# What are lib citations?

- = library holding counts
- Lib citations are a metric based on the presence of books in libraries
- Two main papers that introduced the concept:

# A Flemish case study

- **A libcitation analysis based on**

- Cultuurconnect: a public library catalogue from Flanders
- UniCat: a research-oriented library catalogue from Belgium
- VABB: a database that contains all publications by social sciences and humanities scholars affiliated with a Flemish university

- **Focus on**

- Book publications from the social sciences and humanities
- Publications in Dutch (the language spoken in Flanders)
- Publications aimed at a wider audience

# What I will discuss today

- **Can books written by Flemish Social Sciences and Humanities scholars be found in public and research oriented libraries?**
  - What is the coverage of both types of libraries?
  - Which books end up in those libraries? Peer-reviewed publications? Local-language publications?
- **Which books written by scholars in the Social Sciences and Humanities are found in many public libraries (i.e. are widely available to the public)?**
  - What are the characteristics of the books that are widely available?
  - Can we create a typology of public library bestsellers?

# Overview of the data

## Total books in VABB\*

- **46 641 ISBN's** in VABB 11
- Used for retrieval
- Monographs, chapters, proceedings

## Cultuurconnect (public)

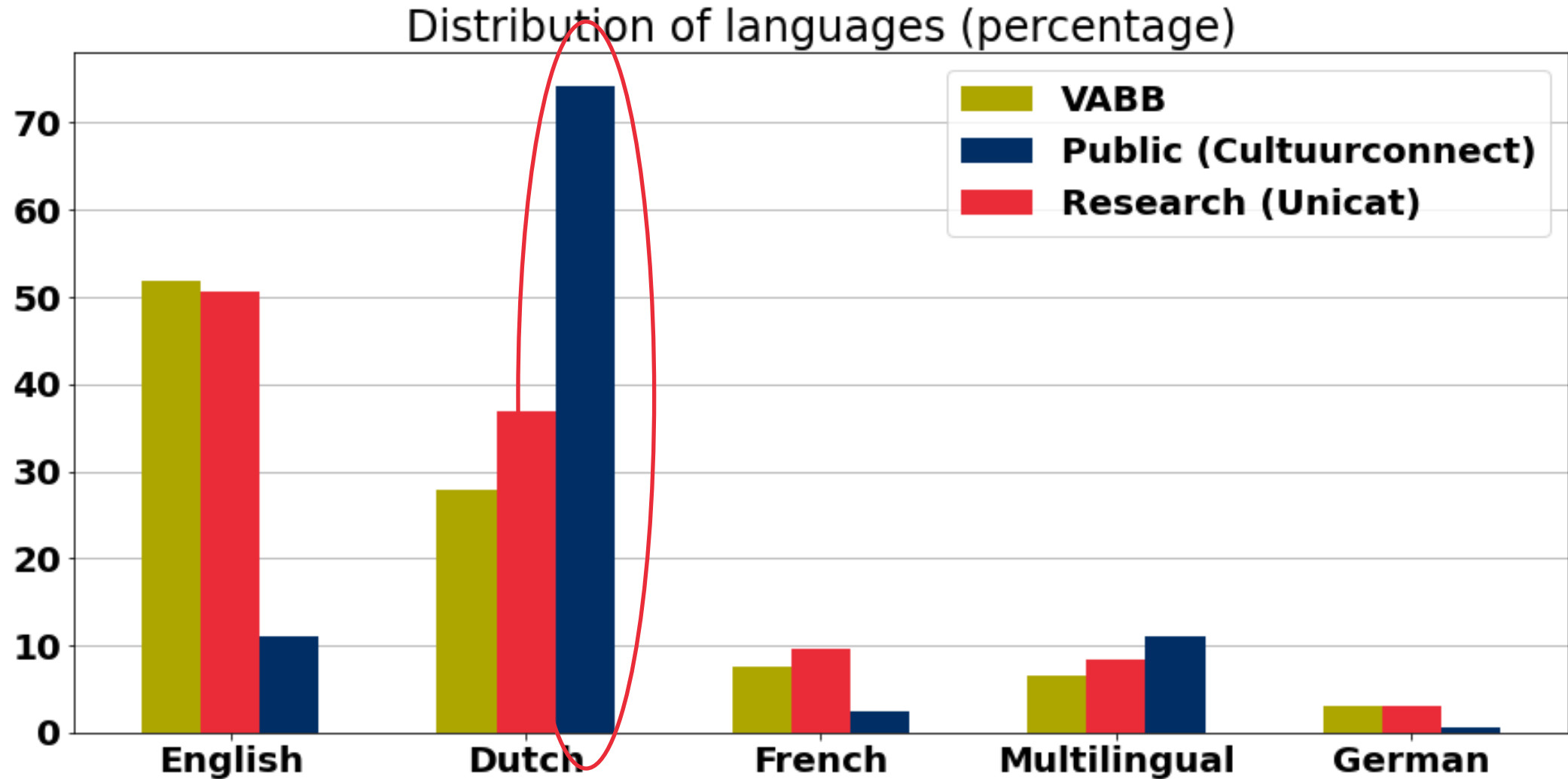
- 9302 ISBN's have a FRABL key from Cultuurconnect
- **8 675** of those have a holding count
- +/- **18%**

## UniCat (research)

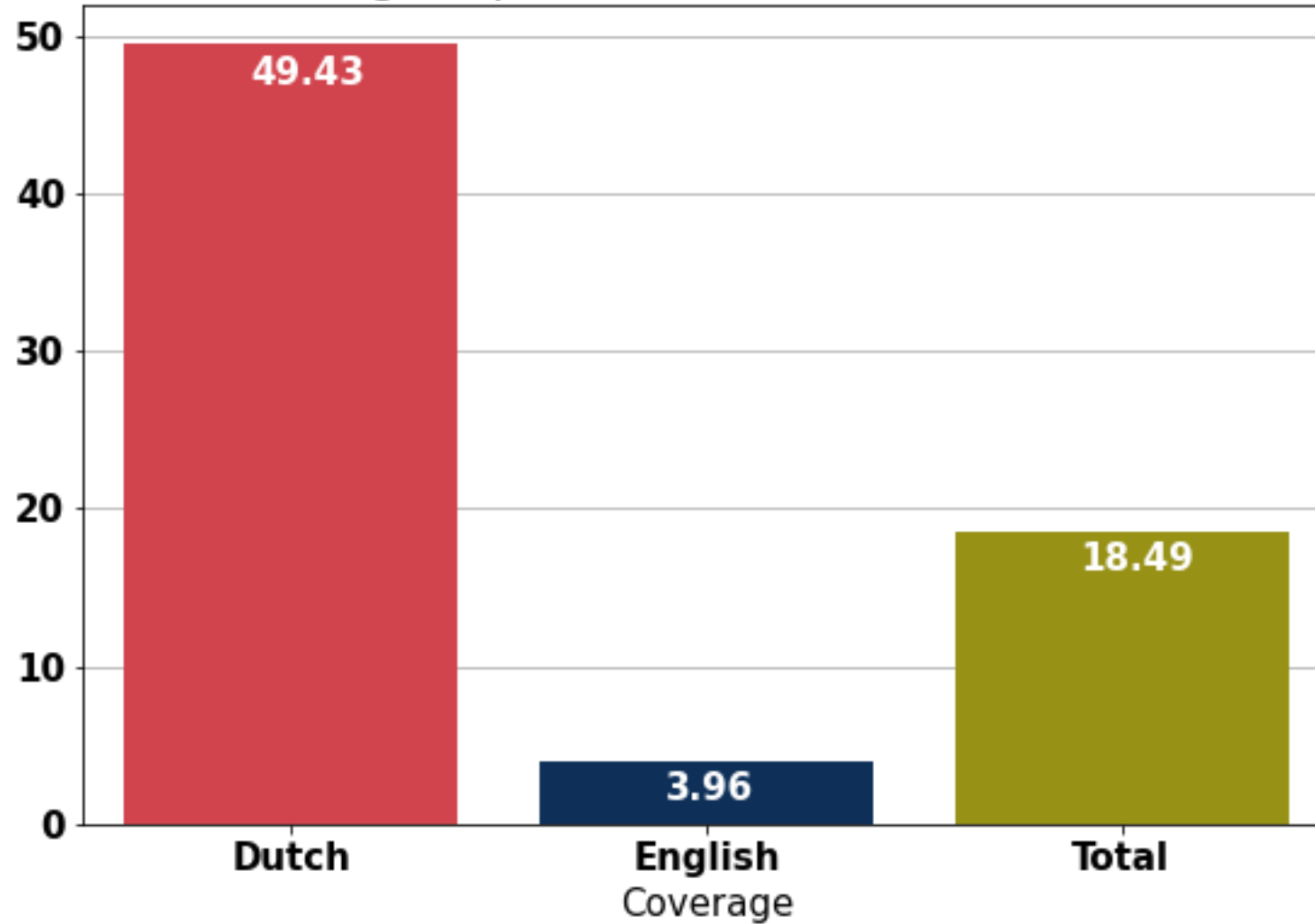
- **25 528** isbn's are also in UniCat
- +/- **55%**

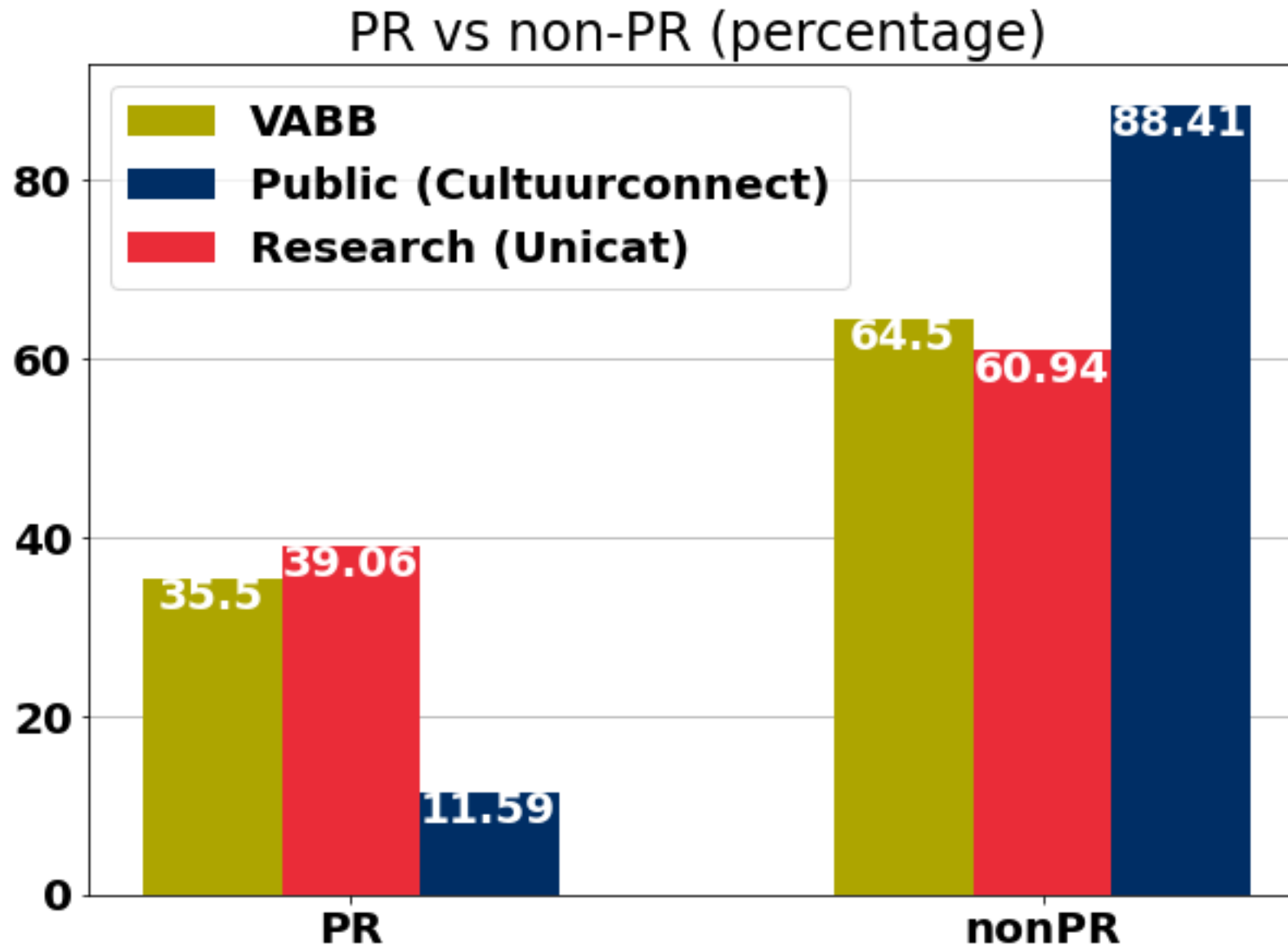
# The language distribution

# Identifying public library bestsellers

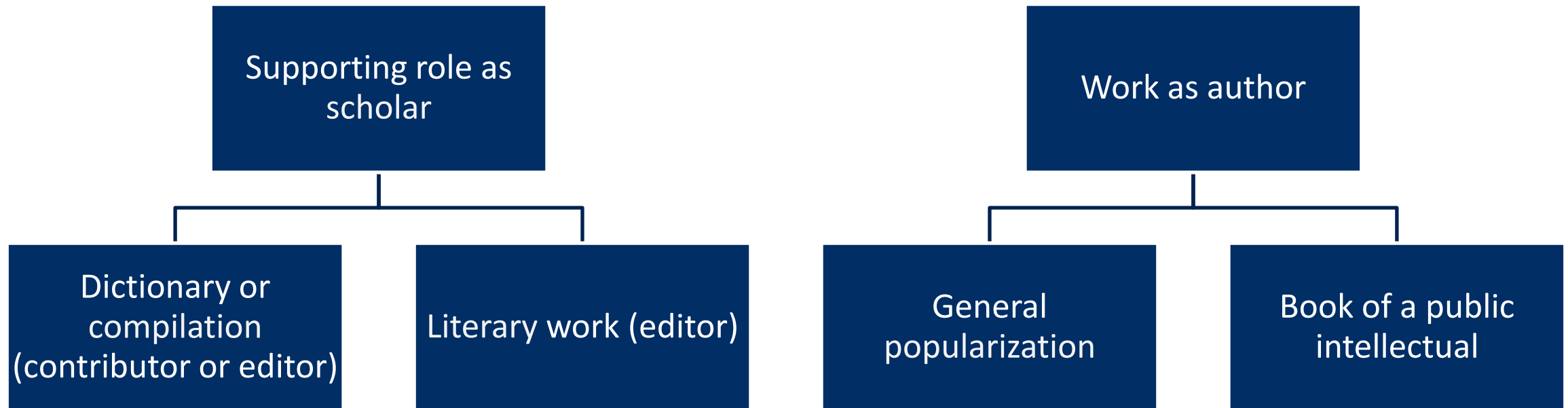
- **Public library bestseller**

= held in many libraries (top 1 percent of highest scoring books)

- **Examples**

- *De canon. De 50 + 1 mooiste literaire werken uit de Nederlanden - The literary canon. The 50 + 1 most beautiful literary works from the Lower Countries*  
= held in 425 libraries
- *Borderline Times: Het einde van de normaliteit - Borderline Times: The end of Normality*  
= held in 361 libraries

# Popularizing activity?

- ***“Frequent participation in the public debate is reserved for high-status researchers only.”***

- **Why high-status researchers?**
  - They are already well-known and respected,
  - they have the space and time (they have a secure position).

# Conclusions

- **Social sciences and humanities (SSH) scholars write books that are available in local public libraries and in local research-oriented libraries**
  - The availability of these books in local public libraries is low (~18%) but higher for Dutch language books (almost 50%) and non-Peer Reviewed literature (~25 %)
  - The availability in research oriented libraries is higher (~ 55 %)
- **Books written by SSH scholars and widely available in public libraries represent varied activities by academics:**
  - Contributions to new editions of important works of literature
  - Contributions to dictionaries and compilations
  - Popularizations of knowledge from their field e.g. history, philosophy, art history, psychology, child psychology...
