Summary: "The catalog provides a brief insight into the history of Svalbard and representative cultural monuments. Furthermore, it describes about 100 prioritized cultural monuments and cultural environments selected in the Cultural Heritage Plan for Svalbard 2013 - 2023. The catalog has been prepared as an appendix to the cultural heritage plan, but can be revised if necessary." (Google Translate)

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

Ch. 1 Introduction

- "At the Governor's, there is a large turnover, among other things due to the term. It leads to challenges in continuity and knowledge transfer. It becomes more difficult to have an overview of the history of the cultural monuments. This catalog has been prepared as an reference work for the Governor's own employees. We hope it can be useful to others." p. 5
- "The catalog is not intended to be a static and final document, but can be revised and updated by need. The sources are many, so the description of the cultural monuments and source references under each cultural heritage is by no means exhaustive." p. 5
- "There is currently no official division of the whole Svalbard in different geographical areas that are appropriate for use in this directory."



Map of cultural heritage areas (Sandodden 2013b: 86):



Ch. 2.1 Discovery


- "The first and most recognized hypothesis is that the archipelago was discovered when Willem Barentsz came to Svalbard in1596, when he was looking to find the Northeast Passage to Asia."
- "It is not unlikely that anyone discovered the archipelago before 1596, but we have no tangible, reliable evidence that there were people here before Barentsz and his crew."

My comments:

- Careful with the word discovery!
- This first hypothesis cannot be proven archaeologically but Barentsz' expedition left clear cartographic evidence.
- It would be more correct to say he was looking for a northeasterly passage.
- The search for such evidence has in the past driven the inofficial archaeological research agenda.

Ch. 2.2 Whaling (ca. 1600 – 1750) by Per Kyrre Reymert

- Four professionals give a short overview of Svalbard's history and representative cultural heritage
- Mostly descriptive
- Spotlight: Per Kyrre Reymert (*1945)
 - An archaeologist and historian previously employed by Tromsø Museum and Sysselmesteren
 - Known for the registration of cultural heritage sites in Svalbard
 - About 91 hits on Google Scholar dating back to 1979 (Cultural monuments on Svalbard, Polar Record, 1979)
 - Frequently overview articles or reports as opposed to primary research papers
 - No hits on orcid.org

2.2 Whaling (ca. 1600 – 1750) by Per Kyrre Reymert

- West European whaling began in 1611, lasted till the end of the century
- Land-based whaling stations
- At times, more than 300 ships in pursuit of the bowhead whale
- At the end of the 1600s, the Dutch alone sent 150-250 ships, with a yearly catch between 750 and 1250 whales
- In the mid-1600s, whaling in the bays stopped and moved westward away from the coasts and fjords
 - Blubber was tried out on board or in the home countries
 - Occasionally, the land was still used for blubber ovens in the 1700s
 - Whalers also used Svalbard for burials and fresh water

- Whalers came from what are today England, the Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, France, North Spain, North Germany, Norway
- English and Dutch whaling were organized into the Muscovy Company and the Noordsche Compagnie
- But Svalbard and the surrounding sea did not belong to anyone: right of the fittest


2.2 Whaling (ca. 1600 – 1750) by Per Kyrre Reymert


- Whaling was a summer activity
- Whalers came up in April/May and stayed for as long as there were whales, often till September
- Some did two trips; some sent their catch down with a freighter
- It was important to come early
 - to get the best places for land stations
 - because the whales were at the ice edge and moved northwards with the advancing summer
 - To protect one's stored equipment from others
- Whaling was motivated by high prices for whale oil and baleen
 - Oil had a great number of uses
 - Baleen was the plastic of the time


- For a description/depiction of the whaling process, see slide 13
- The Basques were at first the only ones who could catch whales and were hired as harpooners and for special tasks
- No women are known
- Children may have been on board [No mention or other evidence!]
- Overwinterings
 - 1630-1: an accident, 9 English at Lægerneset, 1 died
 - 1633-4: Dutch at Smeerenburg
 - 1634-5: Dutch at Smeerenburg, all died
 - No other overwinterings

























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2.2 Whaling (ca. 1600 – 1750) by Per Kyrre Reymert

- Cultural heritage
- "Western European whaling is the activity that has produced the most protected cultural monuments on Svalbard. Control and new registrations will change the information below." p. 12
- About 50 land stations
 - Building platforms (8 sites named)
 - Blubber ovens, single, double, triple, with blubber cement (15 sites named)
 - Burial grounds (750 graves known, 3 sites named)
 - Whale bone remains
 - Good harbours for sailing vessels
 - Flat ground for structures
 - Fresh water

- "The locations used by the whalers were so good and convenient that others have used them later." p. 12
- "Whaling took place all over Svalbard, however mainly on the west coast, with the greatest activity in the northwest." p. 13 [A map of the sites shows greater differentiation. Over time?]
- At Svalbard Museum, there is a great store of loose objects from archaeological investigations






2.2 Whaling (ca. 1600 – 1750) by Per Kyrre Reymert

- Kunnskap (Knowledge)
- "There have been research studies and emergency excavations of whaling's cultural monuments. They are included in the systematic registrations, in special registrations with test excavation and documented in surveys and field inspections. The registrations are entered in Askeladden. The material from the investigations has provided scientific publications with, among others, the infrastructure, textiles, and health / disease." p. 13



The catalog has not been tested against other research foci.




