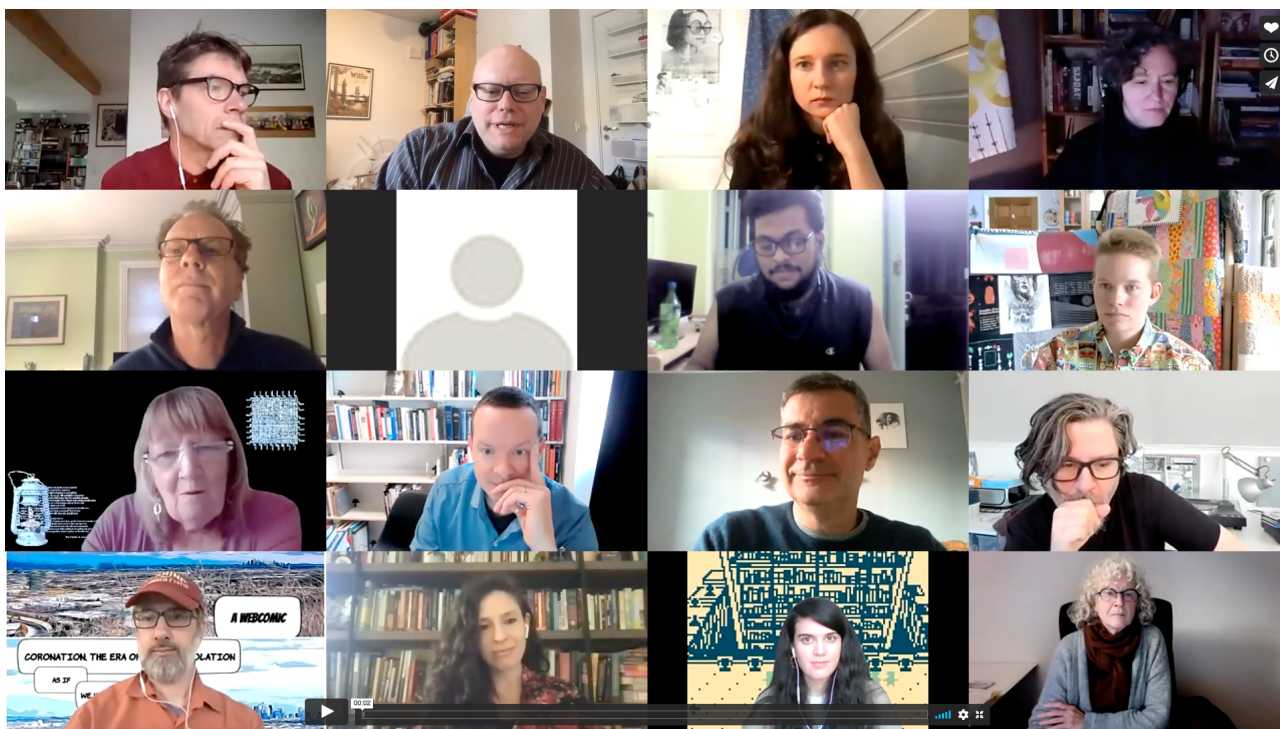


## Electronic Literature (e-lit) and Covid 19 – Final technical report

According to the project application, the project plan is to 1) collect, organize and map the material into genres and approaches and 2) supplement with in-depth interviews in order to produce a) a publicly available research collection at the ELMCIP Knowledge Base, b) an online exhibition and c) a critical research study.

We have succeeded in this:

As part of the Electronic Literature Organization's upcoming conference, Platform (Post?) Pandemic <https://conferences.au.dk/elo2021/> we made an open call for art works, which received 34 submissions that went through peer review and we opened the exhibition 1<sup>st</sup> May 2021 with 23 exhibited works. At the opening we invited the artists who could be present to present their work to an audience of about 50-100. The video from the opening is available here: <https://vimeo.com/544186117>.



We believe this exhibition provides a good overview of interesting, juried work of high quality. Besides what came in through the call, we have added some works we knew about from our other research. Physical versions of the exhibition have been up at University of Bergen and Roskilde Library.

We have interviewed 18 different artists behind 13 works during March and April, each interview lasted about 45-60 minutes. We have the full interviews as both video and transcribed. We plan to use this in our further research but are also publishing the videos as both short clips of 2-3 minutes, presenting every artwork/artist, and as a full 45 minutes documentary of art, electronic literature and life during the pandemic. The short clips have been used on social media, e.g. to do publicity for the exhibition and will be used at the ELO conference. They are publicly available at <https://vimeo.com/showcase/8366701>.

We didn't plan for a full documentary initially, but since we were lucky to hire an enthusiastic and very skilled video journalist with experience from working for CNN and Al-Jazeera, Ashleigh Steele, we wanted to take full advantage of this. The full 45 minute documentary is turning out to be a quite interesting documentation of this historical situation and we believe it will be interesting as a historical document, also, when we get more distance to the pandemic than currently, we believe that it will turn out to be a great historical documentary (and some of the colleagues and friends that we have shown earlier versions support this), and we are currently working to get it shown at various festivals, first showing will be at the Oslo International Poetry Festival, May 29<sup>th</sup>. We are currently looking for other opportunities and would also be happy to show it at a DARIAH meeting, seminar, conference or event. It has so far been shown at several events, including Oslo International Poetry Festival (June, 2021), Digital Culture at Bergen University (Sept. 21), Creativity and Resilience in Times of Covid-19 (Aarhus Institute of Advance Studies, Aarhus University, November 21), Skt Interface Day at

Interface Culture dept, Kunst Universität Linz (December 21). We're working on further output from the interviews, including an algorithmic combinatory installation with the (working) title: Pandemic Reflection Machine.

Concludingly, a lot of things have already happened and more is underway. We are eager to share our results, also with the DARIAH community, and please let us know, if you need more details and info. We have prepared a package with info and press material for the documentary in order to get it out to more events and festivals/conferences, we have started to work on a generative, combinatory version of our interview material with Ian Hatcher which we hope to have ready during the next year, and we have further planned research articles. Even if we're now entering the third year after the pandemic started, we believe, and have been convinced also by people who have seen the documentary, that this is historical material that makes a lot of sense, even when the pandemic will hopefully soon be over.

I will finish this report with quoting the conclusion of our curatorial statement:

*When we started discussing the Covid 19 and electronic literature, we reflected on the fact that, while there are many public memorials related to wars, there are very few related to epidemics and diseases. Apart from the horrible scenes we have seen from hospitals around the world, the everyday of the pandemic has for many of us mostly been visible through its lack of the normal, as closed down, deserted cities. There is something unrepresentable about a pandemic caused by an invisible virus. This exhibition portrays all this through art and electronic literature as, we hope, an already historical monument of life under the pandemic. We believe the exhibition demonstrates that the pandemic, besides all its horrors and cancellations, has also been a genuine moment for art and electronic literature.*

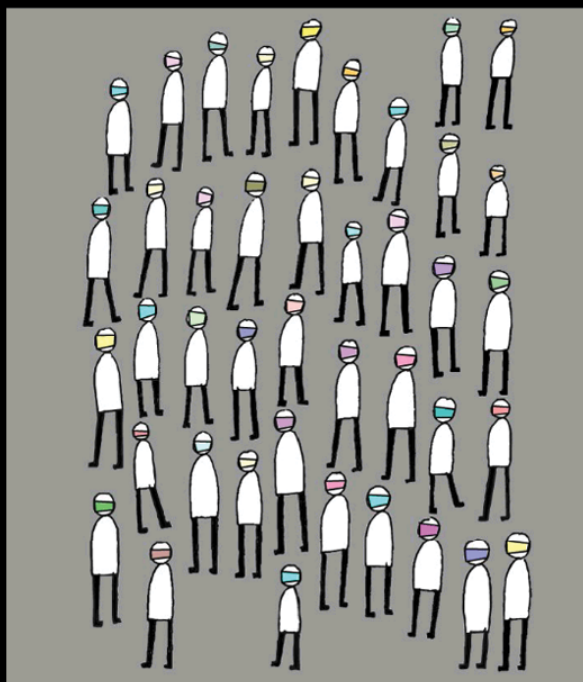
