

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNING

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



Among them, the concept of "filtering by native language" has recently attracted attention.

For example, when Uzbek people learn English after a certain age, they often find it difficult to distinguish between sounds that are not present in their native language, for example, they cannot distinguish between the sounds "th" and "r", or they cannot distinguish between the sounds "f" and "th". If your native language is fixed to some extent, you will only be able to process English through an Uzbek filter. However, it is known that babies up to about 1 year old can flexibly distinguish all the sounds of the languages of the world. This is an infant-only privilege that adults do not have. Children who start learning English earlier do better on grammar tests. There are some interesting research results. An experiment was conducted (Lin, et al., 2004) to identify English phonemes (minimal pairs) with students from National Taiwan University. This is the difference between two words that have different meanings, "stone" and "castle", "right" and "light", for example, one phonemic difference, meaning, found that students who began learning English before entering high school were better at distinguishing between phonemes like "R" and "L". By introducing children to the English language from an early age, they are more likely to acquire the ability to correctly identify phonemes such as "R", "L", and "th". In addition, increasing the total number of inputs from early English will help improve understanding of English grammar in the future. 


own what they like. At home, it is important to prepare an environment in which children will love English on their own.
