Legacy catalogue entries: actions and agendas


Knowledge about catalogues' production that contextualises the archaic language of their entries is **invisible** to visitors, though it may be known to cataloguers.

Machine use of legacy catalogue entries can amplify offensive views towards minoritised social groups found in the entries' archaic language.

Historical descriptions of heritage objects are **transmitted** to contemporary catalogues; terminology, style and language structures persist

Creative computing and other machine uses of catalogue entries risk foregrounding and perpetuating social inequalities written into the entries.

Archival research and computational analysis recontextualises legacy catalogue entries, adding knowledge about their production and linguistic patterns.



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
