

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



COPIM is committed to exploring solutions to some of the most pressing barriers currently preventing small publishers from interfacing with large-scale organisations and processes. As a result, COPIM is developing a significantly enriched, not-for-profit and open-source ecosystem for open access (OA) book publishing; one that will support and sustain a diversity of publishing initiatives and models, particularly within Humanities and Social Sciences (HSS) publishing.

The adoption of alternative infrastructures, business models, preservation structures, and governance procedures, all to be scoped and developed through COPIM, will enable increased economic resilience and enhanced capacities for the publication and dissemination of open access books at smaller and larger scales. COPIM's approach offers Higher Education institutions and HSS researchers sustainable publishing models that they control, increased publishing options, and new revenue streams and cost reductions, designed to help build a more equitable horizontal and co-operative knowledge sharing community.

During the second year of the project, COPIM has continued its work in the areas of collaborative research, infrastructure development, project management and outreach and community building. Further evolving its approach to cope with the continued and compounding challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic and Brexit have offered to the Higher Education sector and beyond, the project has succeeded in meeting the vast majority of its deliverables and milestones across all work packages, in some areas even outperforming the initial goals set.

The list of key output and activities delivered includes the:

- publication of six new major scoping reports;
- successful organisation and documentation of 15 workshops overall, with more than 190 national and international high-profile stakeholders representing 22 countries;
- set-up and iterative extension of an Outreach and Dissemination network
 that is combining a variety of channels including social media and open
 community platforms;
- beta launch and continuous further development of Thoth, COPIM's Open Dissemination System. Thoth now makes open access book metadata available in an open, transparent, and participatory way. It will see further integration into the larger context of the Open Book Collective, among other outlets, to be developed in Year 3 and beyond.

The COPIM project has continued and deepened its engagement with the work packages' variety of stakeholders (i.e., librarians, publishers, researchers, technology providers, and the general public), bringing together key experts and those interested in learning more about scholar-led, not-for-profit, OA book publishing. Alongside its own event organisation and outreach activities, COPIM has been involved in the *Open Access Book Network*, while COPIM team members have been invited to participate in a variety of external conferences, events, and networks by organisations and projects such as *Invest in Open Infrastructure*, *OASPA*, *OPERAS*, *LIBER*, the *Next Generation Libraries Publishing project*, *OpenAIRE*, *The British Library*, *COAR*, *EIFL*, and the *European Open Science Cloud*.

The sustained progress against the original plan during this second year is particularly noteworthy as the project had to work with the continued and compounding effects of the various challenges that COPIM saw in its first-year set-up. As already outlined during the first year Brexit and the pandemic – and the systemic effects these events continue to have on the Higher Education sector as a whole – governed much of the project work on COPIM. As a result, the project had

to accommodate further delays in staff recruitment and an increase in pandemicrelated limitations to availability of staff members due to extended care duties and the toll on health of all involved.

Despite these challenges COPIM, together with its stakeholders, is now well positioned to implement the open infrastructures and systems of governance conceptualised over its first two years, while continuing to develop its research and project management structures. COPIM has requested a six-month no-cost extension from its funders to make effective use of budget underspend accrued during the project's lifetime because of the pandemic, and to enable the team to continue its work on the envisioned open infrastructures for monographs.

ANALYSIS OF PROGRESS AGAINST TIMETABLE: OVERVIEW

This report is the second of three annual reports to be submitted to Arcadia – a charitable fund of Lisbet Rausing and Peter Baldwin, by the Community-Led Open Publication Infrastructures for Monographs (COPIM) project.

Background

COPIM looks to transform Open Access (OA) book publishing by delivering major improvements in the infrastructures used both by OA book publishers and by those publishers making a transition to OA books. In view of that goal, COPIM is now in the midst of scoping, developing and building the critical underlying modular components to support the sustainable publication of OA books. These include:

- Infrastructures (WP2 and 5), including a fully functional consortial library funding platform and an Open Dissemination System (ODS) for the integration of OA books into discovery systems;
- Business models (WP2 and 3), including an online toolkit and two pilot cases with existing OA publishers and publishers wanting to transition to OA monographs;
- Governance procedures (WP4), including community-approved best practices for the governance of open source collectively owned infrastructures and OA presses;
- Re-use strategies (WP6) to promote OA book content discovery, interaction, and reuse as well as the development and interaction with emergent genres of scholarship;
- Preservation structures (WP7) for the archiving of complex OA books;
- **Outreach programs** (all WPs) including extensive knowledge exchange activities with a range of HE and publishing stakeholder partners.

These systems and infrastructures will be open, collectively managed for the common good, and will map onto existing publishing workflows (e.g., from publisher to library) while also re-engineering them.

As a result, COPIM is developing a significantly enriched not-for-profit and opensource ecosystem for OA book publishing that will support and sustain a diversity of publishing initiatives and models, particularly within HSS publishing.

Achievements

During its second year, the project has further developed its work on collaborative research, open infrastructures, project management, and outreach. COPIM's work packages have built on the communities that have been engaged during Year 1, to synthesising the collected research data, conducting landscape studies including several scoping reports, and consulting stakeholders via workshops and participation in external events. All of this has been carried out in preparation and support of the infrastructures, the pilot cases, and the governance and preservation structures that the project has started to develop in Year 2 and will further finetune and create communities around in Year 3. In parallel, the project has been developing its underlying philosophy and organisational principle of 'scaling small',1' which informs its overall activity, engaging the work packages in a dialogue around how this can be implemented and put into practice.

COPIM has been able to meet the majority of activities and outputs set out in its initial business plan and project proposal successfully. The main results achieved during COPIM's second year include the:

- publication of six major scoping reports, comprising the:
 - WP2 Scoping Report The Promise of Collaboration: Collective Funding Models and the Integration of Open Access Books into Libraries;
 - WP2 Scoping Report Academic Libraries and Open Access Books in Europe: a Landscape Study;
 - WP4 Research Report Exploring Models for Community Governance;
 - WP6 Research and Scoping Report Books Contain Multitudes: Exploring Experimental Publishing;
 - WP6 Research Report Promoting and Nurturing Interactions with Open Access Books: Strategies for Publishers and Authors;

- A substantial update to the WP5 Scoping Report Building an Open Dissemination System.
- The highly successful implementation of COPIM's Opening the Future model whereby library members pay a small annual fee to get unlimited multi-user access to eBooks from the publishers' backlists, and the membership revenue is then used to produce new OA monographs. This programme is facilitating the transition of two publishers Central European University Press and Liverpool University Press toward an open access-amenable business model.
- The successful organisation and documentation of 15 workshops overall, through which COPIM has engaged with more than 190 national and international stakeholders from the UK, US, Africa, Latin America, Australia, New Zealand, and Europe to establish communities on a variety of overarching open access book-related topics;
- The development of COPIM's Open Dissemination System Thoth, a tool and service to make open access book metadata available in an open and transparent way, and successful real-life implementation thereof with four OA book publishers;
- The setup and iterative extension of a set of Outreach and Dissemination activities that are combining a variety of channels including social media and open community platforms;
- The development of three Pilot Projects of experimental books, co-created with international communities of scholars and three scholar-led presses:
 Open Humanities Press, Open Book Publishers, and Mattering Press

Activities and Outputs

The project has successfully fostered engagement with the work packages' variety of stakeholders (i.e., librarians, publishers, scholars, technology providers, and the general public), bringing together key experts and those interested in learning more about scholar-led not-for-profit OA book publishing. In addition to the workshops organised by COPIM and participation at more than 30 international conferences, the team has also supported and contributed to events and workshops held by external stakeholders and organisations working towards goals that are mutually beneficial (following the previously mentioned principle of 'scaling small'). These organisations include:

- Invest in Open Infrastructure's Future of Scholarship project;
- Knowledge Futures Group;
- the Open Access Scholarly Publishers Association (<u>OASPA</u>);
- OPERAS;
- Ligue des Bibliothèques Européennes de Recherche Association of European Research Libraries (LIBER);
- the <u>Next Generation Libraries Project</u>;
- OpenAIRE, COAR, and EIFL;
- International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA);
- The British Library;
- the publishing initiative and project <u>cache</u>;
- and the Open Access Books Network.

In addition to that, notable collaborations were sought with e.g. the European Science Cloud's Provider Marketplace and EOSC Pillar; the German Federal Ministry for Education and Research-funded projects KOALA, CODRIA, and Scholar-led Plus, the German scholar-led.network initiative, LYRASIS, and the Embedding Preservability project.

Impact

In its second year, COPIM has built on the impact achieved across all work packages in Year 1 and exceeded the set deliverables and milestones in most of its work packages. Engagement with key stakeholders (including publishers, knowledge managers, and librarians) from the UK, United States, Europe, Africa, Australia, and New Zealand has been deepened, and the many new connections established has meant that interest in COPIM's approach from external stakeholders is mirrored in the consistently high engagement numbers that are available from the list of outputs (see Appendix) generated by the project so far.

Building on the now-established Outreach programme, COPIM's engagement of library stakeholders has continued to exceed the project's initial plan:

Opening the Future, the business model devised to support traditional presses with transitioning towards an OA-amenable, non-BPC-based future, is seeing impressive uptake. Since it launched, two respected publishers have come on board and library membership uptake has already accrued enough funding for 5 monographs. To date, CEU Press' implementation has 24 library members, several of which have opted to subscribe to more than one package of books, garnering 37 annual subscriptions that will be used to pay for new OA front list titles. The model was also a finalist at the ALPSP 'Innovation in Publishing' Awards.

Early discussions with libraries regarding the *Open Book Collective* platform and model is similarly garnering a lot of interest.

During Year 2 all Work Packages have been very active in promoting COPIM's proposed alternative vision through reports, presentations and original research. A list of detailed outputs is available in the Appendix section.

Challenges

Continuing its project work against the adverse effects of unprecedented global upheaval that permeated all aspects of the delivery process, the project's main challenges include:

- **Brexit**, and its impact on the economy, with the British Pound's intermittent loss in value, which has been affecting project payments to US- and EU-based partners particularly; and the corresponding uncertainties around the viability of contractual setups with international partners (EU, US), and their future sustainability due to the increased possibility of changing legislation (e.g., GDPR and continuing uncertainty around the UK's future (non-)compliance).²
- The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. During the project's second year, COVID-19's effect on the Higher Education sector has become tangible in substantial ways, resulting in a shrinking of the budgets available to a sizeable portion of COPIM's external stakeholders,³ which in turn might mean less

willingness to engage in the transformative approach that COPIM is proposing. On a more pragmatic level, the pandemic's impact had a compounding effect during Year 2 on the project's recruitment strategy, as many of the partners were seeing recruitment limitations enforced in their institutions (such as not allowing employees to work outside of the country in which the institution is based, even during periods of lock-down), which in turn led to delays in getting some of the open WP positions filled. Next to these limitations, which in turn required substantial extra work to navigate the resulting uncertainties, the pandemic also created a set of very personal challenges for the team: many team members were either dealing with a notable increase in care duties or had to observe quarantining due to contact with the virus, which in turn substantially impacted on members' availability and called for a flexible approach to meeting management and general workflows in the project.

Similar to Year 1, the project's second year has been fraught with uncertainties and shifting parameters. This has been particularly evident on the level of Outreach & Engagement activities: the pandemic has largely inhibited COPIM's ability to meet experts in the same physical space for the purpose of building community around the various project outputs. This also holds true for the team's engagement in internal team building, as well as face-to-face meetings (e.g., the project's biannual meetings). By approaching these challenges in a creative way, during Year 1 of the project the team has succeeded in establishing a number of alternative channels for interaction, networking, and knowledge sharing. The team has also continued with iteratively updating the Risk Register, which will be included in this report's Appendix section.

The new modes of engagement made necessary by the pandemic have also led to an increase in workshops planned by COPIM members. In many respects, the updated mode of delivery has proven beneficial for COPIM, with increased efficiency in organising logistics and participants through a more streamlined setup also allowing the project team to include participants from a wider range of geographic locations, and further extending stakeholder engagement to regions that tend to be underrepresented in the larger OA discourse.⁴

It needs to be noted, though, that while the move to online workshops has allowed for greater responsiveness, focus, and participation, deficits of this new mode of

engagement also become apparent in the sometimes burdensome increase of video meetings, with "Zoom fatigue" always looming around the corner, and the loss of rich social interaction that in-person, face-to-face meetings offer, with the corresponding lack of ability to engage more with possible stakeholders in order to foster deeper in-person networking.

Nonetheless, it is safe to say that the underlying systemic problems that have become apparent during the early months of the pandemic have also brought the team to reflect further on the ways in which the project work is made discoverable and reusable in a transparent manner.

Outlook

Working in an open and transparent manner, COPIM continues to make its outputs and processes available on the project website and COPIM's Open Documentation site, both of which are regularly updated to establish a clear timeline of COPIM's research, findings, and processes. In the same vein, COPIM has continued to work across all its work packages to establish a sustainable archiving workflow to make all project outputs available as early as possible, in an open and transparent manner, and under permissive open licenses on the open-source, EU-funded Zenodo repository. For the facilitation of project management and team communications, COPIM is committed to using open-source technologies and corresponding open infrastructures wherever possible.⁵

Overall, the research projects, project management structure, and outreach networks that have been established in Year 1 have proven truly valuable to support the actual development of infrastructures, pilot cases, and the governance and preservation structures that the team is now working hard to implement and will continue to build communities around in Year 3. COPIM has also discussed a no-cost project extension of six months with Arcadia and the Research England Development Fund.

Focusing on the output categories of *Collaborative Research*, *Infrastructure Development*, and *Outreach Activities & Community Building*, the following paragraphs will present the project's progress in more detail and with reference to each of the work packages. In addition to that, concise lists of *Outcomes* and *Impact* achieved over the first and second year are provided as part of the Appendix to this report.

WP2. Revenue Infrastructures and Management Platform

WP2 is working to develop and launch a modular, scalable revenue generation and management platform for open access books, which is to be made available to publishers and libraries. As currently envisioned, it will be scoped and built by a team of publishers, knowledge managers, and librarians working in partnership to develop new funding channels for open access books.

In Year 2, WP2 has been focusing on synthesising those scoping efforts conducted during its first year. This has culminated in the publication of two major scoping reports on collaborative business models, and the role that open access books play in the European library landscape. Alongside that, development efforts have continued apace, with the team working to facilitate the onboarding of a new software development agency, and to plan ahead with regards to the extended outreach work that will be taking place all through Year 3 and up to the end of the project.

Outreach Activities

At the start of Year 2, WP2 had successfully completed its expanded set of workshops. This comprised four more events in close collaboration with the EUfunded OPERAS-P project, and focused on libraries from different European regions and their engagement with OA books. These workshops investigated OA books policies, funding structures, integration of OA books into library catalogues, engagement of libraries with OA in general, and a survey of scholar-/academic-/library-led activities in those European countries represented in the study. The resulting Scoping Report (see *Collaborative Research*) was then presented at the OPERAS-P end-of-project conference in April 2021.

The initial set of outreach activities had been completed at the end of 2020. The Work Package is now planning to develop a concise concept to foster uptake of the platform that has, in parallel, also continued with conceptual development. Two new part-time Outreach Specialist positions (with foci on the US and Europe, respectively) have now been established to ensure more resources are available when the library-facing outreach work starts in earnest in Year 3.

Collaborative Research

The overall substantial impact of COVID-19 on COPIM team members and the corresponding reduction in availability was particularly experienced in WP2. This in turn led to a compounded delay in being able to complete the **Scoping Report**.

Having consolidated and re-prioritized some of the WP's activities, the Scoping Report had been successfully published in project month 16, under the title The Promise of Collaboration: Collective Funding Models and the Integration of Open Access Books into Libraries. The collaboration between COPIM and OPERAS-P has also led to a further publication in the form of the Academic Libraries and Open Access Books in Europe: a Landscape Study scoping report. With more than 4,000 combined views and 2,400 downloads to date on Zenodo alone, both reports had a wide reception from the larger open access community and beyond.

Infrastructure Development

While the delivery of WP2's **Design Specifications** for the platform – which will now be running under the name of *Open Book Collective* – has experienced further delay due to the impact of COVID-19 on team availability, all of which was complicated by a change in software development agency, the specifications document has now been finalized and made publicly available via Zenodo.

Next to the work on conceptualizing the platform's software development aspects, the team has succeeded in developing a **5-year financial / business plan**. This plan has evolved over the past 21 months to take account of the systemic changes in the HE landscape caused by to the pandemic. The team now intend to present a more encompassing offer as part of the platform; an offer that extends beyond the focus on the ScholarLed group of publishers alone, as outlined in the original grant application, to include a wider set of OA publishing and infrastructure initiatives. The business plan will support that argument and offer, with an underlying assumption that the platform will be able to meet the initially defined revenue target, albeit with a lower number of libraries onboarded by the end of COPIM's regular project period. As a contingency, WP2 is also modelling for 'bad case' scenarios to account for further pandemic uncertainties that might mean the estimated revenue figures will not be met immediately.

Closely connected to WP2's work on developing the platform and business plan, the team have also begun to work closely with WP4 to conceive and establish a **Governance structure** for the platform. In this period, WP2 and WP4 held four workshops about governance, involving representatives from the ScholarLed publishing group, librarians, DOAB, Jisc, and the Humanities Commons Working Group. The team established the values and ethos that should underlie the whole

workshops conducted in WP2 indicated that many of them are already seeing library budgets being put under massive pressure both in the UK and internationally (based on US, UK, and EU respondents' feedback).

of COPIM's governance procedures, discussed questions of accountability, and explored a range of models for how the platform might enable equitable, horizontal relationships in scholarly communication. In the third workshop the team discussed which governance structure(s) or mixture of structures would fit COPIM or its various elements best and why, always doing so in relation to COPIM's mission and values. WP2 members explored this question from the perspective of the platform and concluded that its governance would need to be seen as a distinct element of COPIM which would need its own structure under the umbrella of the larger project. The team have now produced a draft model and diagram for the governance of the platform, which was presented at the fourth governance workshop.

WP3. Knowledge Exchange and Piloting Alternative Business Models

WP3 is dedicated to knowledge exchange and transfer, as part of the project's central commitment to dissemination. It builds pathways to impact with relevant stakeholders from across the sector, including publishers (new) university presses, library-presses, scholar-led presses, academics, learned societies, and open technology developers.

To that end, WP3 has built on the foundational research and initial stakeholder engagement that had been put into practice during the first year. Investigation into the legal and contractual prerequisites for setting up pilots to transition the business models of at least two extant publishers to new open access models bore fruit and the pilot model is now advertised and actively taking subscriptions under the *Opening the Future* label. This is a collective library subscription model. It is underpinned by the idea that small contributions from a large number of academic libraries means that no single institution bears a disproportionate burden. In essence, library subscriptions to backlist books pay for new OA frontlist books to be published – a situation from which scholars and institutions around the world stand to benefit.

Technical and platform development led to subsequent engagement of two publishers – Central European University Press, and Liverpool University Press – and much of the work during Y2 has focused on integrating with library acquisition workflows and invoicing, in conjunction with Jisc (UK) and LYRASIS (US). Both pilot case studies are now fully operational as of summer 2021, with libraries able to support these presses' OA models through individual sign-ups or via Jisc, LYRASIS and sales agents.

Opening the Future has had some success and is gradually scaling up: the model's library membership has already accrued enough funding for five monographs. To date, CEU Press' implementation has 24 library members, several of which have opted to subscribe to more than one package of books, garnering 37 annual subscriptions that will be used to pay for new OA frontlist titles. The model was also a finalist at the ALPSP 'Innovation in Publishing' Awards.

Outreach Activities

In Year 2, outreach work in WP3 has primarily focused on promoting the *Opening* the Future model. To that end, the WP lead has been invited to speak at a variety of national and international conferences and workshops, including sessions at the

Jisc/CNI Library Leaders conference; LIBER, UKSG and ALPSP; the German OA Tage conference; Society for Scholarly Publishers; the UK National Acquisitions Group; Canadian Association for Research Libraries; the Munin Conference in Norway; the Open Access Conference at San José State University, and the Charleston Conference in the USA.

Collaborative Research

The research project conducted in collaboration with colleagues in WP2 during Year 1 had investigated business models for OA monographs, culminating in a major **Scoping Report**, *Revenue Models for Open Access Monographs*. This report provides a concise analysis of the open access economic models in use today in scholarly publishing. It comprises a diachronic overview and synthesis of studies published on the subject in the past ten years, and also updates these research findings to include the environment and economics of OA publishing in 2020. With more than 3,300 visits and 1,700 downloads on Zenodo, the report has had a wide international reception.

The scoping report is envisioned to become one component of a practical 'toolkit' that WP3 is developing to enable interested presses to convert to OA-amenable business models. These will in turn allow for the establishing of sustainable OA monograph publishing outlets.

Infrastructure Development

The continuous collaboration between WPs 3 and 2 has also led to increasingly aligned conceptual work, which is now exploring the potential of integrating the *Opening the Future* model as part of the larger *Open Book Collective* platform offer.

WP4. Community Governance

Work Package 4 has been conducting research to develop governance procedures to support COPIM's open publication ecosystem for monographs. Building on the strong research-led conceptual and outreach work that has been started during the first year, WP4's research work has now culminated in the publication of a major research report which has formulated various theoretical models for Community Governance and their implementation.

Following up on the work with other Work Packages in COPIM to establish organisational structures for the coordination, governance and administrative support of the project's community-owned infrastructures, a co-design and co-development approach has been successfully implemented. This approach has been put into practice via four internal workshops which took place throughout the first half of 2021, and which included members of all COPIM's work packages and members of the Humanities Commons Working Group, established by WP4 in Year 1. (Dr Judith Fathallah wrote a blogpost summarising the workshop findings here.) These workshops were set up to explore and develop a shared understanding of governance within the project, including which governance models are preferred. These workshops have also informed the drafting of COPIM's Code of Conduct, and the further development of joint statements on the Mission and Vision, Principles and Values, Goals and Objectives, Resources, and History and Narrative underlying COPIM and its communities.

Going forward, WP4 will continue to work closely with the other work packages on COPIM, with a particular focus on the needs of WP2 and its requirements regarding practical implementation of governance in the context of the *Open Book Collective* platform and community.

Outreach Activities & Community Building

Building on the network of communities that had been established in Year 1 through COPIM's **Community Governance Workshop**, and the **Community Governance Working Group** that has been set up on the Humanities Commons platform, existing connections have been deepened. These include those with the Next Generation Library Publishing project and the OPERAS-P project, both of which have also been conducting research on governance.

Internal outreach with the various COPIM WPs has provided a clearer view on the variety of governance needs within COPIM with respect to the infrastructures,

models, and pilot cases the project is developing – most notably in connection with WP2's **Open Book Collective**, and WP3's **Opening the Future**.

Collaborative Research

The research conducted in 2020 on best practices for the governance of open source community-owned infrastructures has now culminated in the publication of WP4's first major research report *Exploring Models for Community Governance* (D4.2), which maps existing organisational governance models, and discusses their applicability to the context of COPIM. In addition to that, Janneke Adema's and Samuel Moore's research article on 'Scaling Small', the philosophy and organisational principle informing the COPIM project, has been published in the OA journal *Westminster Papers in Communication and Culture*. Meanwhile, WP4 colleague Sherri Barnes has published an essay for *College and Research Libraries News* on COPIM as a Transformative OA Monograph Initiative, which had been published in December 2020. The WP has also led on the co-development of a Code of Conduct, and has formulated documents on the mission, vision, values and principles underlying COPIM, the resources, objectives, community, and narrative that underlie the project, along with the organisational structures that best fit the project.

The continuation of research on the WP has been slightly delayed due to a change in staffing in Q2 2021, with our new colleague Dr Patrick Hart having started in September 2021. Accordingly, the WP has had to re-align its timeline for deliverables to the development of the OBC platform, where WP2 has also seen some slight delays. Together with WP2, WP4 is currently working on realigned deliverables, including *Official Policies and Procedures for Self-Governance and Administrative Management of the Community-owned Infrastructure* (D4.11 – realigned from M16 to M24 to line-up with the Open Book Collective (OBC) Betaplatform development), which will be finalised before the Beta-launch of the OBC. Dr Lidia Uziel has also started work on identifying the *Governance Community/Collective of Representative Stakeholders (Publishers and Researchers*) (M4.3) that will make up the OBC's governance. Dr Hart is currently working on a *Research report on Best Practices for Governance of Open-Source Community-Owned Infrastructures* (D4.3) that will reflect the above-mentioned co-design method. We aim to finalise this report by the beginning of 2022.

Moreover, WP4 has excelled at sharing their processes and findings at international workshops and conferences organised variously by the British Library, OASPA, COAR, EIFL, and OpenAIRE, OPERAS-P, the University of San Diego, and IFLA.

WP5. Building an Open Dissemination System

This work package is guided by the perspective of new and emerging not-for-profit open access presses that have not yet been sufficiently integrated into existing discovery systems, knowledge bases, and supply routes. Its aim is to develop methods and systems to better integrate the catalogues of open access publishers into curated research records. The implementation of 'best practices' workflows for open access book publishers will allow their catalogues to be better integrated into the scholarly record (discoverability, reach, persistence), thus increasing the impact of open access books. To support this, WP5 is building an Open Dissemination System (ODS) for open access books and a shared 'best practices' digital catalogue.

During Year 2, WP5 has substantially increased its work on **Thoth**, the open dissemination system. Two publishers (Open Book Publishers and punctum books) have now adopted Thoth as their only metadata management system, while metadata from three other publishers (mattering press, mediastudies press and meson press) has been uploaded into Thoth. Notably one of these presses (mediastudies.press) is not a member of ScholarLed and is external to the COPIM partners. Metadata files required for submission to an increasing range of distribution platforms, including Project MUSE, OAPEN, DOAB, JSTOR, and EBSCO Host, are being created by Thoth - and these files are now being used by the participating presses in making metadata submissions to these platforms. A new Export API has been built to facilitate this process. The Thoth Wiki has been expanded to include a Thoth User Manual, to document usage and best practices. Planning to establish Thoth as a sustainable service beyond the life of the COPIM project has commenced, with a new post of Product Manager for Thoth established, which is tasked with scoping, characterising and implementing the services provided for users and stakeholders of the Open Dissemination System that is being developed, while also holding responsibility for designing and implementing a sustainability plan for these services beyond the COPIM project completion date. This position is now jointly held by WP5's new colleagues Tim Elfenbein and Tom Mosterd, who joined COPIM in May and June 2021.

Outreach Activities & Community Building

Against the backdrop of the pandemic, the team decided to realign its outreach strategy, with research for the emerging scoping report and the parallel development of an Open Dissemination System (ODS) making a rescheduling of the second workshop to a later stage the preferred option. Workshops were arranged with ScholarLed and other publishers to introduce Thoth and to provide training and assistance in ingesting their metadata to Thoth. Building on the findings and

recommendations synthesized in the scoping report, and using the ODS prototype as a showcase, this workshop, which will be targeted at discovery vendors, is now envisioned to take place in the first half of 2022.

As part of increased development activities on Thoth, substantial efforts are being undertaken to scope connections and further exchange with key stakeholders in the book dissemination landscape. Meetings have been held (e.g., with EBSCO, Jisc, NISO, Memory of the World, Google) and perspectives sought from university presses, libraries and publishers.

In addition to the above, Thoth has also been approved as a pilot case for integration into the European Open Science Cloud ecosystem marketplace through the EOSC Pillar project.

Collaborative Research

To reflect the continuous evolution of WP5's scoping and development efforts, the team decided to update the major research report that had been published in Year 1. A second version of WP5's "Building an Open Dissemination System" report had thus been made available on PubPub in April 2021. The updated version reflects the integration of the report's recommendations into the GitHub development trajectory of Thoth, and the public Wiki has been evolving in parallel to publicly document the different platforms and outputs Thoth aims to facilitate.

Infrastructure Development

While WP5 does not have a formal infrastructure development deliverable scheduled for the project's first year, it is noteworthy that the open metadata system that will form an integral part of the ODS has begun, with a first public release been made in November 2020. Work on the major Year 2 deliverable has thus begun well ahead of time, with development now happening iteratively and following agile code development best practice. Project code and general progress of this development project are now made available in an open and transparent way via GitHub and Thoth's main website.

In line with the strategic decision to develop the ODS as a tool and service offer that aims to provide a viable alternative to the heavily fragmented book metadata ecosystem, WP5 has also increased in-depth scoping efforts to learn more about established publishing workflows at university presses and other interested publishing stakeholders.

WP6. Experimental Publishing, Re-use and Impact

WP6 examines ways to align existing software, technologies, workflows and infrastructures for experimental publishing more closely with the workflow of open access book publishers. It has been co-developing a set of pilot projects of experimental books (including by scholar-led presses Open Humanities Press, Mattering Press, and Open Book Publishers) which are developed with the aid of these new tools and technologies.

While Work Package 6 has seen additional delays due to the pandemic and its impact on recruitment processes (e.g., finding a software developer), the team has continued its work on its main outreach, research, and development goals and successfully published two major research and scoping reports.

Outreach Activities & Community Building

Following in the steps of the experimental publishing workshop with presses and platform and technology providers that has been held in Year 1, the work package replicated the previous event's success with two workshops on **ReUsing Sources** (**Texts & Data**), focusing on aspects of experimental publishing and reuse.

Organised by Coventry University in June 2021, these two workshops invited a broader group of scholars, makers, and publishers from Goldsmiths, University of London, TiB Hannover, Threshold Editions, IT University of Copenhagen, Hackerspace Rancho Electrónico, Pontificia Universidad Javeriana Bogotá, Universidad Iberoamericana Ciudad de México, Archives Portal Europe, Malmö University, Linnaeus University, Royal College of Music, London, Birkbeck, University of London, Mattering Press and Open Humanities Press. Many of the participants have previously been looking to develop practices of engaging with texts and data beyond prevalent conventions and technologically mediated forms of citation and quotation.

Focusing on reusing texts and data, respectively, two reports reflecting on the outcomes of these workshops (ReUse: Texts; ReUse: Data) have been published.

Next to these workshops, the work package team has continued to co-develop three pilot projects of experimental books along with the relevant presses and authors:

1. The POP/Data Book Pilot Project focuses on data books, working together with Mattering Press and the Politics of Patents project (Goldsmiths, University of London). It explores how texts and books relate to the archive, and how

digital tools complicate this relationship, while also opening ways to render them more dynamically, and potentially available to open and ongoing interpretations.

- 2. Combinatorial Books: Gathering Flowers, in collaboration with Open Humanities Press, explores and encourages the revisiting and rewriting of books within the OHP catalogue as a means of generating radical new responses to them. In its first iteration a group of scholars, technologists, and students from the Universidad Iberoamericana Ciudad de México (including Etelvina Bernal, Sandra Hernández Reyes, Sandra Loyola Guízar, Fernanda Rodríguez González, Yareni Monteón López, Deni Garciamoreno, Nidia Rosales, Xóchitl Arteaga Villamil and Carolina Cuevas), led by Dr Gabriela Méndez Cota are producing a book-length response to OHP's The Chernobyl Herbarium, titled "Ecological Re-writing as Disappropriation: Situated Engagements with the Chernobyl Herbarium".
- 3. **X-Sketchbook**, in collaboration with TIB Hannover (Germany), The Bartlett School of Architecture (UCL, London, UK), and Open Book Publishers, will explore the state of the art of experimentation in architectural publishing.
- 4. **Citizen Science for Research Libraries—A Guide**, in collaboration with TIB Hannover and the LIBER Citizen Science Working Group, will explore ways to assist research libraries in setting up Citizen Science programs at their institutions.

The WP team has been openly documenting the processes involved in these experiments, in a series of blog posts among other places, reflecting on the process of experimental publishing.

Collaborative Research

Following a slight delay in Year 1 due to the impact the pandemic has had on staff recruitment and availability, WP6 has now successfully published its first three-part research and scoping report. *Books Contain Multitudes: Exploring Experimental Publishing* maps and situates experimental book publishing, and provides a typology of experimental books and an overview of technical workflows and tools for experimental publishing. This report will be further developed into an online toolkit in Year 3.

In summer 2021, the team has expanded their scoping efforts and begun work on a second major research report. This report, *Promoting and Nurturing Interactions with Open Access Books. Strategies for Publishers and Authors*, published in October

2021, combines a literature review outlining developments, opportunities, and inhibitions around interaction with open access books (e.g., open annotation, open peer review, reuse and remix, open social scholarship, and versioning) with an exploration of cultural strategies to foster interaction with books, as well as the tools, technologies and guidelines available to do so.

Infrastructure Development

The work package is currently designing and starting development work on the online toolkit that will be produced in Year 3 of the project. The latter will focus on tools and technologies for experimental publishing, juxtaposing these with examples of experimental books, practices, and guidelines to support experimental publishing. Together with the COPIM developer, the presses and author communities involved in the WP have also started to generate the technical workflows for the experimental book pilot projects they are involved in.

WP7. Archiving and Digital Preservation

This work package is concerned with identifying the key challenges associated with archiving research monographs in all their variation and complexity and to develop new solutions to integrate research monograph archiving and preservation aspects into dissemination workflows.

With a nominal start in May 2020, the work package has experienced compounded delays in staff recruitment due to the impact of the pandemic on institutional processes, and an additional change of staff in the WP's Research Associate position.

Outreach Activities & Community Building

Following on from the successful organization of the WP's first Scoping Workshop in 2020, a report summarizing the event had subsequently been published on COPIM's Open Documentation Site.

Collaborative Research

WP7 has built on the literature review of last year and the new RA has been conducting additional research and will be creating a literature review for their probation. Following last year's report, WP7 conducted additional interviews which will feed into the scoping report (see below for timescales). In addition, the RA has reached out to other organisations and projects and a number of meetings have been arranged. This will enable the work package to ensure that work from other projects and existing infrastructures will not be duplicated, while also helping to disseminate the WP's own research into other projects.

While no finalized research output has been scheduled for Year 1, an initial literature review of existing projects, reports, and academic work on archiving and preservation of digital books is currently being produced. Closely related to that research is the collaboration with OPERAS: a survey led by OPERAS colleagues has been set up, reaching out to all 56 members of the OPERAS community, covering 17 countries. In addition, WP7 is reaching out to more stakeholders to conduct interviews in the following weeks.

Infrastructure Development

In Year 2, the WP team has continued with scoping risks and challenges for preservation, with the aim of creating a draft risk register and prioritisation list of

challenges. This first report will benefit from the insight gained during the work package's first scoping workshop on current best practice, and on possible future developments, in preserving and archiving open access books. As outlined above, the change in staffing has meant additional delays for the completion of this deliverable. With a new staff member now in post, WP7 is planning for the report to be ready for publication by M26.

Additional work in close collaboration with the WP5 team has now begun to explore workflows to link repositories with publishers. The work happening there is to scope issues and timings of manual workflows, looking at automated approaches, linking these with metadata requirements, and exploring additional preservation-specific metadata to be fed back into the development of WP5's Open Dissemination System.




Figure 1: Infographic - COPIM Outreach, Year 2. Image credit: COPIM, 2021. CC BY 4.0.
