Here in this proposed method, we use the N4ITK algorithm. N4ITK (Non-Local Means and Bias Field Correction) is an algorithm used for bias field correction in medical image processing. It is an extension of the N3 algorithm, which is widely used for MRI bias field correction. N4ITK is an open-source algorithm that is part of the Insight Toolkit (ITK) and is implemented in the SimpleITK library.

The N4ITK algorithm works by using a combination of non-local means (NLM) filtering and a bias field correction algorithm to remove intensity inhomogeneities from the image. The NLM filter is used to estimate the bias field by comparing each voxel's intensity with the intensities of similar voxels in the image. This method allows for the estimation of the bias field in regions where the intensity distribution is not uniform.

The bias field correction algorithm in N4ITK is based on a log-domain intensity transformation model. This model estimates the bias field using a Gaussian mixture model, which assumes that the intensity distribution of the image is a mixture of Gaussian distributions. The bias field is then estimated by solving an optimization problem using a conjugate gradient algorithm.

One advantage of the N4ITK algorithm is that it is computationally efficient and can be used for processing large datasets. It also has the ability to correct for intensity inhomogeneities in images with low contrast or with missing data, which can be difficult for other bias field correction methods.
