May I have these postcards, please?

Asking to do something, we use can, could or may:

Some examples:

- ✓ Could I use your pencil? Yes, of course.
- ✓ Do you think I could borrow your car?
- ✓ May I come in ? Yes , please do .

May is more formal than can or could.

As we can see, there are different forms of "thank you" in English. In the Uzbek language there are words like "tashakkur", "minnatdorman", "katta rahmat" and "yordamingiz uchun rahmat ".[3]

- ✓ Marhamat qilib oynani ochib yuborsangiz.
- ✓ Telefon gòshagini olib yuboring.
