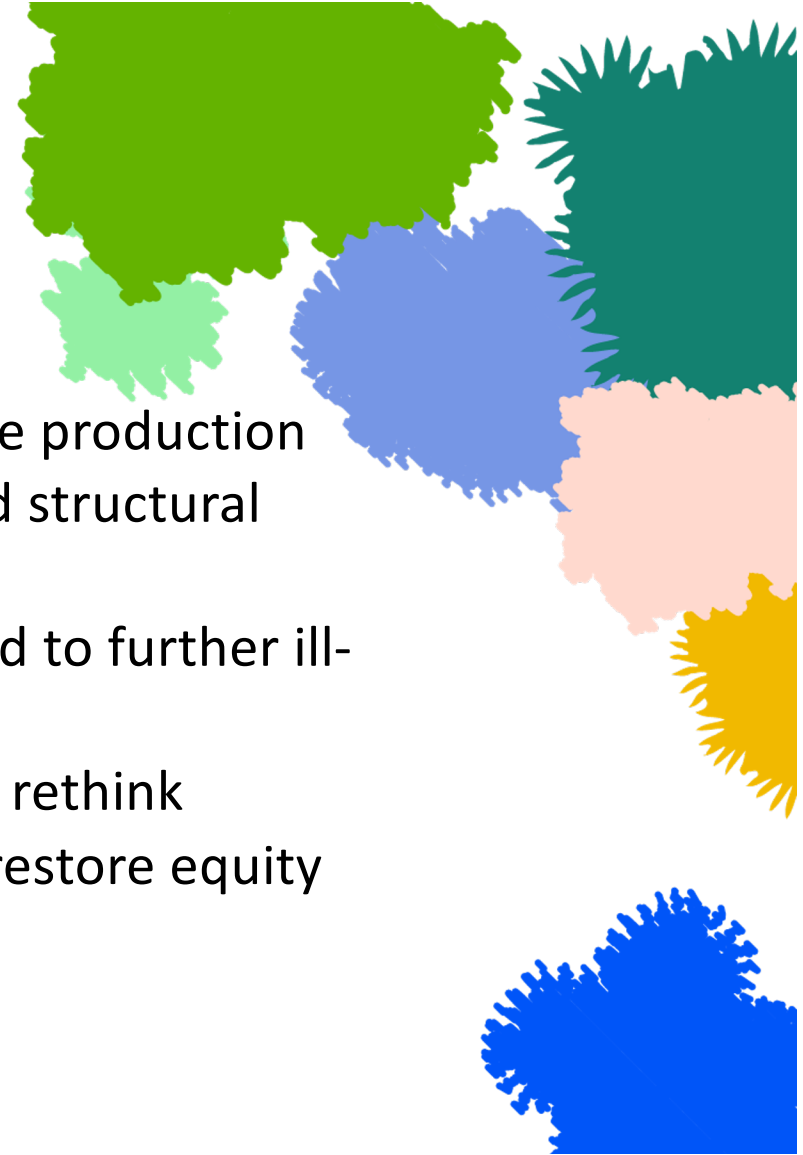


Praxis (Action/Reflection) - [Paulo Freire](#)

It is not enough for people to come together in dialogue in order to gain knowledge of their social reality. They must act together upon their environment in order critically to reflect upon their reality and so transform it through further action and critical reflection.

Premise

- Our systems of education and knowledge production are in ill-health due to deeply embedded structural inequity and racism
- Openness, when applied uncritically, lead to further ill-health
- The need for “Social Vaccine” – a way to rethink relationship of knowledge systems – to restore equity and resilience

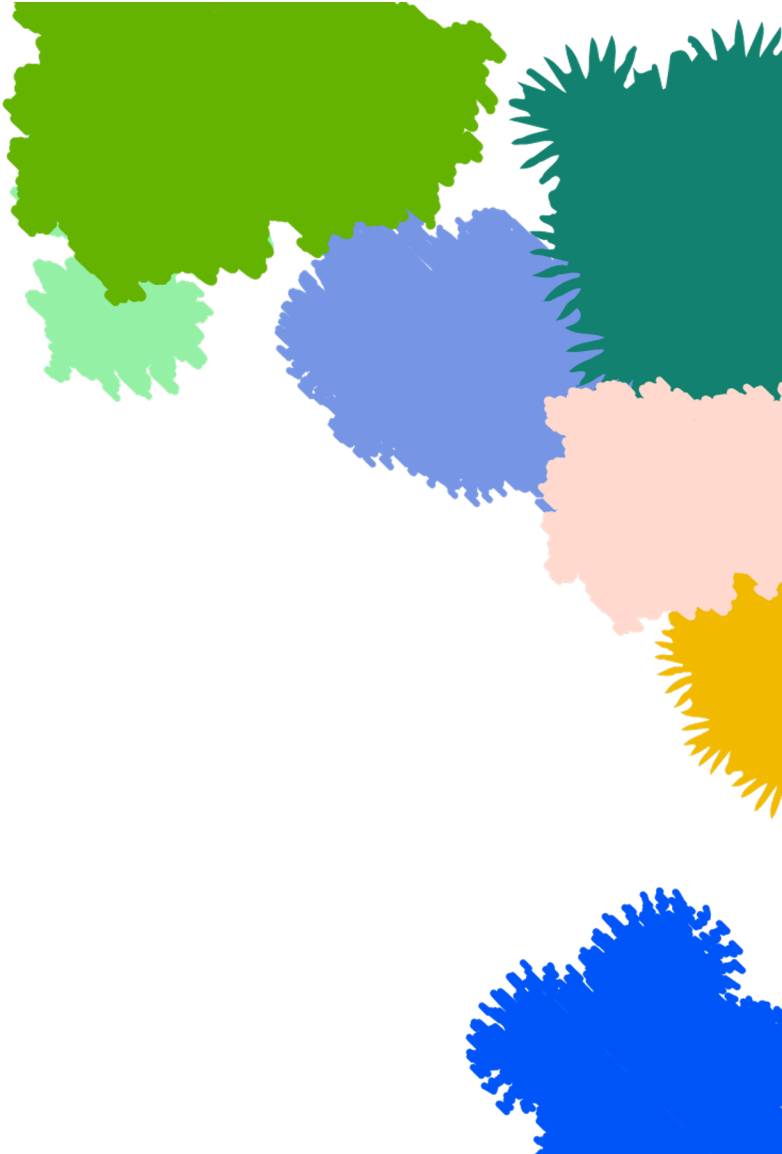
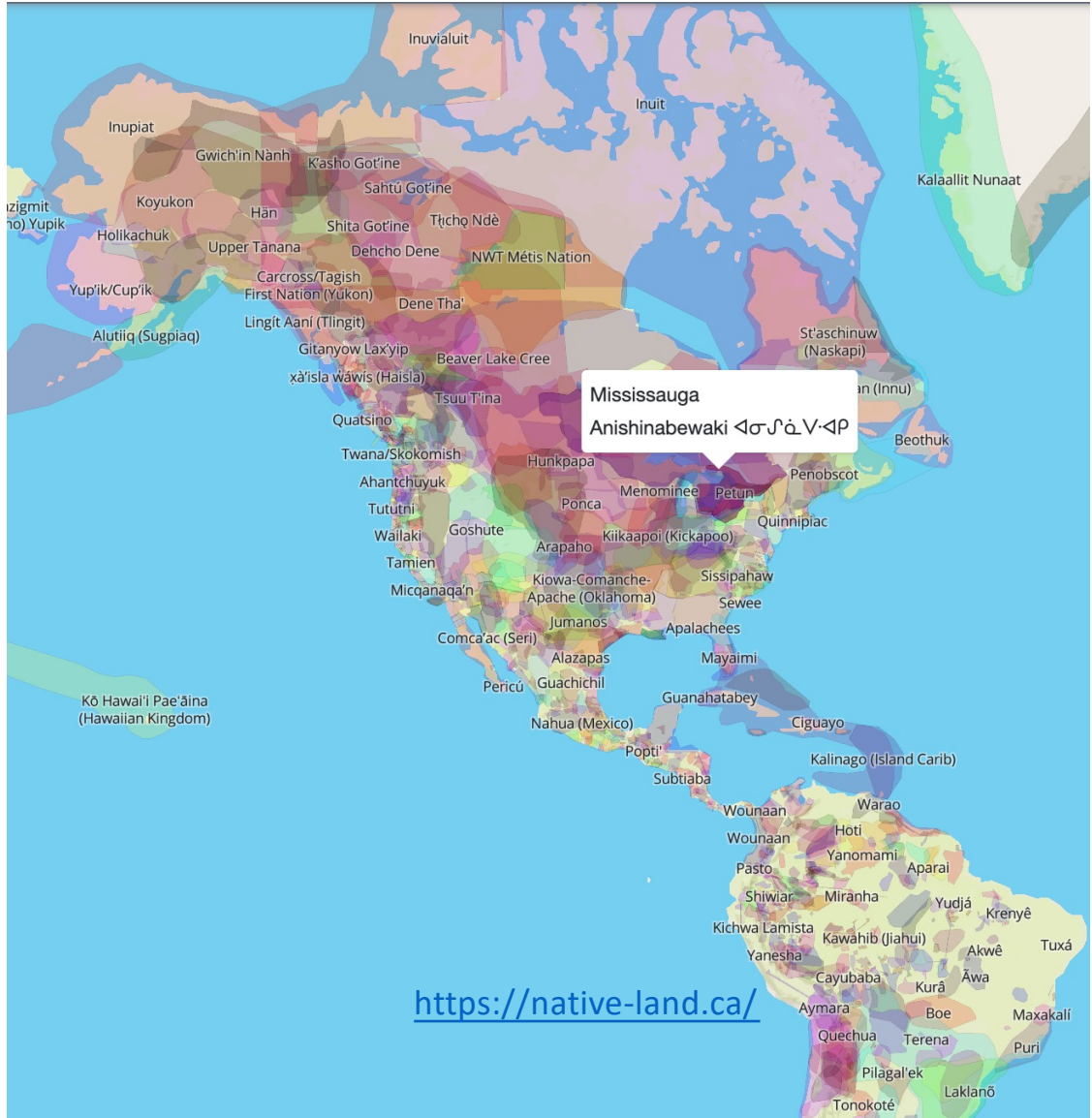

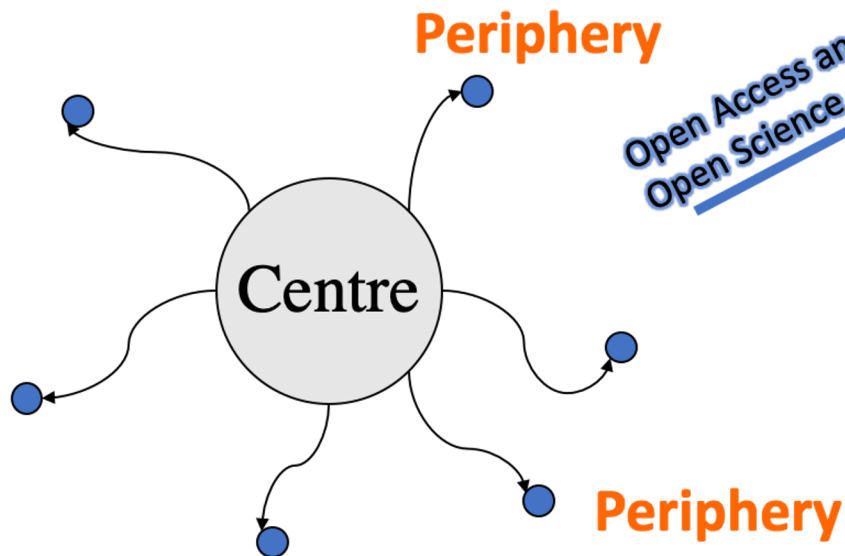

Early Assumptions

- Network is flat
- Open Access is key
- Participation is democratized and non-market driven
- Knowledge as a public good
- Scaling up is desirable and easy
- N-S and S-S flow of knowledge
- “Openness Determinism” (Sarah Lambert 2018)



Openness Determinism

“The “openness as good” theme emerged as a major alternative (non-social justice) theme in which the idea of what “openness” could achieve was fetishized as if it had some kind of inherent power, reminiscent of the technical determinist literature. Technological determinism is a problematic and ultimately ineffective approach to technology implementations, which assumes that the particular capabilities of new technologies will always improve the situations into which they are brought. Such over optimism tends to under-state the influence of people and the social context for the success – and also the failure — of particular technologies.”

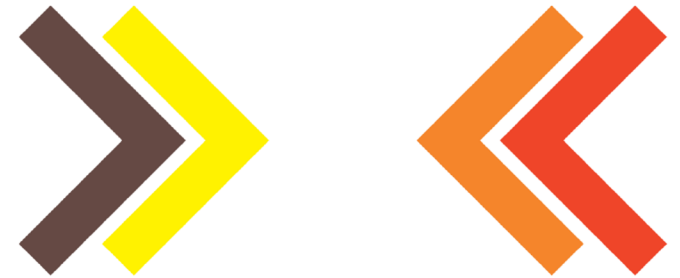

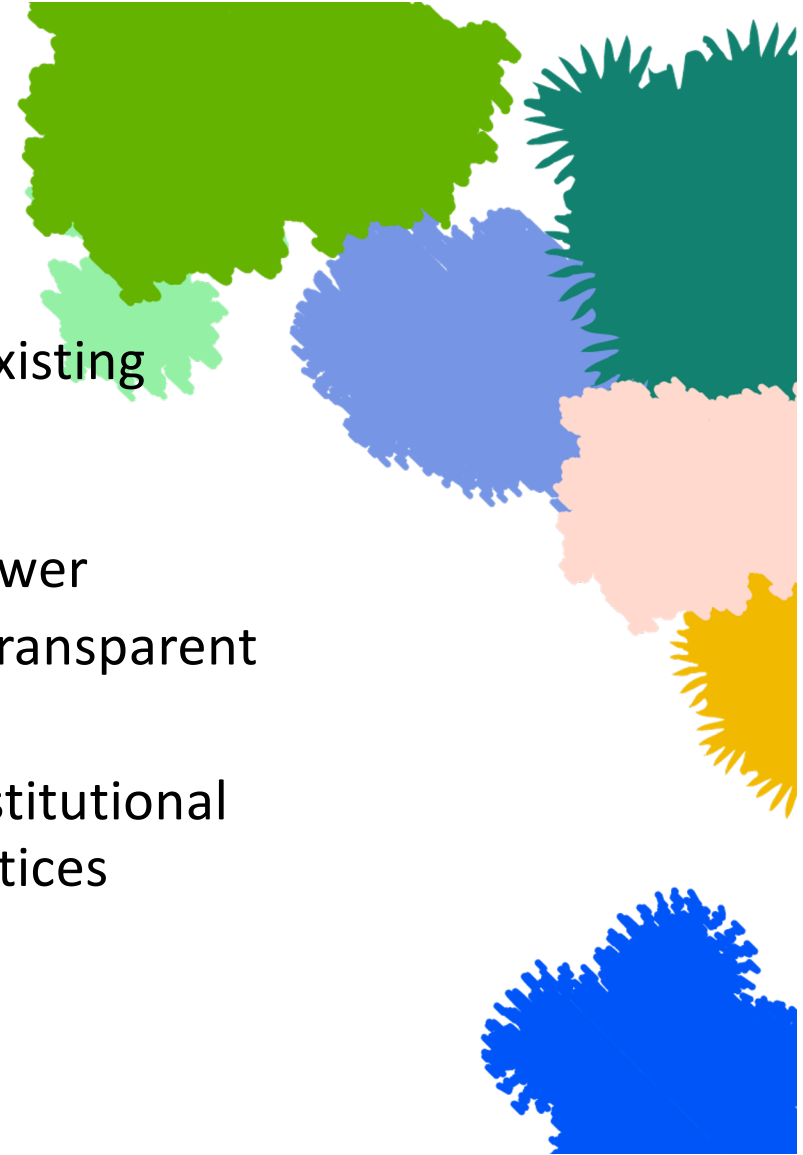
Situated Openness

Open \neq Equitable

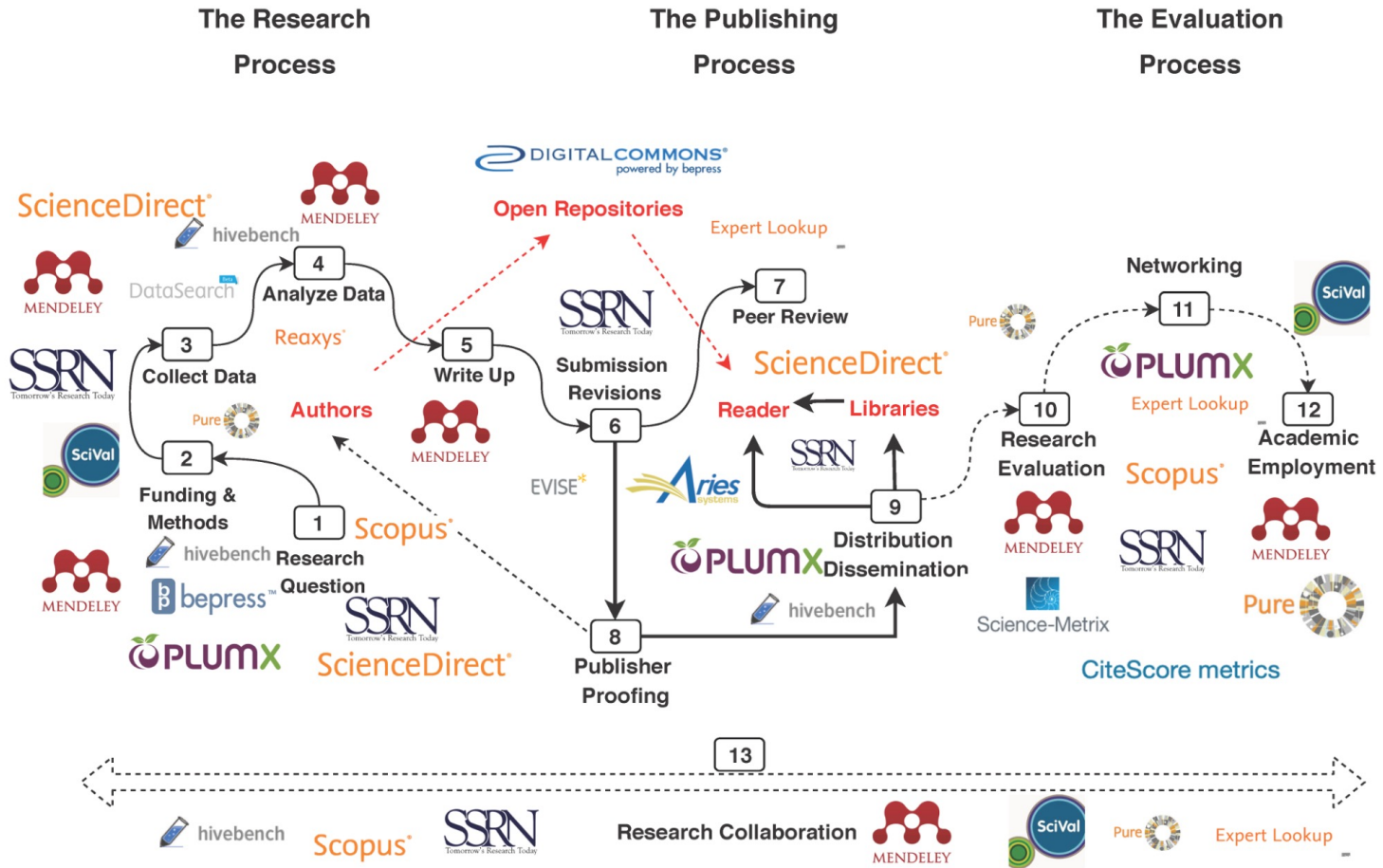
“openness” is not a binary condition, but is highly situational, contingent, and dependent on the positionality, privilege and contexts of the knowledge makers

Lessons learned...

- Open Access is not enough
- Digital Networks replicate and reinforce existing hierarchies
- Infrastructure is never neutral
- Network effect & the Concentration of Power
- Platform governance is opaque and non-transparent
- “Code is Law”
- The need to understand structural and institutional inequities built on racial and colonial practices
- Politicize and historicize “Openness”



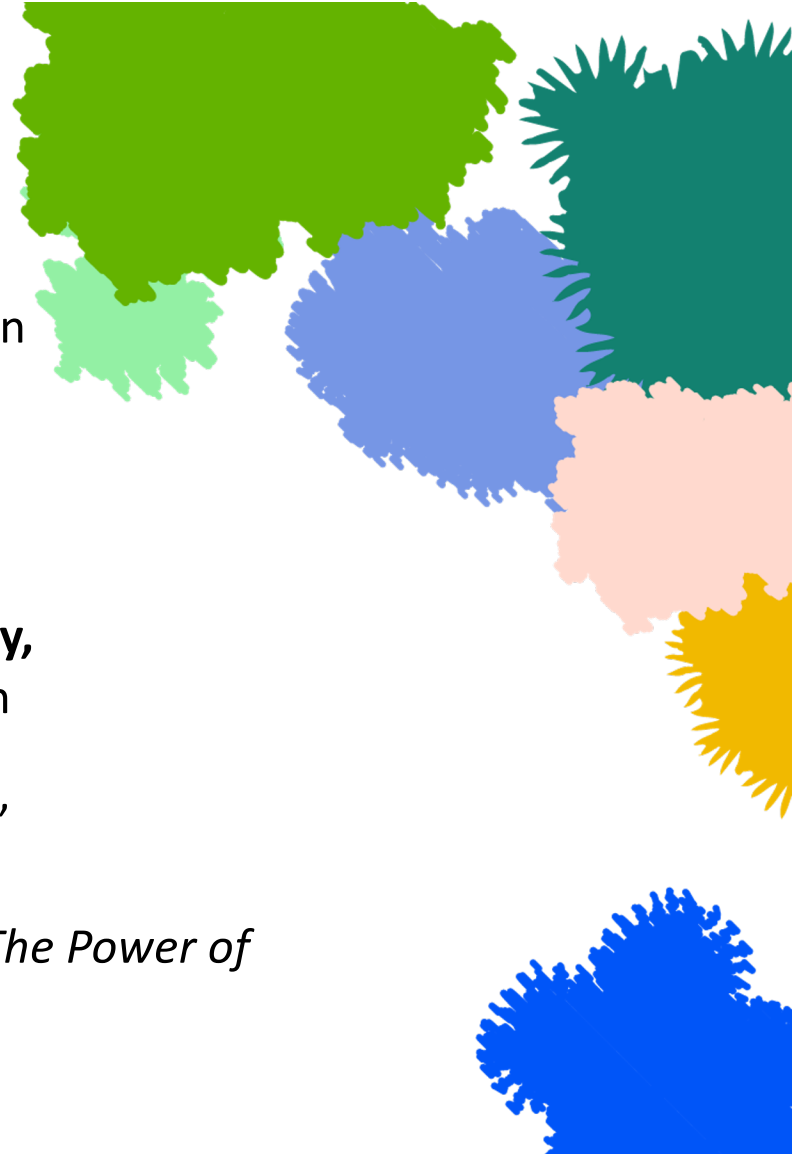
An Enclosed System of Knowledge Production

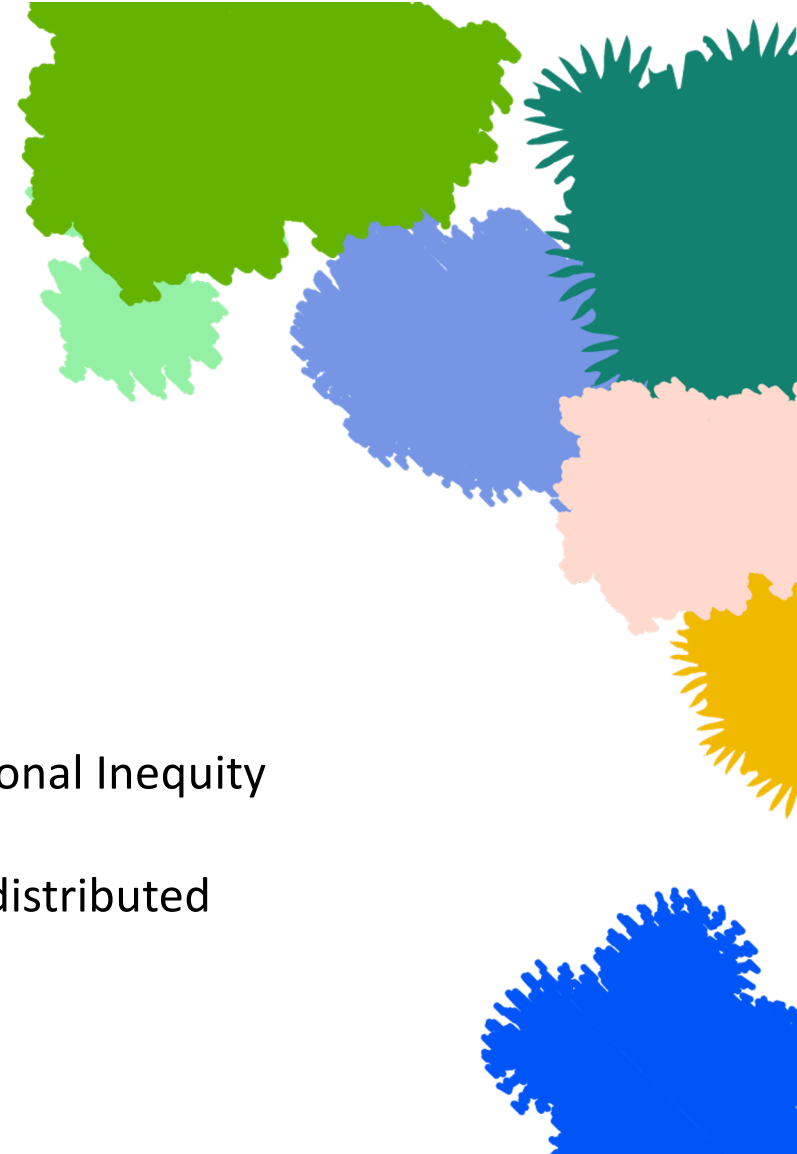

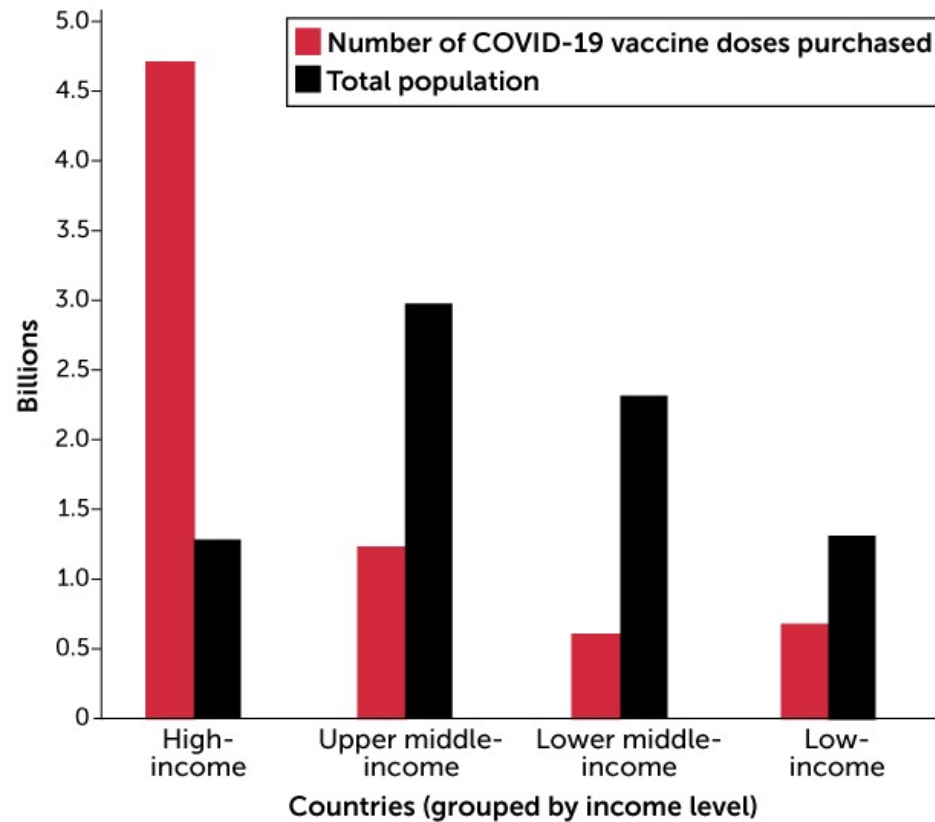
Vaccine Thinking and the Magic Bullet

“Scandalous” Vaccine Inequity

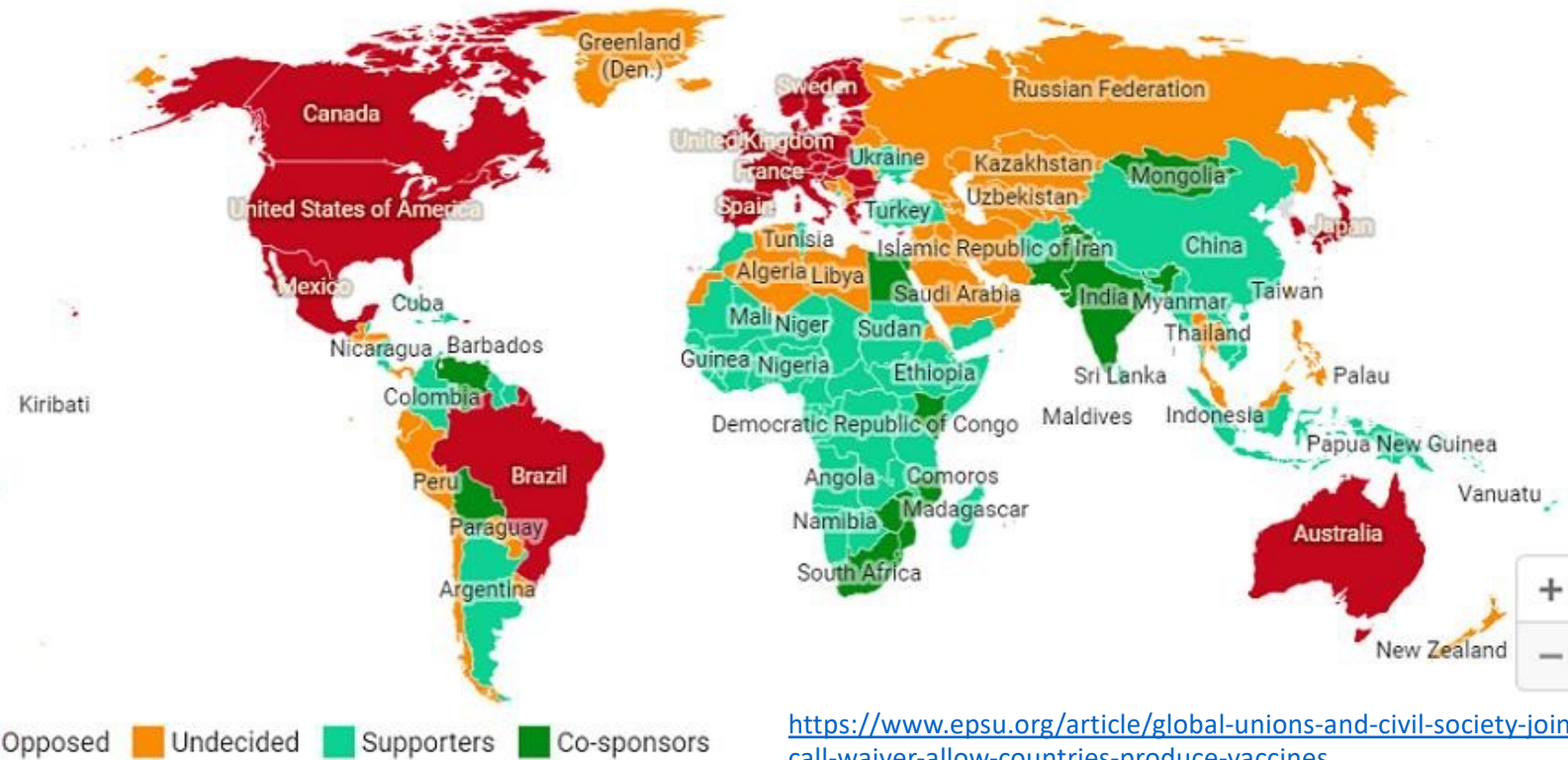
“More than 75% of all vaccines have been administered in just 10 countries” as of May 2021

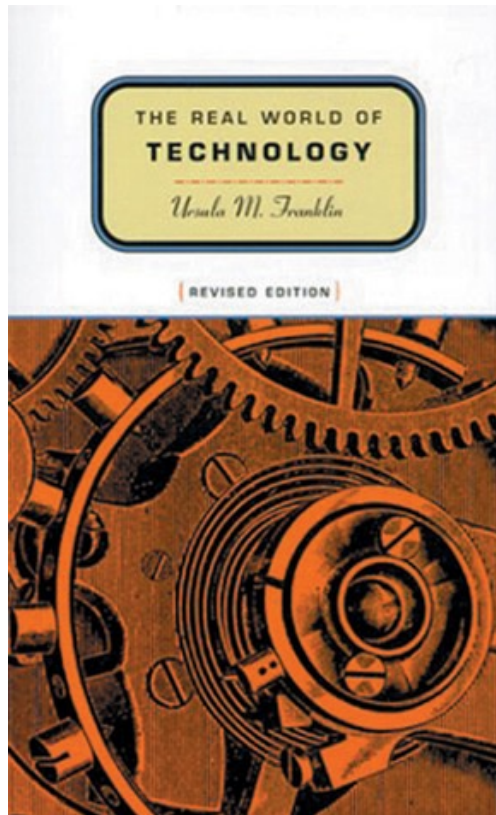

Social Vaccine

*A social vaccine is a process of social and political mobilisation which leads to increased government and other institutions' willingness to intervene with interventions, applied to populations rather than individuals, **aimed at mitigating the structural social and economic conditions that make people and communities vulnerable to disease, illness and trauma.** While medical vaccines help develop immunity against disease, **social vaccines develop the ability of communities to resist and change social and economic structures and processes that have a negative impact on health and force governments to intervene and regulate in the interests of community health.***

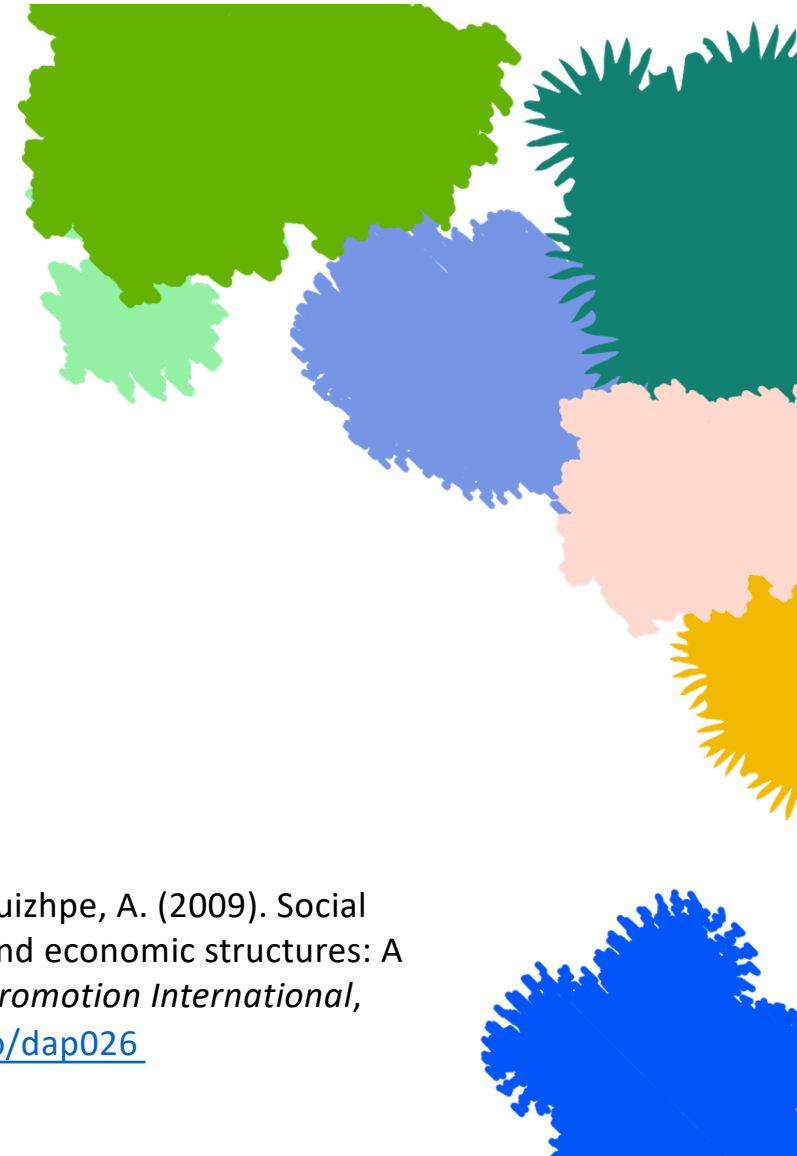

Social Vaccine for Knowledge Equity

- Community designed and governed infrastructure built on a **Pluriversal view of science and knowledge**
- Expanding the rights of research and participation in knowledge production
- Open Praxis as a framework that encompasses various scholarly and educational practices, supported by policy instruments designed to strengthen **community-governed tools and infrastructure** that ensure that the benefits of public investment in knowledge making are equitably shared
- Transition from an extractive to generative models of education and knowledge production (care economy) using holistic technology
