Creating Migrant prototype	<i>Get the community to identify profile/s of migrant in the village.</i>	 <p>Step 1: In your village, typically, do men and women both migrate? 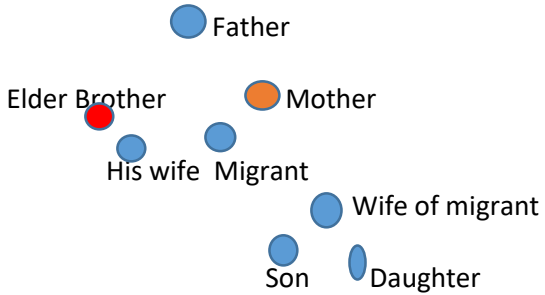

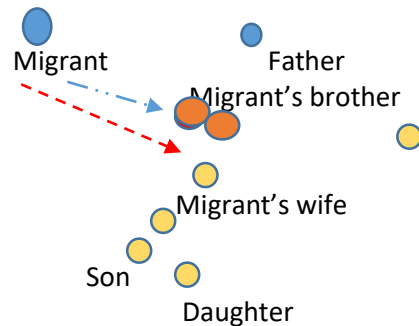
Discussion:

- What are the circumstances under which this member migrates usually? Give examples
- What would you say are his/ her main considerations when the individual decides to migrate?
- Are these decisions taken as a household or just individuals?
- Among the aspects of the migrants life we just listed – what are 1-2 key aspects that you believe influence the consideration to migrate for individuals or households?

		<p>for example if respondents differ amongst each other on the type (land size , if its more than one type then ask majority , if no majority and multiple groups , can create one more prototype per village)</p>		
	<p><i>Creating prototypes of 'left behind' family</i></p>	<p>Take the migrant and place the cutout on a blank sheet.</p> <p>Now introduce the participants to cutouts of other members in the family. (show each member and describe in relation to the migrant - immediate family residing with him only)</p> <p>Now ask the participants to place each member in relation to another in the order that signifies the decision making power of each member in the household. They could be at par above or below. Farther up from each member implies more difference in power , closer implies more proximity and less difference in power. One example of Before</p> 		

Now let us talk about the changes in the household after the migrant moves out of the house. What happens to the way these members left behind are placed in relationship to each other? (principle of farther the distance greater the power difference)

Remind the participant that distance of the migrant implies level of connection of the household member from the migrant.

Discussions

If positions are changed drastically ask how has it changed over time, was this change gradual?

Among the changes described whose role would you say has changed the most?
How?

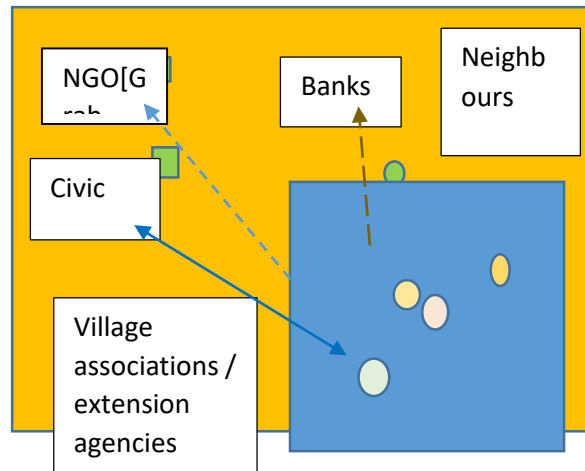
How has the workload of the members changed in these shifts you indicated?

- Why do you think their distance has reduced/ increased or unchanged?
- Has their individual roles in the running of the household shifted if yes why?
- Which family members role has changed the most? Why?

Step 3

Take the family prototype from before migration

Now place the before chart in the new canvass, give the place cards for the different social institutions to the participants and ask them to draw connections of different family members with different groups.



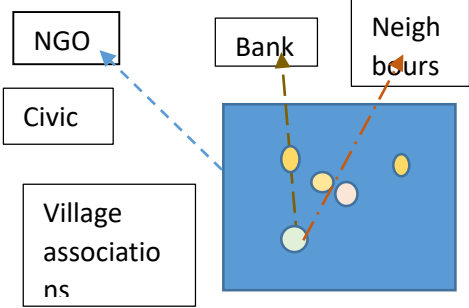
how do different members cope with the new roles? Has that been easy / difficult? Why?
