# A little bit more about TRUE

TRUE (TRansition paths to sUstainable legume based systems in Europe) aims at identifying the best "transition paths" to increase sustainable legume cultivation and consumption across Europe, including the entire legume feed and food value chain.

The project explores strategies to increase the EU's selfsufficiency on plant protein and reduce the application of synthetic nitrogen fertilisers.

TRUE uses 24 pilot studies and transdisciplinary knowledgeexchange to create tangible innovations as well.

The TRUE project identifies more sustainable legume-based pathways – economically, environmentally and socially – and implements these via better collaboration and networking amongst European actors from across the value

Since TRUE is aimed at a contributing to a systems-level solution, European citizens as consumers and as beneficiaries of more sustainable value chains are all potentially impacted by it. Although change is a longer process, it is already happening.

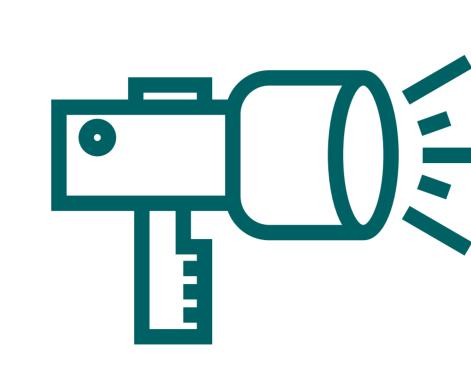

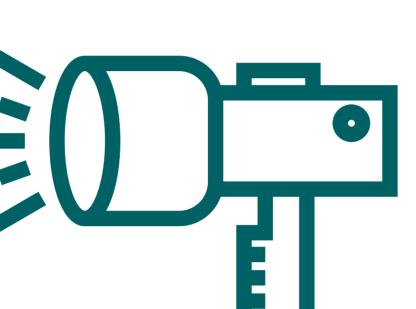

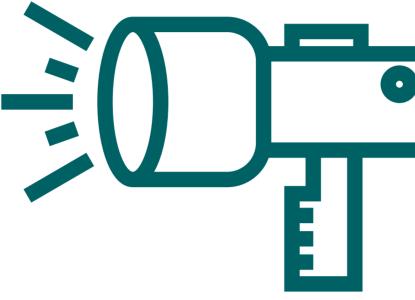

### Innovation and co-creation in TRUE

#### Innovation in TRUE

The social innovation of TRUE is in its attempt to change the current system of legume cultivation and consumption across Europe and to contribute to a social change. Officially there are 24 pilot studies (called Case Studies) in the project which create flexible space for innovation. However, there are many more hidden innovations within the work package activities as well. TRUE is an innovative project as it:

- introduces new ways of cultivating profitable systems for
- creates new collaborations, including networks (establishing and formalising the Legume Innovation Network (LIN) to connect legume-focused actors and facilitate knowledge exchange and sustainable commercial development),
- develops new products (e.g. beer from bean, climate positive gin from peas, lentil pancake-mix, legume-based yoghurt), and builds up an integrated decision support system (Path Finder) to help design policies.

#### Co-creation in TRUE

The consortium was purposefully set up as a well-balanced group, consisting of 12 academic and 12 non-academic (practitioner) partners, creating a bridge from academia into practice. Most of them lead a pilot study. Where the tasks provide space for it, co-creation is high amongst the partners. There is a very good atmosphere of cooperation and supportive relationships within the consortium, which go handin-hand with good coordination and transparency. Personal resilience traits and a lack of selfish mentality are all important factors in achieving the main project endeavours, such as creating a social network and building a community within the

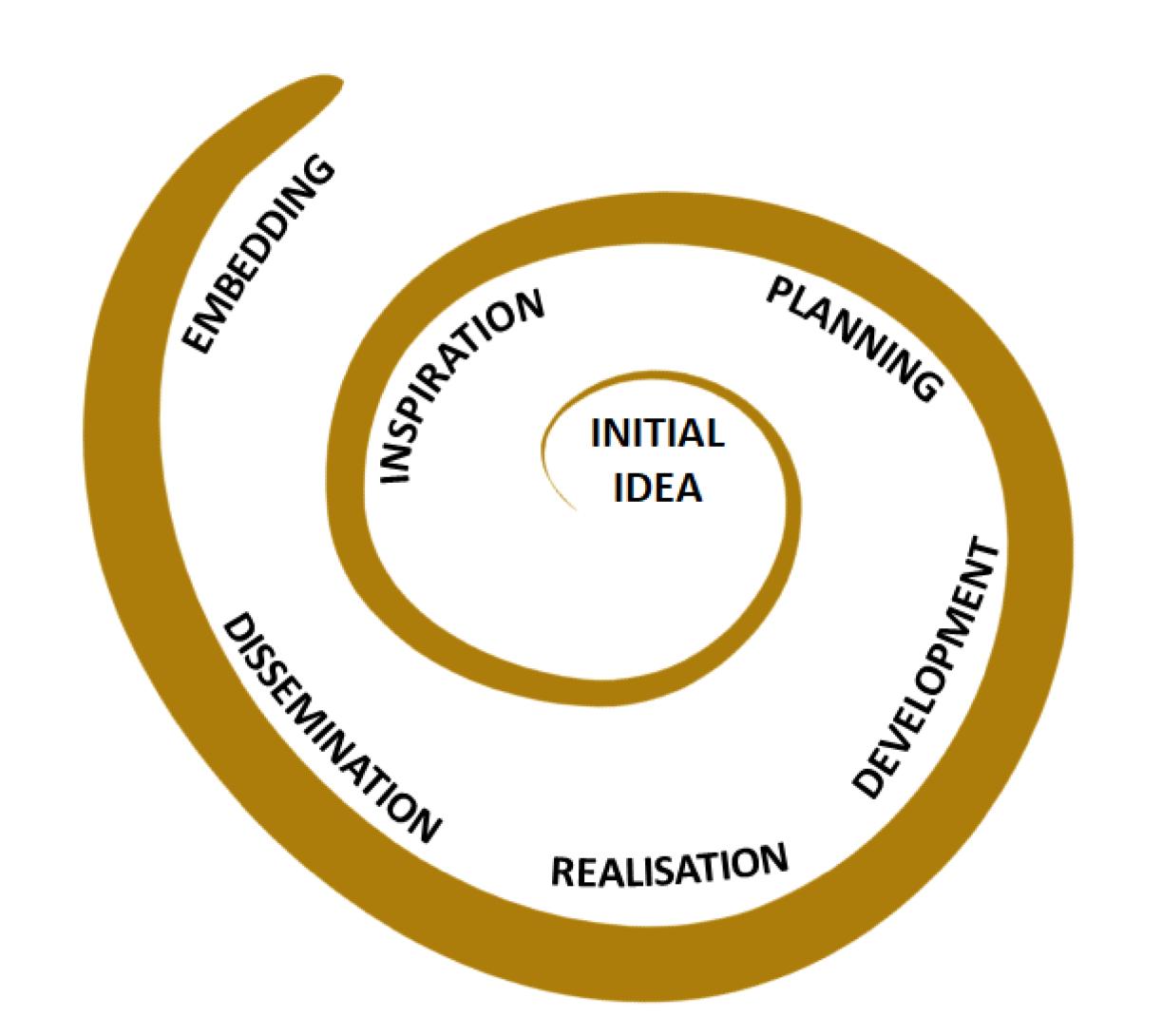
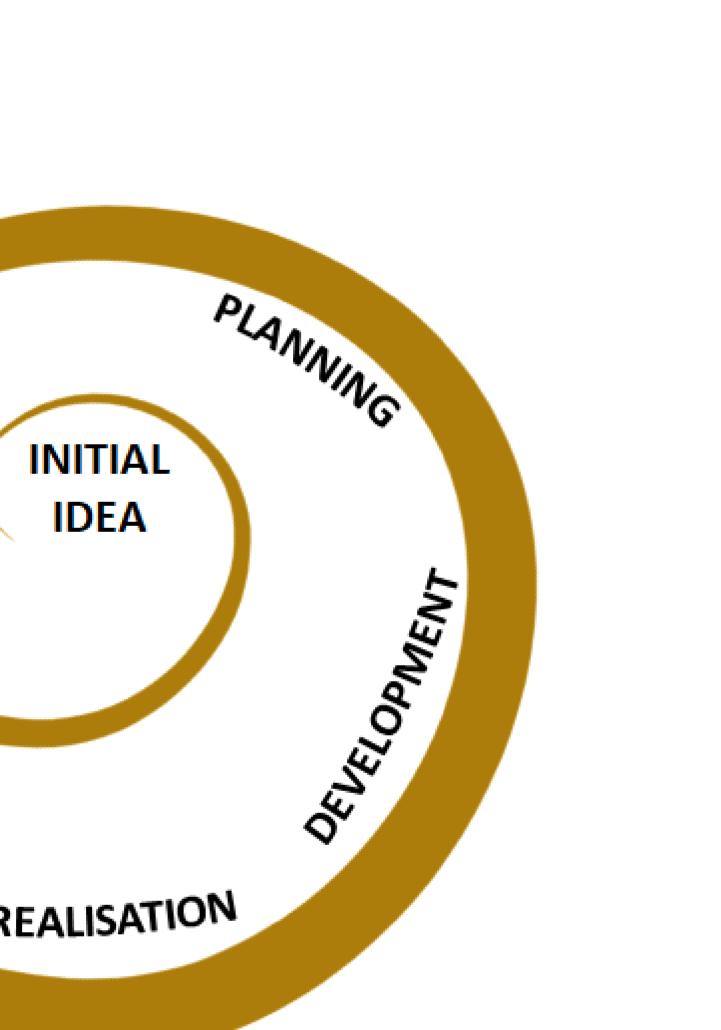

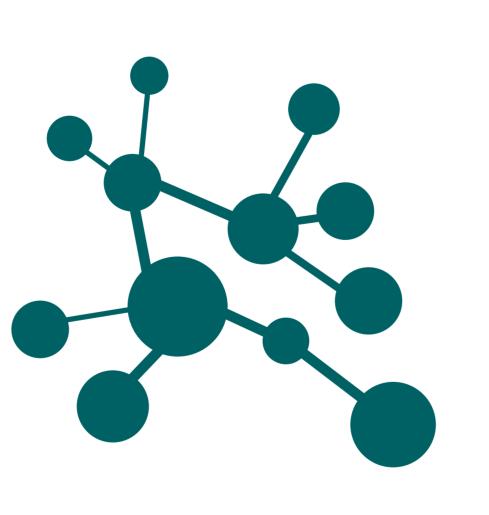




Interaction with the funding mechanism

Certain groups of actors (SMEs) could play a bigger role in European research projects if the projects were smaller or if there was a more even distribution of the resources (Eastern European countries). These could create more opportunities for innovation co-creation.

Taking the time to co-create the proposal is important. During the planning phase, involvement was organised through six two-day face-to-face meetings with devoted partners, who were willing to invest from their own resources when needed.

Stakeholder workshops were organised frequently enough (3 meetings in 3 regions plus a final combined meeting) to start joint working and community building. One of the added values of these meetings was that instead of competing, competitors started communicating.

When involving stakeholders and sharing results, language barriers can be a burden. To avoid exclusion, this needs to be taken into account both by the funding rules and the partnership and planned for accordingly.

Small organisations and micro SMEs often lack support to rationalise their resources. When challenges arise, the coordinator and other partners help them to overcome the difficulties. It becomes a point of learning.

In the LIN workshops, the proportion of SMEs was relatively high, although they are usually extremely busy. Smaller, flexible companies tend to have more influence in changing the current pathways. They are more open to new things and willing to be disruptive.
