A scoping study to enable change

Four key questions:

- 1. What position do academic and research libraries currently occupy as partners in, and leaders of, research?
- 2. What role could academic and research libraries play?
- 3. Are there any barriers that prevent this?
- 4. If so, how can they be overcome?
- **Designed and delivered over 9 months**

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- Report and case studies published: July 2021
- Implementation of recommendations: September 2021-

A scoping study to enable change



Beyond RLUK: included institutions across the research and academic library community.





Geography: UK orientated, international context.

Disciplines: arts, humanities & social science focus, but not to the exclusion of STEM.





Cross-sector: libraries, academics, university leaders, funders, and research managers.

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A scoping study to enable change

Shifting research landscape

- Places a premium of partnership and impact
- National, institutional and societal drivers

Libraries as catalysts and conduits of collaboration

- Collaborative by default
- Leverage position within and beyond institutions

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Headline findings: Spectrum of engagement

• **Formal routes:** 24% (34) of library respondents and 42% (31) of academics had been involved in a project in which a library was a partner (> 5 years).

Majority as **co-investigators (85%)**, minority as **principal investigator (38%)**

- Informal routes: most common but bring challenges of recognition.
 - Arts and humanities concentration & collections-based strength



- Information management, digital skills, & public engagement
- 97% of library staff (140) and 93% of academics (74) perceive that collaborative research involving libraries is beneficial to higher education
- **Perceptions:** of the role of libraries is shifting, but uneven.



Headline findings: What role could academic and research libraries play?

Rising expectations: of libraries leading and partnering in research (over the next 18 months)

20% of library respondents expected to act as a lead organisation (up from 9%)

33% of library respondents expected to act as a partner (up from 21%)

41% of library respondents expect to be involved via another route (up from 18%)

59% of academics expect to collaborate with libraries (up from 42%)

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Headline findings: Are there any barriers that prevent this?

Number of barriers identified at individual, institutional, and collective levels



Perception of the library as ineligible for research funding:

• Misconceptions re: the requirement of a PhD or academic contract



Recognition of the library as partner:

- Shared understanding of research and reward structures
- Point at which the library joins a research project important



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Capacity and confidence of library staff to conduct research

• Research and its relation to library roles

Headline findings: Barriers and how to overcome these


A mixed economy of enabling factors

- Supporting individuals & providing opportunities
- Revising **processes** & promoting **research cultures**

Report makes **13 far-reaching recommendations** for.....

- Individuals, for libraries and their parent institutions
- It identifies potential for collective action
- Recommendations for funders

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Implementation: translating findings into action

Challenge: Capacity

• Little dedicated time to conduct research

Professional Practice Fellowship scheme

- **10 Fellowships**, 6-12 months, > £25,000 (£20k AHRC)
- Collaboratively developed between RLUK and AHRC
- Support research capacity and capabilities
- Highly-tailored to a fellow's research interests
- Announced first cohort in May 2022

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Implementation: translating findings into action

Challenge: Confidence & knowledge

• **52% of library respondents** rated their knowledge of research proposal / grant writing as 'limited' or 'very limited'.

Research Catalyst Cohort programme (February 2022)

- 11 month development programme for a cohort of **18** colleagues from across the library community.
- Assoc. of Research Managers & Administrators (ARMA)
- First cohort announced in April 2022

Implementation: translating findings into action

Challenge: Advocacy

• **Raise the visibility** of research libraries as homes of specialist and technical expertise.

Technician Commitment (February 2022)

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- UK university and research council initiative
- Emphasises the specialist expertise of library staff as 'Research Technical Professionals'
- RLUK became a named supporter in **February 2022**
