Transforming Research through Innovative Practices for Linked Interdisciplinary Exploration – 19 partners from 13 countries – € 5 630 055 grant

The European-funded TRIPLE project aims to develop an innovative multilingual and multicultural discovery solution for the social sciences and humanities (SSH). The GOTRIPLE platform will provide a single access point that allows researchers but also a wider audience to explore, find, access and reuse materials such as literature, data, projects and researcher profiles at a European scale.

The platform will be one of the dedicated services of our research infrastructure. The project was launched on the first of October 2019 and lasts 42 months (2019–2023). It is financed under the Horizon 2020 framework with approximately 5.6 million €. It gathers 19 partners from 13 European countries and is coordinated from France by the Research Infrastructure Huma-Num, a unit of the French National Centre for Scientific Research (CNRS). Almost 100 researchers and engineers are involved in the project.

THE YEAR 2020 WAS DECISIVE BECAUSE THE ESSENTIAL PRELIMINARY WORK FOR THE DE-VELOPMENT OF THE PLATFORM WAS LAUNCHED:

- the identification of resources;
- the definition of the TRIPLE data model:
- the resource integration strategy;
- the identification of user needs, through qualitative interviews, workshops, surveys and face to face meetings, among others by the Abertay University having scientifically analyzed user needs and having drawn seven scenarios and personas from that input;
- the global architecture of the platform, that is to say the process of data ingestion into the future TRIPLE database;
- the integration timeline and process of the innovative services;
- the plan for the EOSC integration, the first steps to define the governance and business model of GOTRIPLE;

and the TRIPLE identity including the logo, the communication strategy, the first version of the PEDR (Plan for Exploitation and Dissemination Report).

FINALLY,

- 3 milestones were achieved and 18 deliverables submitted by the end of 2020
- 5 technical and user design workshops were organized
- 2 peer-reviewed articles were published in Open Access journals
- 10 contributions to public events such as talks, posters, workshops, roundtables and parallel sessions.

Supporting the development of OPERAS toward its maturity – 17 partners – € 2010539.13 grant

The OPERAS-P project is a 360° project working on many different fronts (legal, administrative, scientific, technical) to advance OPERAS on the path to its scientific, technical and community maturity. 2020 is a year of important achievements, with the completion of particularly ambitious objectives.




4 Services

OPERAS develops a comprehensive ecosystem of scholarly communication services which address the specific needs of the research community at local and European levels.

Each service is designed to pool, aggregate, or federate existing resources from across Europe, to deliver to European researchers a single access point from where they can benefit from the full range of the resources rather than being limited to the local ones. Thus, OPERAS builds a transnational access to scholarly communication resources available to researchers across the European Research Area.



The Scholarly Communication Circle describes the services provided by the OPERAS members on a national or local level. The distribution has been added in the circle according to the researcher's needs, dedicated to the different steps of scholarly communication.

THE CERTIFICATION SERVICE IN 2020

The Directory of Open Access Books (DOAB) aims to certify OA book publishers, based on their publishing practices, in particular their peer review procedure and their licensing policy.

The OPERAS Certification Service is intended to certify publishers at both the publisher level and the individual publications level. The goal of the service is to support trust in OA book publishing, by improving transparency around quality assurance of OA book publishers and their publications. By providing transparent information about the quality assurance process at the publisher level and at the book level, the service represents a next step towards (more) open peer review for OA books. It is included in the larger European Open Science Cloud (EOSC).

DOAB RELAUNCHED: OPEN SOURCE & NEW SERVICES

In 2020, DOAB has successfully migrated to a new open source environment, based on DSpace 6. This transition was part of the OPERAS-P project with the redevelopment of DOAB as a central service being the aim of work package 5. Its (new) functionalities and features allow for easy integration with library catalogues:

- All DOAB metadata is freely available (CC0)
- Metadata feeds: MARC, MARCXML, CSV, RIS, ONIX, XML
- OAI-PMH harvesting, REST API, RSS and Atom feeds

In 2020, DOAB has welcomed **78 new publishers** and a total of **8520 new titles** to the directory. DOAB now exceeds **37000** book references, about half of which are written in non-english languages representing a diverse and rich community of more than 450 publishers worldwide.

5 OPERAS engagement in Europe

OPERAS established strong relationships with the EOSC Association, EGI and other ERICS

Since its creation, OPERAS has developed strong collaborative links and partnerships in Europe and internationally. Supporting open access scholarly communication in SSH implies to work in collaboration with others and to rely on the whole scientific community at all levels: national, regional, European and international.

The collaboration already initiated with the ERICs in SSH, which are more focused on data than on publications, has been strengthened through the TRIPLE project in which CESSDA, DARIAH and CLARIN are partners, but also with the construction of the SSH cluster of EOSC, which has encouraged strengthening exchanges on the services offered to the SSH community.

OPERAS became a full member of the EOSC Association in 2020. The AISBL is represented by Elena Giglia from the University of Turin at the General Assembly of the EOSC Association. Suzanne Dumouchel, OPERAS coordinator in charge of partnerships, has been elected as a member of the EOSC Board for 3 years. This is a great opportunity for OPERAS, as well as a recognition of the visibility and assets of our infrastructure. In this sense, OPERAS is working on its mission to disseminate and support Open Science practices, in particular in SHS, while developing work around the link between data and publications.

In 2020, the collaboration with EGI was intensified around the two projects OPERAS-P and TRIPLE, in particular because it was decided that the authentication system for OPERAS services would be that of EGI. This collaboration between the two infrastructures is part of a long process of strengthening exchanges. This has enabled OPERAS to propose certain services as a case study in the EOSC-ACE project coordinated by EGI.

The diagram below illustrates the positioning of OPERAS in a global, European and international context, and on issues as diverse as Open Science, scientific communication in SSH, research infrastructures and associated business models, and data more globally.



However, this should not detract from each and every collaboration at a national or more micro level that makes OPERAS a solid part of the European science ecosystem.

6 OPERAS FAIR Activities

Adoption of FAIR principles to SSH research results

Established in the context of the GOFAIR initiative and funded for two years by the French agency ANR, CO-OPERAS is an Implementation Network supporting the adoption of FAIR principles within the SSH. In 2020, CO-OPERAS had the opportunity to finish its series of national workshops organized for researchers. The workshops allowed to discuss the definition of data in various SSH fields and to survey the specific needs of the community in the prospect of the FAIRification. CO-OPERAS also contributed to various conferences, especially during the GOFAIR Symposium in November, with a session dedicated to the building of a FAIR continuum for the SSH.

At the same time, the members of the OPERAS Special Interest Group on Common Standards decided

to make the FAIR principles an essential part of their work and to rename the SIG accordingly. The group acknowledged not only the importance of FAIR principles for scholarly communication, but the guidance they offer in order to classify and assess the existing standards in the field.

An essential aspect of FAIRification are the FAIR services, and OPERAS fully endorses this objective. The GOTRIPLE service is conceived as a FAIR service, using PIDs, metadata standards, shared controlled vocabularies, open protocols, and offering its own metadata under a clear license. The FAIRness and FAIR-enabling processes of GOTRIPLE have been described in an exhaustive Data Management Plan. GOTRIPLE intends to improve the level of FAIRness of its providers further through support and training actions.

1 Launch of OPERAS-GER

3-year project to build the German national node



On 1 October 2020, the OPERAS-GER project started its work within the Max Weber Stiftung (also member of the OPERAS Executive Assembly). OPERAS-GER serves as the national node of the European research infrastructure OPERAS in Germany. The project is initially planned for the duration of 3 years (10/2020 to 09/2023) and is funded by the German Federal Mi-

nistry of Education and Research (BMBF).

The development of national nodes is an important step for OPERAS and the German national node will serve as a role model.

2/Launch of COESO

3-year project to develop the Research for Society Service and to elaborate Citizen Sciences in SSH



The COESO project (Collaborative Engagement on Societal Issues) kicked-off on 19/20 January 2021. The 3-year participatory research project, funded by the European Commission with a € 2193418,75 grant through a Science with and for Society grant, and supported by the OPERAS research

infrastructure, will serve as a meeting point between various European communities: the social sciences and humanities community, the citizen science community, as well as the open scholarly communication community. It will thus contribute to overcoming the obstacles that hinder the development of citizen science in the social sciences and humanities and facilitate and support participatory research through a service-first approach.

The project will develop a Virtual Ecosystem for Research Activation (VERA), a collaborative place for knowledge production and sharing, and will collaborate with research funding organizations to enhance financial support to citizen science.

Appendix 1:FINANCIAL REPORT

/Methodology

Although OPERAS has been operating for several years as a research infrastructure supported by national organisations, 2020 was the first year of its structuring as an independent legal (and thus, financial) entity, as an AISBL under Belgian law. Therefore, the financial analysis covers two entities:

OPERAS RI, the Research Infrastructure at large funded by: members' in-kind (FTEs to support the infrastructure's activities and take part in its life) and in-cash from four European projects,

OPERAS AISBL, as a separate legal entity with its own budget based mainly on: in-cash membership fees and in-cash revenues from an exceptional business activity.

It is important to note that the figures presented in this report have not been audited yet, since the first audit of the OPERAS AISBL will be held in the second semester of 2021.

/Overview of the budget 2020

2020 is a transition year, with a budget dedicated to investment costs still particularly high, while the AISBL's budget (dedicated to operational activities) is in its first year of structuring. 2020 income is therefore mostly composed of in-cash from European Projects (investment to develop the RI at large), while the OPERAS AISBL's own budget is particularly low compared to the RI's budget since the bulk of the first membership fees will not be collected until 2021.

FOCUS | THE OPERAS RI

In 2020, OPERAS RI consists of 53 members that contribute mainly to the budget of the infrastructure through in-kind contributions (FTEs from members to take part in the infrastructure's activities and assemblies). As per our estimation, the total in-kind contributions from our members in 2020 included **205 776.00 euros** (personnel costs). This amount is an estimation, based on the European gross average salary (fixed at 2,143.50 euros per month in 2018), here to give a better clarification of OPERAS' operations.

In addition to this in-kind, the development and operational activities of OPERAS RI are supported by four European Projects (OPERAS-P, TRIPLE, CO-OPERAS, OPERAS-GER) for a total amount of **2 286,420.56 euros** (breakdown for the year 2020).


