Librarians can play a key role in **identifying** and **curating high-quality OER collections** for specific disciplines.

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LICENSING AND COPYRIGHT

An **open licence** is essential for an educational resource to be 'open'. An open licence on an educational resource tells other educators that the 5 R's of open education are enabled: that the resource can be **reused**, **retained**, **revised**, **remixed** and **redistributed** (<u>David Wiley's definition</u>).

These can be used in addition to **rights** such as quotation and educational use that will often exist according to international and national copyright law.





In order to engage in open educational practices, librarians should become familiar with and practice the skills needed to design and develop OER and share them openly.

Librarians can have many **different roles** in Open Education, beyond simply providing access to resources. They can be **OER champions** in their institutions; contribute to **policymaking** around open education; provide practical support in the **creation of OER** and much more.


