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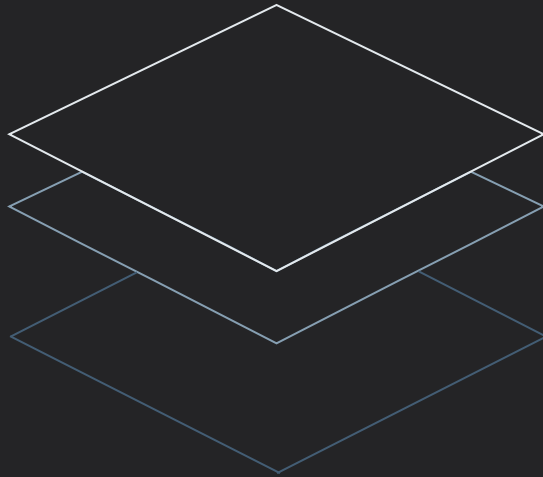

Adapting CETELcean for static site building with React and Gatsby



Why focus on front end technology for TEI?

Web publication cannot escape web tech.



- **Browser UI & UX**
- Server
- ⋮
- Static site builder

HTML, CSS,
JavaScript (vanilla
or frameworks)
+ assets/media



CETELcean: TEI in the browser

Lifecycle

Not SEO
friendly

- Fetch TEI (or load string)
- Prepare TEI elements for registration as HTML5 Custom Elements
<prefix-elementname>, e.g.
<tei-text>
- Register the new elements
- Apply behaviors: JS functions to operate on elements
- Can be styled with CSS

SEO strategy

- Pre-transform TEI
(CETELcean provides an XSLT for this.)

**Rely on static site generators
to do this step on build**



Gatsby

- Gatsby uses React
- “A JavaScript library for building user interfaces”
- Component composition
- State management
- UI libraries are written in React and they can do a lot for you out of the box.

Plugins! Integrate CETELcean in a modular and reusable way

The plugins

Find them on NPM (node package manager)

gatsby-transformer-ceteicean

- Prepare TEI elements for registration as HTML5 Custom Elements
e.g. <tei-text>
- Ingest into Gatsby data layer (GraphQL)
- Apply Node or XSLT/XQuery transformations (more later)

gatsby-theme-ceteicean

- Generate pages from ingested TEI files
- Register new elements as Custom Elements
- Map React Components to TEI Elements

Some city.

- Mapped a dedicated React component to `<pb/>`
- Simple DOM operations: attribute lookup
- Custom HTML only for `<pb/>` (components are isolated)
- Separate CSS
- TEI structure fully available
