

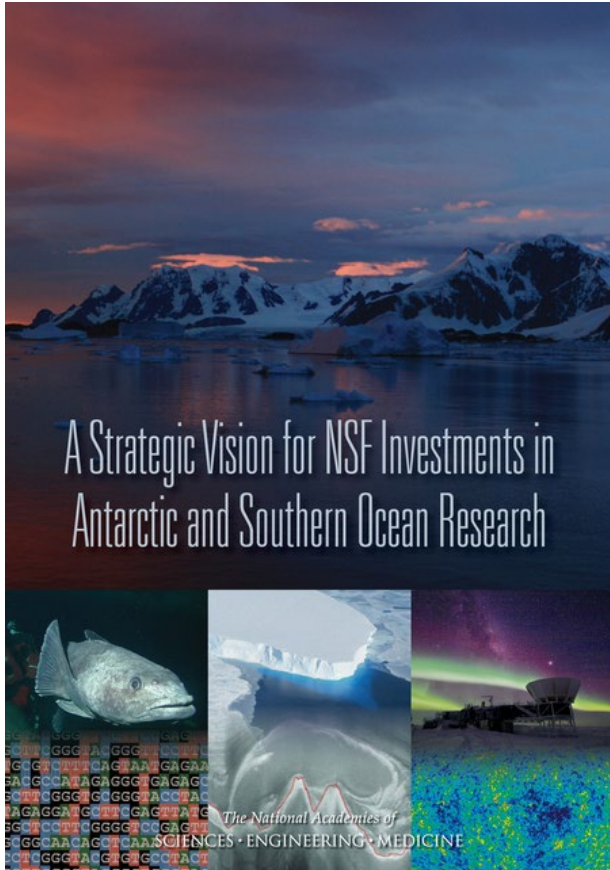

Ocean-Ice Interactions: Sea-level Rise

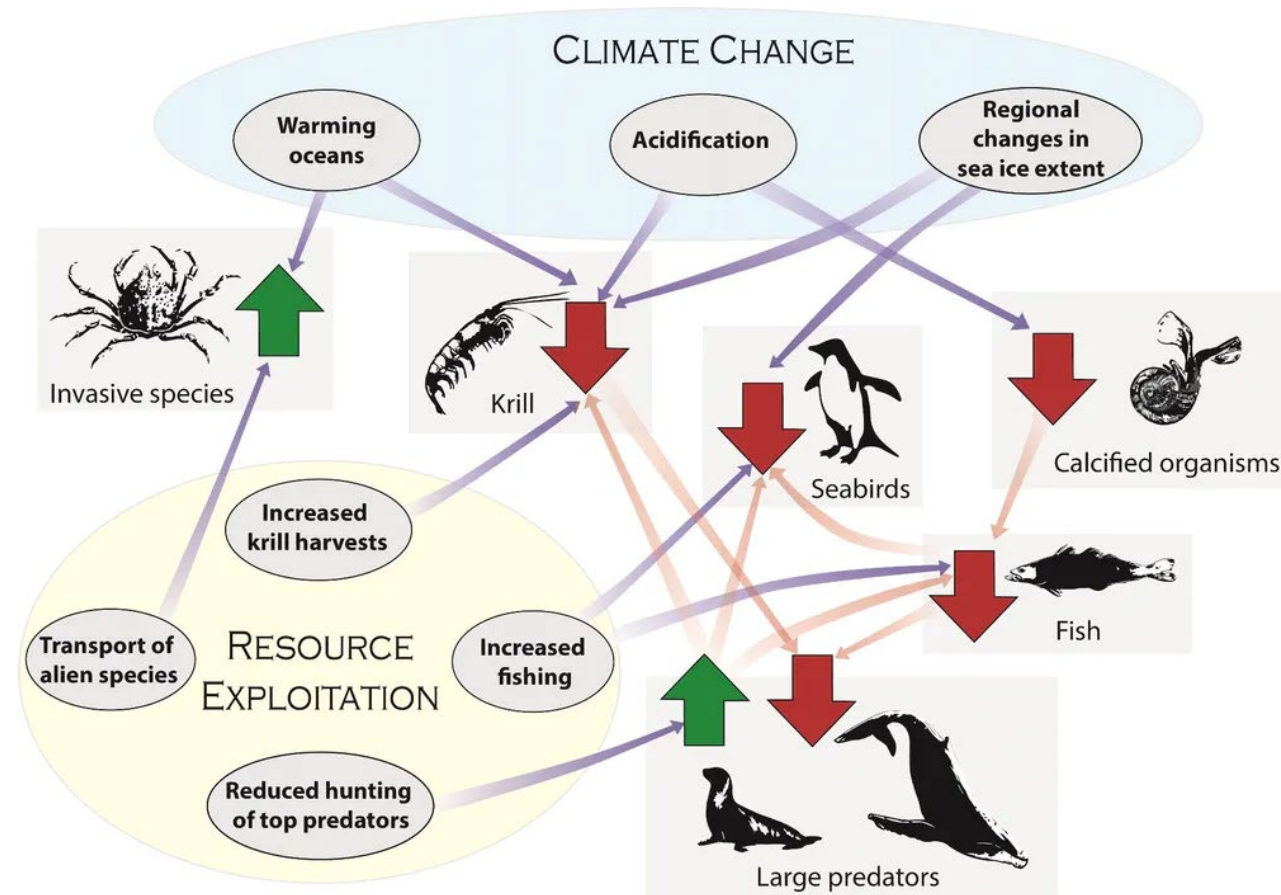

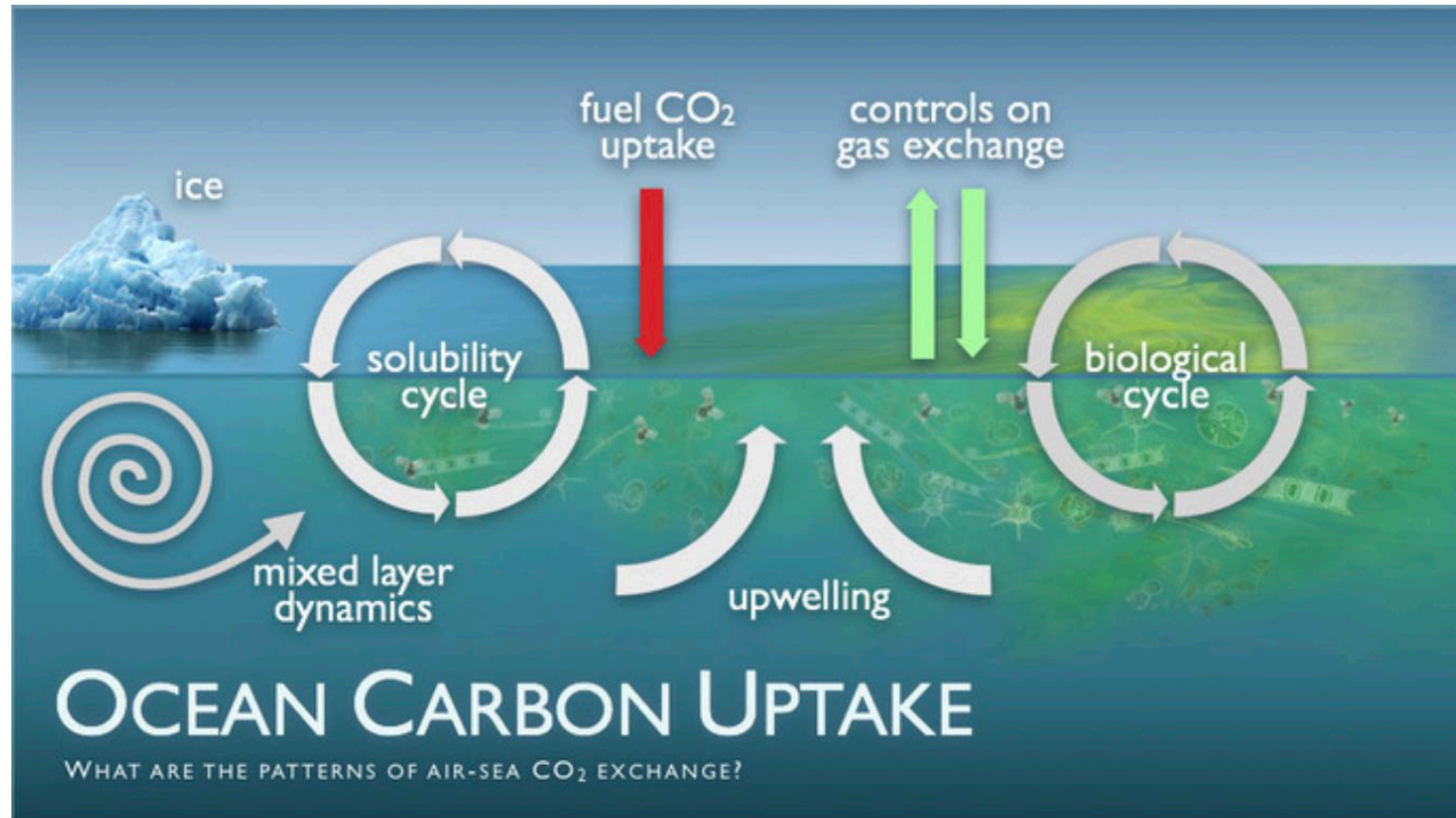

Marine Ecosystems in a Changing Environment



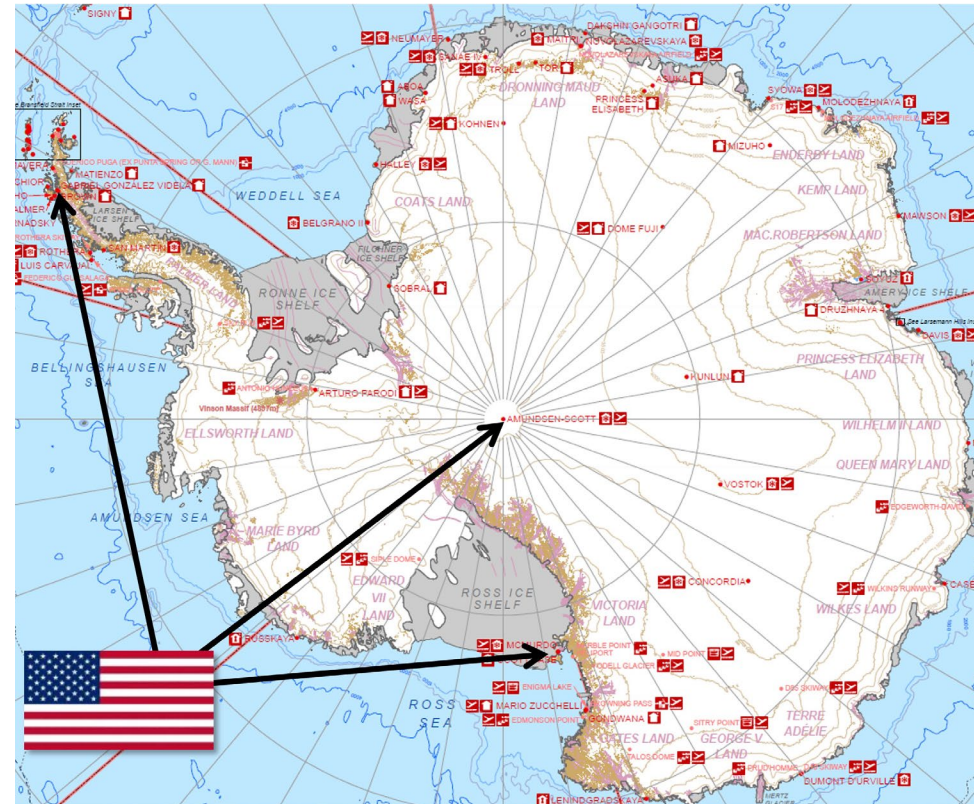
The Southern Ocean Carbon Cycle
