Approved by the EMAS Steering Committee on **30/07/2018**

A sustainable or 'green' event is one designed, organised and implemented in a way that minimises potential negative impacts and leaves a beneficial legacy for the host community and all involved.




3. The GDA conference: General details

3. The GDA conference: Post-event questionnaires



1 means 'not sustainable/accessible at all' and 5 means 'very sustainable/accessible'



4. Conclusions

- 1. Events should prioritize **balance between human activity, resources, and the environment**, avoiding excess and waste.
- 2. Achieving sustainability and accessibility in events requires collaboration among organizers, attendees, communities, suppliers, and politicians.
- 3. Event organizers can promote sustainability and accessibility through ecofriendly practices and inclusive policies.
- 4. Attendees play a role by making informed choices and taking individual actions.
- 5. Future efforts should focus on developing comprehensive carbon calculators for accurate assessment of the carbon footprint of accessible events.
