

. We focused on the unifying traits of curating qualitative data: in other words, beyond specific tools and types of qualitative data, what are the critical steps that apply to most iterations of qualitative data?

In that endeavor, we highlight different types of files that should be included in just about any qualitative data project, including the raw data, the processed data, a read me, that sort of thing; as well as questions that curators should ask when selecting a repository:



DIANA- Originally started as a supplemental primer to the NVivo primer in development, then considered a deep dive into 3 commonly used tools (Atlas.ti, Dedoose, NVivo) but we realized there were broader issues that would be more useful to address, such as validity and transparency in qualitative research.

## Challenges

- Scoping the primer
- Remaining system and data-type agnostic
- Accepting that our primer would age quickly
- Balancing usefulness with specificity
- Clarifying terminology and expectations particular to qualitative research
