Question 5

Which of the following premises could support Sylvia's claim so that she can express a convincing argument? Select all supportive premises. The most experienced critical thinker will select all correct and none of the incorrect answer options.

Response options:

- a) It's given that there is no sound research evidence that human activities affect the global climate
- b) Research evidence is often published in certain media which don't reach all people
- c) Climate change is fake news made up by journalists
- d) Many people find changing their own behaviour challenging and inconvenient
- e) Many people may not know how they can change their behaviour to make a difference in terms of global warming
