- Annual Open Access book bursary for first monographs in Digital Humanities

**Supporting scholars in using open knowledge practices - and in recognizing their value and contributions to high-quality research**



- Regular training in topics like evaluation of data and code, data citation, research ethics, peer review, data and overlay journals etc.
